1. What public holidays do you have in your country?

We've got <u>loads of</u> them, for example, the one that's just passed was the National Day holiday, and then we've got the Spring Festival of course - that's probably the most important one - which is at the beginning of the year, sometime around, like, late January, beginning of February, that kind of time. Yeah, I think they really are, cos I mean, <u>here in China</u>, the public holidays are always on a certain festival, so it's one way of helping maintain all the various customs and traditions we have. Just to give you an example, if you took away the Dragon Boat Festival holiday, it probably wouldn't get the attention it deserved, and <u>over time</u>, people might simply stop <u>bothering with</u> all the customs that are associated with the festival, like dragon-boat racing. So yeah, I think it's pretty important that we continue to have them.
