Today I want to talk about Liu Xiang. He's a "<u>super-mega-famous</u>" (超级无 敌有名)athlete in China. He's a <u>gold medalist</u>, a <u>world champion</u>, in 110meter hurdles(跨栏).

I knew him from the <u>2004 Athens Olympics (</u>Athens 雅典的发音/[·]æθənz/). Before that, nobody knew him. So, it was a total <u>big surprise</u> when we saw him <u>striking the gold medal</u> on TV. He was like an <u>underdog</u>(黑马). Liu Xiang <u>got famous overnight</u> (一夜成名) literally.

I still remember how emotional he was when he won. He <u>wrapped himself</u> <u>up with our national flag(用我们的国旗把自己包裹起来)</u> and just kept running on the field. When he <u>got on the medal podium</u>(颁奖台), he almost jumped onto it like a pony(像一只小马驹一样跳上颁奖台) because of the excitement. He was so happy and so emotional at the same time. And that moment was <u>unforgettable</u> for us audience as well. Because before him, no Chinese athlete had ever won a <u>gold medal</u> in an Olympics <u>hurdling event</u>. He was the first one!

I admire him so much. Not just me, everybody in China adores him. We call him "a man who can fly" because how fast he runs. He's not only super quick, but also a very <u>determined</u>, <u>committed</u>, <u>and strong-minded</u> person. He definitely has <u>the go-getter attitude</u>. I know that he <u>started his</u> <u>career as a high jumper</u> (跳高运动员). But later he switched to <u>hurdling</u> as he found himself much more <u>gifted</u> in this field. He trained hard, fought hard, and eventually <u>became a legend</u> (成为传奇).

That's why he's my hero. Thank you!

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Part3:

1. Should students have physical education and do sports at school?

Absolutely yes. Physical activities can help children <u>build muscles(搭建肌</u>

<u>肉), increase endurance(增加体能耐力),</u> and <u>maintain good physical</u>

<u>health(维持生理健康)</u>. It can also help children <u>maintain their weight(保</u> <u>持体重)</u> and <u>reduce the risk of obesity(减少肥胖几率)</u>. And also, physical health and mental health <u>always go hand in hand(齐头并进)</u>. Doing sports can help reduce stress, anxiety and <u>promote mental well-being(促</u> <u>进精神健康)</u>. And when it comes to team sports, there is an extra benefit, which is children's <u>social development</u>. Through doing team sports, students learn how to communicate and <u>work together/ cooperate(合</u> <u>作)</u> with their peers. It can help them develop important <u>communication</u> and interpersonal skills.(分角度讨论)

2. What qualities should an athlete have?

Well, <u>in my opinion</u>, an athlete, especially a good one, should be <u>determined</u>, focused, hard-working, and committed. And <u>another thing I</u> <u>want to emphasize is that</u>, he/she should have <u>emotional maturity</u> (情绪上 <u>的成熟稳定性</u>). A sportsperson needs to <u>master the art of emotional</u> <u>maturity</u> (具备稳定的情绪) in the face of adversity and pressure (在面临挫折 和压力的时候). Never give up, have presence of mind (气定神闲), and <u>be</u> perseverant (坚持不懈). (强调补充)

3. Why are there so few top athletes?

Because, just like I said, there're a lot of <u>attributes/qualities</u> an athlete ought to have in order to <u>make it to the top (登顶)</u>. It's hard to <u>have them</u> <u>all (很难同时拥有)</u>. And <u>on top of that</u>, they need to know how to <u>take care</u> <u>of their body</u>. I know that some football players, like Christiano Ronaldo <u>pays lot of attention to his diet</u> and also the way he trains his body. He has a team working for him. And then, it is also extremely hard to find <u>the</u> <u>right coach</u>. A good coach can help the athlete <u>set a specific goal</u>, <u>create</u> <u>an individual program</u> that suits the athlete. They're like the <u>lighthouse</u> (灯塔). (罗列原因)

4. Is talent important in sports?

Talent in sports is very important. It's the athlete's <u>innate and natural</u> <u>ability(内在的先天能力)</u> in a particular sport. However, I wouldn't say it's the only important factor. Success in sports is not solely dependent on talent. There are other factors, like, <u>hard work</u>, <u>dedication</u>, <u>coaching</u>, <u>mental maturity</u>, they're all equally crucial. It is the combination of all of these important factors that determine success in sports. For example, Liu Xiang. He's very talented in hurtling, but I think his <u>dedication and</u> <u>mental toughness</u> also are the key factors in his journey of becoming a

gold medalist(金牌获得者). (反向思考)

5. Is it easy to identify children's talents?

To be honest, I don't really know. I'm not a children's coach or an instructor. I guess for young children, like toddlers(幼儿), it's difficult to identify their talents because they're still learning and developing some basic skills. For example, if a 2-year-old can't sing well now, it doesn't mean they won't become a talented singer one day. And when it comes to older kids, I think it'll be relatively easier to identify their talents. But <u>I</u> could be wrong (我可能是错的,我说不好). (分群体,举例子)

6. What is the most popular sport in your country?

① Chinese people like play ping-pong and badminton. Probably these two are the most popular <u>ball games(球类运动)</u> in China. And <u>other than that</u>, Chinese people love swimming and running, in general. (罗列)

We still do. <u>It's a shame that</u> (很遗憾) we don't visit her that often anymore <u>these days</u> (如今). But <u>from time to time</u>, we see her on holidays and someone's birthday. She still offers to cook up a storm (大烧特烧) for us, <u>even at the age of 80</u>.

<u>Moving on to</u> the reason why she loves cooking, well, it's not just about <u>satisfying our stomachs</u>; it's also about <u>nurturing our souls(滋养灵魂)</u>. She is and always will be the caregiver(照料者) in our big family. And She always <u>puts family first(家庭第一)</u>. Cooking is <u>her way of showing</u> love(是她展示爱的方式).

So, yeh, that's my grandma. Thank you for your time.

Part3:

1. What do we need to prepare when we need to cook?

So <u>the first thing we need to do</u> is to decide what kind of dish or dishes we want to make. And then, we need to gather all the necessary <u>ingredients and spices</u>(食材和香料). And next, we need to make sure that we have the proper <u>tools and utensils/cookers</u>(厨具) and <u>the recipe in</u> <u>hand(手中有菜谱)</u> which we can find either from a <u>cookbook(烹饪书)</u> or all the free recipes online. And finally, we can just start cooking by <u>following the steps</u>. That's the basic <u>prep work(准备工作)</u> for cooking.

During Chinese festivals and traditional ceremonies, the <u>major theme(主题)</u> is always to <u>sit down at the same table</u>, and <u>enjoy a scrumptious meal together(一起享受绝美的一餐)</u>. It's the perfect reason to <u>bring people together(把人团结到一起), celebrate the occasion</u> (庆祝场合), practice gratitude(实践感恩) and <u>enjoy each other's</u> company(享受陪伴). The delicious food makes the moment even more unforgettable. Food really <u>bonds people together</u>. (原因)

3. Which dishes are a must at festivals?

Wow it's really hard to answer this question because there are <u>countless</u> <u>(数不清的)</u> dishes served at festivals based on <u>different regions</u> and <u>specific celebrations</u>. What I can tell you is what are the must-haves on each festival. For example, during <u>Chinese New Year (春节)</u>, people must have <u>dumplings</u> as they <u>symbolize wealth and prosperity</u>; And during <u>the</u> <u>mid-autumn festival (中秋节)</u>, eating mooncakes is the must-do. And Mooncakes symbolize family <u>reunion and togetherness</u> (团圆, 在一起). And during <u>the Dragon Boat Festival (端午)</u>, people must have zongzi which are <u>pyramid-shaped rice dumplings (金字塔型的米饺子)</u> that are super tasty. So, it's really hard to <u>sum up (总结)</u>. (举例子)

4. Should students learn to cook at school?

I think schools can <u>offer cooking and baking courses as an option(提供烹</u> <u>饪课、烘焙课作为选择)</u> for students, not necessarily <u>a compulsory course</u>

(必修课), but <u>an elective one (可选的)</u>. I see cooking as a very useful <u>life</u> <u>skill (生活技能)</u> that most students (and to be honest, most people) should master. It can help students <u>develop a sense of independence (发</u> <u>展独立性)</u> and learn to eat healthy and also <u>on a budget (带预算吃饭过日</u> <u>子)</u>. Many parents are <u>of the opinion that (带这样的观点)</u>, for students, all they need to do and focus on is their <u>academic performance (学术表现)</u>. But <u>I don't see it that way (我不那么看)</u>. I see a school as a place that helps students <u>prepare for the future</u>. And the future includes being able to feed themselves and take care of themselves. So, I think it's a good idea for students to at least <u>have the option (有选择性)</u> to learn to cook at

school.(让位驳斥)

6. Are there any differences between cooking today and in the past? Oh yeah 100%. There are huge differences between cooking today and in the past. Back in the days(过去), like my grandmother's generation, cooking was often more labor-intense(重体力的) and relying on open flames(依赖明火). It was more time-consuming and energy-consuming (花时间、花精力). <u>Not to mention</u>, it required a lot of experience and techniques to make the food delicious. Let's just say (咱们就这么说吧), it wasn't something super easy or enjoyable. Whereas nowadays, I can say that cooking can almost be a fun thing to do. And even a cooking newbie (做饭新手) can make some good food <u>with the help of technology</u>. We have all the kitchen devices and technologies such as microwaves, ovens, grillers, blenders, mixers and even self-cooking machines. I'm not even joking(我可没开玩笑), sometimes I <u>open a bottle of red wine(开一瓶红</u> 酒), sipping my wine(小口抿着我的酒) while cooking. That's how relaxed I can be in the kitchen. So yeh, the difference is definitely day and night (白天黑夜之别).(时间分层)

One time, he shared with me <u>his journey of learning Chinese(他的学中文之</u>

<u>旅)</u>, and I found <u>his journey into mastering Chinese</u> to be quite different. He didn't start learning Chinese until he came to China for work. <u>And moving on to</u> why Mike's so good at Chinese? Well, I think the first thing is, he's got some talent for languages. He <u>has a knack for(有天赋)</u> learning a new language. For example, he's also <u>fluent in</u> Spanish, Italian and French, a true polyglot(会四到五种语言及以上的语言大神), <u>so to speak</u>

<u>(所谓的)</u>. And <u>moreover</u>, he genuinely loves China and Chinese culture. He <u>immerses himself in the local way of life</u>, <u>celebrates Chinese festivals</u>, and even <u>tries his hand at (try one's hand at...上手尝试)</u> cooking Chinese dishes.

He knows a lot about China. His other students and I call him the "Mr. Know-it-all (百事通先生, 什么都知道) of China". Sometimes I feel that he even knows China more than us. When he shares with us his experiences in China or his opinions about Chinese culture, it really <u>provides us with</u> different <u>angles/perspectives</u> to see our own country. 1. What foreign languages do Chinese children learn?

In China, <u>the most popular and</u> <u>commonly learned foreign language</u> is English. English is part of Chinese public education system(中国公立教育体 系的一部分). It's actually a <u>compulsory subject(必修课)</u> that every student in China, from primary school to high school, has to learn. Besides English, there are some Chinese students who may also learn Japanese, Korean or Spanish <u>out of interest(出于兴趣)</u> or some specific reason. But that's not very common.(主流情况,特殊情况补充)

2. Why do Chinese children learn English?

Number one, like I said it's a <u>compulsory subject (必修课)</u> in school system. So, they <u>have no option (没有选择)</u>; they have to learn English in order to <u>pass exams</u> and <u>go to good schools</u>. And number two, English is still the most <u>widely spoken language</u> in the <u>whole wide world (全世界最普</u> <u>Dob语言)</u>. From a practical point of view (从实用角度来说), if you want to <u>do businesses globally (做国际生意)</u>, if you want to <u>study abroad (出国学</u> <u>习)</u>, if you want to <u>travel independently (独立旅行)</u>, you'd better know how to speak and use English. That's why many Chinese parents <u>emphasize on the importance of learning English</u> from an early age. And finally, <u>peer pressure (同伴压力)</u>. Imagine if you're a parent. And you look around, every kid is taking after-school classes and learning English. You will have <u>FOMO (the fear of missing out)</u> as a parent. You don't want to be left out (被排除在外). (罗列原因)

3. Why are so many people learning English?

4. How can you help children learn English?

I know that one of the bad ways to help children learn English is to learn it in a very <u>counterintuitive way(非直觉性的方式).</u> That's how I learned my English when I was a kid. I learned all the <u>grammar rules(语法点)</u> and <u>recited all the words(背单词)</u>, I <u>aced(高分通过)</u> all the English exams, but I never learned how to use English in <u>real life situations</u>(现实生活场 景). I think kids are very talented <u>in the sense that</u> they can just learn a language <u>through playing and immersion(通过玩儿和沉浸式的方式)</u>. We can just talk to them and play with them in English; show them English TV shows and cartoons; play English songs for them. We need to take advantage of their age and talent. Young children always <u>have a knack</u> <u>for languages</u>(对语言有天赋).(细节,举例子)

5. Do you think the way people learn English Today is the same as in the past?

The way we learn English or any other languages has <u>changed</u> <u>dramatically</u> compared to the past. <u>Back in the old days</u>, if you wanted to learn English, you had to find a teacher who was in the same location as you and who spoke English, or <u>the target language</u> (目标语言). You would go to physical classes in a school. Whereas nowadays, <u>with the help of the internet</u>, you can find teachers from <u>all over the world</u>. You can take <u>oneon-one online classes or group classes (在线一对一课程或者大课堂)</u>. You can also be a <u>self-taught student (自学的学生)</u> by accessing resources online or learn a new language through <u>Al apps (人工智能软件)</u>. The methods for learning a new language have become incredibly diverse today. (时间分 层,过去对比现在)

6. What are the benefits of the internet for people's learning?

If you want to learn things online, you have <u>endless access(无穷无尽的通</u>

道) to information and online courses, and many of them are very affordable or even free. So, <u>the cost of learning</u> nowadays is definitely much lower than before. And moreover, there are so many options for you to choose from. You can always find the best resource that suits you the most. You can find courses <u>tailored to your needs</u>, <u>your learning style and</u> <u>schedules</u>(根据你的需求、学习风格和时间计划来设计的课程). What's more, you can connect with teachers and learners around the world. It's a big online learning community that can provide you with <u>a sense of</u> <u>belonging</u>. (罗列)

1. When do you think children start to have their own opinions?

Many people think that children start to <u>form their own opinions</u> much later, like when they are 6 or 7 years old, even 10 years old, but I don't see it that way. I feel that children start to <u>form their own ideas</u> when they're very young, as young as one year old. When they can start requesting things and making decisions, that's the moment when they have their own opinions. Those decisions don't have to be big ones, it could be as small as choosing to eat an apple rather than a pear, picking the red jacket rather than the blue one. I have a little nephew who is only 3 years old, and he's so smart. He's <u>definitely his own boss (自己的主人)</u>. It's funny how sometimes I can't even persuade a 3-year-old like him. He's very opinionated (有自己想法的) and <u>stubborn (固执)</u> already. (主流观点,对比 自己观点,举例子)

2. Are children's opinion influenced by their parents?

Yes, I would say so, especially with younger children. Their opinions are often <u>heavily influenced(被严重影响)</u> by their parents, who are not only <u>caregivers(照顾者)</u> but also <u>teachers and mentors(老师和人生导师)</u>. Parents <u>serve as role models(发挥榜样的作用)</u> for their children and have a major influence on their lives. As children grow older, they may also be influenced by teachers and peers, but <u>during their early years(在早几年的</u> 时间里), parents are the primary influencers.(分群体)

3. Who are likely to influence smart children?

To be honest, I don't really understand why the question emphasizes on "smart children" instead of "children". Children get influenced by their parents, teachers and peers. (这道题好奇怪,也许是 small children??)

4. How do inventors or philosophers come up with new ideas? I wish I knew the answer, but I'm not an inventor or a philosopher. I'm <u>assuming that (我猜想, 假设)</u> they gather a lot of information to <u>fuel their</u> <u>creativity (积攒很多信息给自己的创造力助燃)</u>. They immerse themselves in books, articles, newspapers, and <u>diverse sources of knowledge (各种各样的</u> 知识). And then, they <u>engage in deep thinking</u>, <u>reflection (进行深刻的思考</u> 和反思), and <u>observe the world around them (观察周遭的世界)</u>. Then, one day, bang! <u>Inspiration strikes</u> (灵感造访), leading to the emergence of new ideas. (罗列步骤, 细节)

5. Do you think ideas from books or writers in the past are all outdated? I'm pretty sure there are things and ideas that are <u>outdated</u> from today's readers perspective, because many authors lived in a different time and society, therefore, some of the things they valued are not necessarily <u>relevant (重要的)</u> in today's world. But I also believe there are many things in books that can <u>remain timeless (经典永恒的)</u>. That's why we read <u>classics</u> (经典著作)! For example, love, friendships, human nature, human emotions, life philosophies, those things and ideas can still <u>offer</u> <u>us valuable insights(提供有价值的见解)</u> and <u>profound influence</u> in our contemporary world. (分类讨论)

6. What kind of people have lots of great ideas in your country?

Scientists, entrepreneurs, educators, artists, engineers, and many others. In every industry, there're people who have loads of great ideas.

So, my friend Jessica has told me about her English teacher Mike. According to her, he's a very <u>fun, outgoing and down-to-earth(接地气)</u> <u>person</u>. And also, he speaks really good Chinese, and knows a lot of Chinese culture. He's like a "Mr. Know-it-all(百事通先生,什么都知道)of China". That's why I'm so curious about him.

Jessica told me Mike is a great English teacher. And what's more, <u>he's the</u> <u>kind of person who</u> can always <u>think outside the box(想法点子很多)</u>. He's <u>with endless ideas when it comes to</u> teaching, super <u>original</u>.

For example, in order to <u>ignite/evoke his students' passion(点亮学生的热</u> <u>情)</u> for English, sometimes he <u>arranges English skits/plays(组织英语小短</u> 剧、戏剧) for them to <u>take part in</u>. They all <u>put on costumes</u>, <u>go on stage</u> and <u>perform in English</u>. And then, he also organizes <u>lip-sync music</u> <u>competitions</u> (对口型歌曲大赛). He lets students choose their favorite English songs and <u>lip-sync</u> the song. And what's more, he <u>invented a</u> <u>'show and tell' section</u> in his English classes. So, basically, every time in his class, before he starts teaching, he gives 10 mins to one student to <u>go</u> <u>on stage</u>, and give a 10-min speech in English <u>in front everybody</u>. That's a really smart idea as it can <u>push many students out of their comfort zones</u>

<u>(把学生推出舒适区).(以上三个例子可以只用一到两个)</u>

I find Mike to be so interesting. I really want to meet him one day and get to know him. <u>To be frank</u>, I've never met a foreigner who can speak good Chinese. I think, talking to him and listening to him sharing his experiences in China or his opinions about Chinese culture, can <u>provide</u> <u>me with</u> different <u>angles/perspectives</u> to see our own country. Which is fascinating.

So yeh, that's the person that I'm curious about. Thank you!

Part3:

1. Are there any differences in the relationship between you and your friends and between you and other people?

My friends are my <u>support system (支持体系)</u>; they are <u>like my home (想</u> <u>家一样的感觉)</u>. They <u>mean the whole world to me (对我意味着全世界)</u>. I feel incredibly <u>relaxed and comfortable</u> when I'm with them. I don't need to <u>hold back (有所保留)</u> or be careful about what I say because I know <u>they</u> <u>will always be there for me (会在那里一直支持我)</u>. In contrast, my interactions with other people, whether it's someone I've met once, an acquaintance, or my teachers and professors, naturally <u>require more</u> <u>caution (要求更多的谨慎小心)</u> in my communication. I need to remember to <u>show enough respect</u> and am more careful in how I <u>build and maintain</u> <u>those relationships (建立并且维系感情)</u>. (对比讨论)

2. Do people feel lonely in crowded cities?

① I think so. And <u>if you think about it (你仔细想一下)</u>, <u>it's interesting how</u> (这现象挺逗的) when we are <u>surrounded by people</u> in crowded cities, we are still <u>experiencing the sense of loneliness and isolation (我们却仍在经历</u> 孤独和隔离). <u>Theoretically (理论上来说)</u>, those crowded cities can <u>offer</u> opportunities for more social interaction and cultural exchange among people, but I guess, <u>the fast-paced urban lifestyle (快节奏都市生活)</u> actually leads to <u>indifference and coldness (冷漠和冰冷)</u>. We've all experienced how people in big and crowded cities are cold and busy, <u>minding their own business (自顾自的)</u>. I remember one time, I was traveling in London with two huge suitcases, and nobody even <u>offered to help</u> me when I was trying to get into the subway. But you will never see this kind of <u>indifference (冷漠)</u> in small and less crowded cities or towns. People are so <u>hospitable and friendly (好客又友好)</u> there. (原因, 讲故事)

I guess it really <u>depends on the individual (看个人)</u>. In those big and crowded cities, there are usually more <u>social and cultural opportunities</u> where people can c<u>onnect</u>, <u>make friends</u> and <u>build beautiful relationships</u> (建立美好情谊). So, people who are <u>sociable</u>, <u>outgoing</u> and <u>love crowds</u> (喜欢人群), and also <u>possess very strong interpersonal skills (具有很强的人</u> 际关系技巧) can normally find a lot of friends and <u>surround themselves</u> with love (被爱包围). For those people, it's almost impossible to experience <u>the sense of loneliness (孤独感)</u>. But I have to say, at the same time, there are some people who are not so good at making friends and connecting with people; and because of the <u>fast-paced urban</u> <u>lifestyle</u>, sometimes people are too <u>occupied with their jobs and</u> <u>responsibilities (被工作和责任占据)</u> which might actually leads to more isolation between people. (分群体)

3. Where and how can people get to know new friends?

Well, there are <u>the traditional ways and modern ways(传统方式和现代方</u> <u>式)</u>. The traditional ways are, at a party, over a mutual friend, or over a mutual hobby. But I would say, nowadays people are <u>relying on social</u> <u>media</u> so much that many of them actually make friends online first, and <u>meet up in real life</u> later(现在网上交朋友,再在现实生活中见面). That actually happened to me several times. I have several <u>close friends(亲近的朋友)</u> whom I <u>initially met online(最开始是网上遇见的)</u>.(分类讨论)

4. Can clothing tell and reveal a person's personality?

In most cases, I would say so. People's <u>way of dressing(穿衣方式)</u> can reflect their <u>inner feelings</u> and <u>personality type(内心感受和个性格类型)</u>. For example, someone who always prefers <u>bright colors</u> and <u>bold designs</u> <u>(鲜亮的颜色和张扬的设计)</u> is more likely to be <u>outgoing and adventurous</u> <u>(外向和爱冒险的)</u>. Where as a person who <u>goes for</u> classic and formal style and darker colors <u>tends to be</u> more <u>reserved and introverted</u> (内敛和内向 <u>的)</u>. But there are also other factors to <u>take into consideration</u> (需要考 <u>虑)</u>. For example, some people dress <u>in certain ways</u> due to <u>the industry</u> <u>they're in (他们所在的行业)</u>. Lawyers always wear suits. Teachers have to wear something elegant and more <u>conservative</u> (保守的). Sometimes it could be the industry. (主流情况,特殊情况补充,举例子)

5. Why do individuals from the same family have different personalities? I think that a person's personality is <u>shaped by</u> both <u>nature and nurture</u> (被先天和后天因素塑造). <u>Genetic factors(基因事实)</u> definitely <u>play an</u> important role in here. That's why within the same family, <u>siblings(亲兄弟</u> <u>姐妹)</u> can have very different personalities <u>by nature</u>. But it's <u>not solely</u> <u>based on genes(也不是单纯只有基因决定的). Birth order</u> really affects <u>parental attention</u> on each child(出生的顺序会影响父母对每个孩子的关爱). For example, the first child usually gets the most attention because he or she is the only child in the beginning. Normally they're more confident and <u>safety-conscious(有安全意识的);</u> and then the second child or the child in the middle, they have to share love with their older brother or sister. They tend to be <u>bolder(张扬)</u> and more <u>aggressive(有攻击性的)</u> so that they can get more attention.(分类讨论)

6. How does society influence a person's personality?

Society is everywhere: the education we get, the media, the working environment, our peer groups. <u>It's everything and everywhere</u>(社会无处不 在且是万事万物). And we are all part of this. Even though we are influenced by our <u>genes and upbringing</u>(先天基因和成长环境), still the society <u>plays a huge role in shaping</u> who we are. Society can <u>instill values</u> <u>in us(灌输好的价值观给我们)</u>, like empathy, collaboration, generosity ...these values can all influence the way we interact with others.(细节)

So, when I saw this topic, the first person that <u>pops up in my mind(映入脑</u> 海) is my aunt. She's a true <u>business genius(商业奇才)</u>.

She has a very <u>intriguing/interesting journey(有趣的历程)</u> in <u>the business</u> world(商业世界). In a nutshell(长话短说,简而言之), initially(最初), she worked as a nurse in a local hospital in her city, which is a small city in China. But she wasn't really happy with her job and life. She always <u>had a</u> <u>fascination with(有一种痴迷)</u> the business world. Her <u>entrepreneurial</u> <u>spirit(创业者精神)</u> was already <u>budding</u>(发芽) when she was working at the hospital. Finally, at the age of 30, she <u>made a bold decision(做出了大胆</u> <u>的决定)</u> to leave her <u>nursing career</u> and <u>dive into the world of</u> <u>entrepreneurship(进入创业的世界)</u>. That's when she opened her first bar with her husband, and they called it "The Walnut 胡桃里." Today they have 3 bars. My aunt is a very <u>innovative(有创新能力的)</u> businessperson. She knows how to <u>think outside the box(发散思维)</u>. In a small city in China where people go to bars only to drink and have some <u>basic-level snack food(普</u> 通的零食小吃), my aunt <u>introduced live bands</u>, <u>BBQ</u>, <u>cocktail show</u>, and hosted a variety of fun performances and activities at her bar(我的姨妈引 进了现场乐队,烤肉,鸡尾酒表演和组织各种表演活动).

Her creativity <u>paid off</u> soon(很快就有了回报). "The walnut" quickly became <u>a local sensation(火了)</u>. It turned into a place where people not only enjoyed fantastic drinks and food, but also <u>experienced unique</u> <u>entertainment</u>. The atmosphere there was <u>unparallel/matchless(无敌</u> 的).

<u>Moving on to</u> what attributed to her success. First, her <u>courage</u> to <u>step</u> <u>out of her comfort zone (走出舒适区)</u> and <u>pursue her passion (追寻梦想和激</u> <u>情)</u> for business was inspiring. Her <u>vision and determination (视野和决心)</u> <u>made it a reality</u>. And then, her <u>innovative ideas</u> really made her bar <u>stand</u> <u>out from the competition (鹤立鸡群)</u>. Like I said, she's a genius, a <u>born</u> <u>entrepreneur (天生的创业者)</u>.

So, yeh, that's my aunt.

Part3:

1. What factors lead to success?

Well, take my aunt for instance. To achieve success, you really need a lot of courage to <u>step out of your comfort zone(走出舒适区)</u> because <u>the</u> <u>road to success</u> is <u>rarely a smooth one(通往成功的道路往往都不平坦)</u>. You have to be willing to <u>endure hardships</u>(忍受困难) and <u>make sacrifices(选</u> <u>择牺牲) along the way.</u> Moreover, <u>having a clear vision</u> and <u>innovative</u> <u>ideas</u> that <u>set you apart from the crowd</u>(让你和其他人区别开) is crucial. <u>Thinking outside the box</u> can make a big difference. <u>But it doesn't stop</u> <u>there</u>(也不是到这儿就没了). <u>Hard work and dedication</u> are <u>a must(一定要有</u> <u>努力工作和付出).</u> Perseverance is key; you can't give up when <u>things get</u> <u>tough</u>(不能在情况不好的时候放弃). <u>Lastly, there's also the element of luck</u> <u>(还有幸运的成分)</u>, which is often <u>beyond your control/ out of your hand</u> <u>(不在你的控制范围)</u>. You don't get to choose it, but let's face it, sometimes <u>a stroke of luck</u>(一点点幸运) can boost you <u>to the next level of success</u> <u>(让成功更上一层楼)</u>.(并列罗列)

2. What do people need to sacrifice for success?

Time, that's <u>the first thing comes to mind</u>(第一个想到的). Time with your family, time with your friends, time for leisure activities, etc. When you <u>work long hours (工作小时长)</u> chasing success, <u>chances are</u> you will sacrifice your time with people you love and things you enjoy doing. And then, you would sacrifice <u>the sense of stability</u> (稳定杆), <u>financial stability</u> (经济稳定) or <u>personal stability (个人稳定)</u>. You wouldn't have a <u>nine-to-five job (朝九晚五的工作)</u> and feeling perfectly comfortable <u>in your</u> <u>comfort zone</u>, instead, you will be <u>taking risks (冒险)</u> and feeling stressed out. What's more, sleep, rest or even health. When you <u>work long hours</u>, you don't get to rest and sleep as much as you want, and that can <u>take a</u> toll on (付出代价) your mental and physical health. (罗列)

3. Which is more likely to be successful, family businesses or large corporations?

It's really hard to say as both family businesses and large corporations have their own <u>pros and cons(优缺点)</u>. Family businesses always have <u>a</u> <u>personal touch(个人风格)</u> and can <u>provide personalized service</u> which can <u>foster customers' loyalty(培养顾客忠诚度)</u>. And on the other hand, large corporations have more resources and access to a bigger market; they normally have more employees, therefore, more people more ideas. It's hard to generalize. (分头讨论)

4. Is it easy for a business to be successful without affecting the environment?

Well, running a business while being eco-friendly can be really challenging (会很有挑战). I think it's almost impossible to find a business which is <u>thriving (成功绽放)</u> and at the same time not <u>causing any burden</u> to the environment (不给环境带来任何负担). However, many successful businesses nowadays are finding ways to <u>reduce their environmental</u> <u>footprint (减少给环境带来的负担)</u> by <u>using sustainable strategies</u> and <u>making eco-friendly products (制作对环境友好的产品)</u>. Actually, some customers are really <u>supporting/rooting for (支持)</u> the idea of buying eco-friendly products, and it can even become a <u>selling point (卖点)</u> for some businesses. (转折)

5. Can you provide some examples of family businesses in your country? Well, there are numerous <u>business giants (商业巨头)</u> that have their origins in family businesses. For instance, <u>Wanda Group (万达集团)</u>, a <u>highly successful business</u> with interests in real estate, entertainment, and tourism (在房地产、娱乐和旅游业都相当成功的企业). Another example is the Wahaha Group (娃哈哈), it's super famous and successful in China's <u>food and beverage industry (餐饮行业)</u>. Personally, I have fond memories of growing up while enjoying their beverages. And then, there's the Midea Group (美的), a <u>leading manufacturer (领衔制造商)</u> of <u>home appliances</u> <u>(家用电器)</u>. In my home, all our essential appliances, such as the washing machine, electric fan, and kitchen appliances are all from this brand. (举 例子)

6. What qualities should be considered when recruiting employees?

First of all, of course, skills and experience are <u>a must(一定要有)</u> as you want somebody who can do the job right and do the job well. <u>On top of</u> <u>that</u>, attitude also is the key here. If a person is really <u>eager to learn(渴望</u>

<u>学习),</u> to adapt, to grow in a company, this person can have a bright future. And then communication skills. A person who can <u>actively listen</u> and <u>express their feelings and ideas clearly</u> is really <u>golden(难得)</u>.(罗 列)

So, I'd like to talk about a successful person I <u>had the privilege of working</u> with(有幸可以一起工作) <u>during my internship(实习期间)</u>. He was my <u>supervisor(主管)</u> at that time, Mr. Jia.

I <u>crossed paths with(产生交集)</u> Mr. Jia a few years ago when I was <u>doing</u> my internship(实习期间). And I had the opportunity to closely work with him. We worked on one project together, and I was able to <u>learn a great</u> <u>deal from him(从他那里学到很多)</u>. <u>What struck me the most about him(他给我印象最深的是)</u> was his incredible <u>problem-solving skills</u>(解决问题的能力). He had an <u>amazing(神奇的)</u> ability to <u>see through complex problems(看穿复杂问题)</u>, analyze them <u>from multiple angles</u>, <u>find the root(寻找根源)</u> of the problem, and <u>come up with innovative solutions(想出创艺解决方案)</u>.

Moreover, I was <u>impressed and moved by</u>(印象深刻且被感动于) his <u>hard</u> <u>work</u> and <u>dedication</u> to his field. He had invested years <u>honing his skills</u> and <u>expertise</u>(磨练技能和专业性), which <u>contributed to his success</u>. He was such a <u>perfectionist</u>(完美主义者).

What else, his amazing <u>leadership and mentorship</u>(领导力和指导力) also <u>set him apart</u>(让他和别人不同). He not only achieved remarkable success himself but also <u>took the time</u>(花时间) to guide and mentor those around him, myself included. I remember one time, I had to <u>work late</u> <u>hours</u>(加班) to prepare for a <u>meeting scheduled for the next day</u>(第二天 <u>的一个会)</u>, he stayed with me and guided me <u>step by step</u>(一步步) until 10pm. His willingness to share knowledge and <u>provide constructive</u> <u>feedback</u>(提供有建设性反馈) was <u>priceless</u>(无价的).

Through working with him, it left me feeling so motivated. His success was <u>a source of inspiration(一种启迪)</u> for me. I want to become a person like him one day.

Part3:

1. Is money the only measure of success in your country? Well, in my country, money is definitely <u>one of the major measures</u> of success, <u>unfortunately</u>. Many people are <u>success-driven(以成功为导向)</u> and <u>money-focused(以金钱为重心)</u>. And they only want to <u>surround</u> themselves with people(与.....为伍) who have a lot of money or fame. But "only" is a very <u>extreme word (极端词汇)</u>, I think. <u>I would like to think</u> <u>(我愿意这么去想)</u> that there are still other things that people value in life. Other things like, <u>personal happiness (个人的快乐)</u>, health, <u>a perfect</u> <u>balance between work and life</u> (工作和生活的完美平衡), <u>having a happy</u> <u>family, being important and influential in your community (在你的社区有影</u> <u>响力)</u>. I would say that there are still some people like me who believe success is not <u>solely about money</u>, it's about <u>leading a fulfilling life (过充实</u> <u>的生活)</u>, and <u>be happy with what you have</u> and <u>who you are (对自己拥有的</u> <u>和自己是谁而感到满意)</u>. (主流观点,自己观点)

2. How do you define whether one is a successful person? Well like I mentioned, my definition of success is definitely not the most <u>mainstream (主流的)</u>. For me, if a person is happy with what they have and who they are. They are able to <u>stand on their own feet (自食其力)</u>, <u>have a roof over their head (有住的地方)</u> and <u>lead a happy and fulfilling</u> <u>life</u>, that's success. For example, let's say, if you are a <u>surf coach (冲浪教</u> <u>练)</u>, which is not a <u>glamorous/ high-profile job (光鲜亮丽的工作)</u>, <u>conventionally (传统角度来说)</u>. But if you are happy to be a surf coach and you can <u>provide for yourself (养活自己)</u>, and everyday you go to the sea and surf, while teaching your students, sharing your skill and knowledge, as long you are happy, then you ARE successful in your own world. (举例 子)

3. What is the standard of success in your country?

The general standard of success in my country is like what I said: being outstanding and influential in your field, making good money, having a beautiful family, having a nice house and nice cars, and having healthy and smart children. That's basically the definition of success.

4. Is there a controversy between success and happiness?

There is always a controversy/ debate between happiness and success; it's like a <u>chicken-and-egg situation (先有鸡还是先有蛋的情况)</u>. Some people think you need to be happy with yourself and live a content and fulfilling life <u>no matter what (无论如何) in the first place (首先)</u>, and then you can <u>make things happen (促成事情发生)</u> and become a successful person; But there are some other people, <u>arguably more people (比较肯定</u> <u>是更多人)</u>, hold the opinion that, in order to feel happy, you need to be successful, as money and fame will bring happiness. (分群体)

5. Is it easy to succeed in the national tests in your country?

National tests in China are <u>highly competitive (高度有竞争力)</u> and <u>super</u> <u>challenging (超级有挑战性的)</u>. Students are suffering from "the grind" (内 卷) on a daily basis. They often need to <u>prepare for an exam rigorously</u> for months or even years and <u>go through unimaginable pressure (经历难以想</u> <u>象的压力)</u>. But when it comes to whether it's easy or difficult, I still think it depends on the individual. Some students are more <u>hard-working</u>, <u>diligent</u>, <u>devoting</u>, <u>determined (努力、勤奋、投入、有决心的)</u> and also good at studying. It will be relatively easier for them to <u>ace exams (高分通过)</u>. Whereas for some other students, they don't try hard in the first place, and they don't <u>have a knack for taking exams</u> either (没有考试的天赋), and then for them it will be almost impossible to pass those exams. (分群体) 6. What are the factors that influence students grades at school?

First of all, schools <u>play a role in (发挥作用)</u> influencing these factors, teachers and their <u>teaching methods</u>, and the <u>school environment</u>, things like that; and there are also factors that comes within the students themselves, like their <u>study habits</u> (学习习惯), their skills such as, <u>time management skills</u>, <u>organization skills</u>, and also their motivation and goals in life; Parents <u>contribute to</u> these factors as well. Whether their parents are supportive and can provide them with a positive environment, these are also important elements. And finally, classmates,

friends, and peers(同伴) can all affect a child's performance in the <u>academic world(学术世界)</u>.(分类别角度讨论)

- save on an external hard drive: 保存在移动硬盘里

- The <u>air vents</u> were blocked. So, the laptop wasn't <u>ventilated</u> properly.

(排风扇被堵住了。笔记本电脑没有正常通风)

A few years back, I had this laptop that <u>gave me quite a headache(让我颇</u>为<u>头</u>疼). It just suddenly <u>crashed(崩盘)</u>, and I <u>can't even describe how</u> <u>frustrated I felt(我都形容不出来当时有多痛苦)</u>. I try not to think about it too much because it <u>brings back all those memories</u>(带回很多不好的回忆)/ That is a memory that <u>I don't even want to recall(我都不愿回忆)</u>.

So, at that time, I had this super important presentation at school/work. I'd been <u>glued to</u> (把自己黏在电脑上,表示特别投入的状态) my laptop for days, <u>creating PowerPoint slides</u>, <u>hunting down information</u> (在网上猎取信 <u>息</u>) on the internet, and <u>making diagrams</u> (做图表) with Photoshop. <u>I</u> <u>had my hands full</u> ("手上东西满了",比喻很忙) / <u>I had a lot on my plate</u> ("盘子上一堆东西",也是比喻很忙/ I was juggling too many things at the <u>same time</u> (同时照顾很多事情) / I was <u>swamped with all the work</u> (被工作吞 <u>没</u>). <u>The thing is</u>(问题是), this laptop was quite old, and I could tell it was <u>struggling to keep up with my workload(有点挣扎着,跟不上我的工作量)</u>. It would <u>freeze(僵住)</u> for a second or two and then go back to normal. <u>Looking back(现在看来)</u>, that was definitely <u>a warning sign(危险提示)</u>, but I just ignored it. I wasn't great at <u>backing up my data(备份数据)</u> regularly, so I just <u>kept pushing forward/carried on</u>.

Then, one day, I saw that <u>infamous</u> <u>blue error screen(臭名昭著的蓝屏)</u>, and <u>before I knew it(还没反应过来呢)</u>, the laptop <u>shut down in the blink of</u> <u>an eye(一眨眼功夫)</u>. I didn't even have a chance to save anything. I'm not exactly sure what caused it, maybe <u>overheating</u> or the CPU <u>being</u> <u>overworked</u> with all the apps I was running. <u>Bottom line(不管怎样,最终结</u> <u>果是)</u>, my laptop <u>died</u>, <u>at the age of 10(</u>我的电脑死掉了,"享年十岁"开玩笑 的语气).

Since I didn't <u>have an extended warranty</u>, I had to take it to a local computer store. They managed to <u>save</u> it and <u>recover</u> some of my data (救活了,还原了一部分数据), but not all of it. That whole experience <u>taught</u> <u>me a valuable lesson/ was a lesson to learn(给我上了一课)</u>: always <u>back</u> <u>up your data</u>!

Part3:

1. Why do people often have problems when using new products? There's always a learning curve(有学习曲线,表示对新事物不熟悉带来的学习过程,固定表达) when it comes to using new products, <u>particularly in the</u> realm of technology(尤其是科技产品). New products often <u>come with(自</u>带) their unique <u>operating systems</u> and <u>interfaces(操作系统和互动界面)</u>, so it's natural for people to need some time to become familiar with them. It usually involves a <u>learning process</u>(学习过程).(原因)

2. How do people use digital devices to help them with their studies? Students use digital tools such as <u>laptops, smartphones, tablets and E-readers</u> to get online, research, and get information. They can use <u>note-taking apps</u>(做笔记的 app) to effectively study and take notes on their <u>study devices(学习设备)</u>, and also share notes after classes or group meetings. Some students take their e-readers instead of <u>carrying several heavy textbooks</u>. Some students go to webinars and take online courses to acquire knowledge online. (分群体)

3. Do people spend too much time looking at digital screens? Why?

Yes, we are spending <u>way too much time (太多时间了)</u> on our screens. We use our smartphones, computers, and other devices for work, entertainment, and communication. Most of us <u>are addicted to (成瘾)</u> our screens, our laptop screen, tablet screen, smartphone screen, and fitness band screen (健康手环的屏幕), ...there're so many screens to look at nowadays. To be honest, sometimes I don't even know where to look at if I don't have a screen in front of me. It's like my eyes don't know how to function without a screen. Too much screen time is definitely harmful to our eyes and vision. People's vision is getting worse and worse, and we all have eye strain (眼睛酸痛). (原因, 细节)

4. Do you think that parents should limit the time that their children spend using mobile phones?

Yes, for sure. Like I said, too much screen time can definitely cause <u>eye</u> <u>strain</u>, but that's not everything. When children spend too much time on their phones, they stop caring and paying attention to the real world (不 再关心真实世界). They don't care about the weather, nature, beautiful views, sunshine, rainbow, the laughter on their friend's face... they want to experience everything through their mobile phones, which is so bad for their personal development. (原因,反向假设)

5. What do people do with mobile phones?

You can do literally <u>anything and everything (任何事、所有事)</u> on your mobile phone nowadays. For communication, you can use your phone to make calls or video calls to <u>stay in touch with (保持联系)</u> friends, family or colleagues. You can use the texting and messaging function like on app like, WeChat or WhatsApp to text, share photos or send voice messages. People use mobile phones to <u>get online (上网)</u>, <u>browse websites</u>, <u>check</u> <u>emails</u> and <u>access social media platforms</u>. Speaking of <u>social media</u>, I feel like most of us mainly use mobile phone to <u>scroll through social media</u> <u>(在社交媒体上刷来刷去)</u>, like WeChat, Facebook, Instagram, TikTok or Little Red Book (which is really popular in China). What else, you can go online shopping, you can pay your bills, you can get entertained with your mobile phone nowadays. <u>The list goes on (能做的事情说都说不完)</u>! (罗列)

6. What do you think of people who are addicted to playing computers?

<u>The way I see it (在我看来)</u>, addiction to computer games is just like any other addictions, such as addiction to alcohol, to drugs. It's a <u>serious</u> <u>mental and physical disease (严重的生理、心理疾病)</u> that requires professional guidance and help. <u>Having sympathy and empathy (有同情</u> 心、共情心) towards these people is very important. Family and friends' support <u>plays a huge role in</u> helping them <u>combat the addition (战胜瘾</u> <u>头)</u>. In my opinion, the last thing we should do is <u>resenting those people</u> (最不该做的事情就是厌恶这些人), looking down on them (瞧不起他们), and making them feel belittled and abandoned (让他们感到渺小和被抛弃). (原 因)

I didn't really want to socialize with people, just eating my dinner and <u>letting my hair down(放松)</u>. Oh, but <u>at the end</u>, I still had to <u>give a toast(祝酒、发言)</u> to the couple. So, I didn't rest completely <u>after all</u>.

Anyway, it was 2am when I arrived home, and I <u>could barely keep my eyes</u> <u>open</u> as I was totally <u>spent</u>. Thank you!

Part3:

1. Does studying and learning make people tired today?

<u>It's hard to say really(不好说,真的)</u>. <u>On one hand</u>, I feel that studying and learning things today can actually be <u>less tiring</u> than before as <u>we have</u> <u>much easier access to</u> information these days(如今获取信息的渠道方便多

<u>了</u>). It is so much easier for us to <u>tap into/access/get knowledge(获得知</u> <u>识</u>) <u>through the internet</u>. <u>Whereas in the past</u>, the ways to learn things were to <u>go to a physical school</u> or <u>go to the library</u>. But <u>on the other hand</u>, studying and learning nowadays can be pretty exhausting in <u>this fastpaced world (这个快节奏世界)</u>. With <u>tight schedules (满满当当的日程)</u> and the <u>mindset</u> of this <u>never-ending grind (永不停止的内卷意识)</u>, people constantly <u>feel the pressure</u> to keep learning things. People are afraid of <u>taking a pause (暂停一下)</u> and then <u>being left behind (被落下)</u>. So, I think this mentality itself is <u>mentally draining</u> (令人精神内耗的). (分头讨论。如果 不冲高分,可以只说其中一个观点)

2. When do people usually feel tired?

Well, there are several situations where people tend to feel tired. <u>First</u> thing comes to mind, after a busy day of <u>running errands</u>(跑杂活儿) or <u>doing a lot of tasks</u>(完成很多任务), people normally feel <u>physically and</u> <u>mentally drained</u>(生理、精神消耗枯竭), like the wedding story I've just shared with you. <u>And also</u>, after a long day at work people sometimes feel <u>wiped out</u>. Jobs <u>with heavy workload</u>(工作量大) can <u>lead to fatigue</u>(导致

<u>劳累</u>). And next, <u>physical activities</u> can <u>lead to exhaustion/tiredness(导致</u> <u>劳累</u>), especially after an <u>intense/strenuous workout(剧烈、费力的锻炼)</u>. And then, <u>a lack of quality sleep(高质量睡眠缺失)</u> can <u>result in tiredness</u>. <u>What else</u>, oh yeah, if you're sick and you're <u>recovering from the illness</u>, <u>chances are(很有可能)</u> you will feel very fatigue because your body is <u>working on healing itself</u>. I remember when I was 25 years old, I had <u>chicken pox(水痘)</u>. And after that I was feeling tired constantly for 3 months.(并列罗列,举例子,注意以上不用都说)

3. What do you think about striving for learning and striving for sports? The way I see it, striving for learning and for sports are both essential in life. In terms of learning, it's a lifelong journey(一辈子的率旅程,活到老学到老 的意思) that can <u>open our horizons, broaden our minds</u> and <u>become a</u> better version of ourselves (成为更好的自己). And it's also a great way to open up more opportunities (开拓更多机遇) in life, and to stay adaptable and relevant in this ever-changing world(在这个不断变化的世界里保持适应能 力和重要性). And <u>regarding</u> doing sports, it's also crucial. Sports can balance our moods(平衡我们的情绪). Doing sports promotes physical <u>fitness</u> and mental well-being(生理和精神健康). It teaches us teamwork, discipline and perseverance(教给我们团队合作、自律和坚韧). I think a healthy and wholesome(人格健全的) person should be mentally and spiritually strong and also physically fit. So, you can see them as two things that complement each other(你可以把它们视为相辅相成的两件事) to shape a person into a well-rounded(全面发展的) and happy human being. (分类讨论)

4. Do people have fewer holidays now than in the past? Uhmmm, it's a bit of a <u>mixed bag(复杂的局面,不好说)</u>, I would say. <u>On</u> <u>one hand/ in some ways, it seems to me that(我感觉是这样的)</u> people

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have fewer holidays now than before due to <u>the fast-paced modern</u> <u>lifestyle(快节奏的当代生活)</u>they have. Many people <u>find themselves</u> <u>caught up in the rat race(意识到自己被卷入了激烈的竞争)</u>. For then, <u>the</u> <u>grind never stops(内卷自卷永不停止)</u>, which makes it difficult to take breaks, to enjoy holidays. <u>On the other hand, / But in other ways</u>, some people nowadays have more flexibility with <u>working hours</u>, especially those <u>digital nomads(数字游牧者。指的是线上工作者)</u>. Some can even be <u>fortunate enough/ lucky enough(足够幸运)</u> to have the option to <u>work</u> <u>remotely(远程工作)</u>. Whether it's <u>working from home</u>, or <u>working during</u> <u>traveling</u>. They have much more freedom. This allows some people have more <u>short breaks</u>(短假期) throughout the year. So, it's really hard to say.(分头讨论。如果不冲高分,可以只说其中一个观点)

5. What are the differences between feeling tired after studying and after exercising?

I guess after <u>studying long hours</u>, people mainly <u>feel drained mentally</u>. Whereas when it comes to <u>working out</u>, people <u>feel physically exhausted</u> <u>afterwards</u>. That's the major difference. (对比讨论)

6. How can people solve the problem that old people easily get tired? <u>First of all</u>, I think it's completely normal for people's <u>stamina</u>/ <u>energy</u> <u>level (精力、能量水平) starts to decline (开始下降)</u> when they get older. Most people will just <u>use their phones(用手机)</u>, <u>scrolling through social</u> <u>media(刷社交媒体)</u>, <u>reading news</u>, <u>playing mobile games</u>, <u>checking their</u> <u>emails</u>, or <u>calling a friend of family</u>. Some people have the habit of reading books or eBooks while waiting. Some people, like me, love listening to the radio or podcasts. Some people just <u>space out(发呆)</u>, watching people walk by, <u>daydreaming(做白日梦)</u>, <u>letting their mind wander(让思想神</u> <u>游)</u>, or not thinking about anything. Some people even <u>meditate(冥想)</u> while waiting.(分群体)

3. Are most people patient while waiting?

No, I don't think so. I think most people feel <u>restless, impatient, irritated</u> <u>and fussy(不安的、不耐烦的、易怒的和焦躁的)</u> while waiting as they often see it as <u>a waste of time and energy</u>. They're not accomplishing anything productive or meaningful during the wait. Perhaps only a few people can manage to <u>control their grumpiness(管理自己的暴躁脾气)</u> as they see it as opportunity to <u>foster patience(培养耐心)</u> and <u>tackle some simple tasks</u> <u>and chores(处理一些简单琐事)</u>.(主流情况,特殊情况补充)

4. Do you like to wait for a long time? Why?

5. Why do most children have difficulties waiting for a long time? Kids are <u>the worst</u> when it comes to patience(最没有耐心). They are super <u>energetic</u>, impulsive and curious(高能量的、冲动的、好奇的). They feel bored easily(很容易感到无聊). For them, waiting is <u>like a nightmare</u> (一场噩梦). I watched this video once about some kids' experiment. It was really funny. In the video, a mom gives her two young kids some candies, telling them that they can't eat those candies until she comes back. And if they wait long enough until she comes back, they can get more candies. And as you can imagine, once the mom leaves, it takes those two kids probably 3 seconds to start eating the candy. That's how bad they are at controlling themselves. Kids don't have the concept of <u>self-discipline or patience(自律或耐心)</u>. (原因,举例子)

6. Do people queue consciously while waiting for the subway train? I would say, generally speaking, people have the <u>awareness and decency</u> <u>(意识和素质)</u> to <u>line up (排队)</u> at the platform while waiting for the subway train to come. Some platforms are with <u>clearly marked lines (清晰</u> <u>的标记线)</u> to help <u>ensure the order (帮助维持秩序)</u>. However, in some very crowded situations, especially <u>during rush hours</u>, people can be less organized sometimes. (主流情况,特殊情况补充)

I really <u>loved every second it</u>, and <u>on top of that</u>, I <u>felt incredibly proud of</u> <u>myself</u> as I finally had an opportunity to <u>give back to my mom(回报我的妈</u> <u>妈)</u> and telling her how much I love her. She's the best mom in the world. So yeh, that was the party. Thank you!

1. Why do people like parties?

<u>In social settings</u>(在社交场合中), like a party, a gathering or a gettogether, people can connect with <u>family and friends</u> and even <u>new</u> <u>people(结识新人)</u>. Is a chance to <u>bond with people(增进纽带)</u> and <u>build</u> <u>relationships</u>. People need people. Most of us feel happy when we are in a bigger group. And then, parties are fun! At a party you can have food and drinks, games and music. People dance, laugh and talk. <u>There's a lot</u> going on (有很多事情发生). It's entertaining and relaxing. (罗列原因)

2. Why do some people not like going to parties?

Some people are not <u>party people</u> at all. They are more of "a loner" or prefer to <u>hang out one-on-one(一对一见面)</u> with people. For them, talking to a lot of people at the same time, <u>reading the room(察言观色)</u>, trying to <u>please the crowd(讨好人群)</u> is <u>mentally draining</u>. Some of them even feel mentally and physically <u>wiped out(累爆了)</u> after a party. Therefore, they prefer to stay at home and <u>enjoy solitude(享受独处)</u>; or see a couple of friends <u>at a time(一次见一两个朋友)</u>.(原因)

3. Do you think those who tend to stay at home are less healthy than those who often attend parties?

Generally speaking, no. I think, whether you choose to stay at home and be a true <u>homebody</u>(宅男宅女), or go to parties all the time and be a <u>party animal</u>(派对狂人), it's <u>up to you</u>(取决于你). It's completely your <u>personal choice</u>. But I would say <u>there's moderation in all things</u>/ <u>balance</u> is key in all things (凡事要适度). You can't stay at home and be alone forever, just like you can't go to the party every day and <u>never stop for a second</u> to <u>spend time alone nurturing your soul</u>(从不停下来一秒钟去滋养你 的灵魂). (主流情况,特殊情况补充)

4. Do you think music and dancing are a must at a party?

If it's a party, yes, I would say so. Music and dancing are <u>a must</u>(一定要有的 东西), and drinks too. I love dancing, drinking and talking while <u>listening</u> <u>to the music</u> at a party. It really <u>lightens up the mood(点亮情绪)</u>. But if it's just a peaceful and tranquil small <u>get-together</u>(小型聚会), I don't necessarily have to dance. I'll just have a nice conversation with my friends. BUT I would still say, I need my music! Otherwise, what's the difference between a party and a meeting? Right?! (分情况讨论,反向假 设)

5. What would you do if you were disturbed by a neighbor's party? Firstly, I will always try to communicate nicely with my neighbor, asking them to <u>dial down(状态下来一点,下调一点)</u> a little bit. But if they ignore me and <u>continue the craziness(继续他们的疯狂)</u>, I might get crazy myself and <u>call the police(报警)</u> eventually.(罗列)

6. What are the differences between holding a party at home and in a public place?

Well <u>based on my experience</u>, I would say hosting a party at home and in the public place both have their <u>pros and cons</u>(优缺点). <u>Number one</u>, <u>in</u> <u>terms of privacy</u>, parties at home are often more private and <u>it feels more</u> <u>intimate</u>(感觉更私密). Whereas when <u>hosting a party in a public place</u>, you can invite more guests, some people might even bring their friends, so you end up seeing a lot of people even strangers. And then, <u>in terms of</u> <u>cost</u>, <u>renting a public venue</u>(租一个场地) for sure is more expensive than

doing it at home. Home parties are more <u>budget-friendly(预算友好型)</u>. And then, space is another difference. Public places offer more space for larger gatherings, while homes normally have more <u>limited space</u>. One thing I would say is that, hosting a party in a public place is more <u>carefree</u> <u>(不惜要操心的)</u>. You can have someone who decorate the whole place for

you, <u>provide catering service(提供餐饮服务)</u> and later <u>clean up</u> for you,

and you don't need to worry about people <u>wrecking things(打碎东西);</u>

whereas at home you have to do a lot of things by yourself, not to mention, you will be worrying about people breaking your stuff. For example, I had a big party at home a while ago, and I was all the time worrying about my guests breaking my furniture and <u>home appliances</u> when they <u>got tipsy(微醺了)</u> and started playing football in my living room. Haha! That was a terrifying experience. (分角度类别讨论)

Part3:

1. What kinds of activities do young people like to do?

Oh wow, that's such <u>a broad/general question(很宽泛的问题)</u> as young people these days like to do all kinds of activities. It's all about their personal preferences. Some are into <u>outdoor physical activities</u>, such as, hiking, biking, running, mountain climbing; Some are more <u>into indoor</u> <u>sports</u>, like, playing basketball, badminton, swimming; some young people are <u>technology freaks(科技迷), gamer(游戏玩家), they play video</u> <u>games</u> all day long without living their rooms; some young people love socializing with friends, going to parties, going to bars, just hanging out; there're also young people who are artistic, they go to museums, art show, movie festivals. It's really hard to generalize. (分群体讨论)

2. Why do some young people like adventurous activities?

It's <u>this passion for newness(对这份新鲜事物的热情)</u>, for experiencing something different, for <u>getting away from the routine life(从作息生活中抽</u> <u>离出来)</u>, that excites young people. Many of us are <u>stuck in our 9-to-5 jobs</u> <u>and routine life(被困在我们朝九晚五的工作和作息生活)</u>, so sometimes having the opportunity to experience something new and unique is like <u>an</u> <u>exciting escape from life(一份令人兴奋的生活大逃离)</u>, and can help us <u>create lifelong memories(制造一辈子的记忆)</u>. Those moments are like the <u>highlights(高光)</u> in our lives. (原因)

3. Do you think old people would like to have changes?

Many people <u>hold a stereotype(有传统偏见)</u> that older individuals are <u>inactive(不够积极)</u>, conservative, boring, and <u>unwilling to change</u>, and I used to <u>hold that stereotype</u> as well. However, from my observations in recent years, many older people also appreciate change in their lives. This is often because they are retired and <u>looking for new stimulation(寻找新</u> <u>鲜刺激)</u>. For example, I've seen many seniors <u>travel to different places</u> <u>every year</u>/ become avid travelers(积极的旅行者). They also explore new

hobbies and adapt to changes in technology to <u>stay connected with the</u> <u>world</u>. So, I believe that older people can also enjoy change, and it's more about personal differences. (主流观点,自己观点补充)

4. Why can exciting activities relieve people's stress?

When we <u>take part in (参与)</u> exciting and thrilling sports, adventures, our brains release <u>endorphins (内啡肽)</u>, which is a <u>mood booster (情绪提升</u><u>器)</u>. And also some of these activities can trigger <u>an adrenaline rush (肾上</u><u>腺飙升)</u> which can also provide <u>a sense of excitement and joy</u>, and allows us to relax and recharge. And plus, after accomplishing these activities, we also experience <u>a sense of accomplishment and satisfaction</u>, which can <u>boost our confidence and self-esteem (激发自信和自我价值感)</u> and reduce anxiety level (降低焦虑水平). (原因,补充)

5. Can you give some other examples of adventurers or risky activities? Sure! Off the top of my head, <u>bungee jumping (蹦极)</u>. Basically, you need to jump off a tall building or a bridge or a cliff with a <u>bungee cord (蹦极绳</u> <u>子)</u> attached to your body. That sounds really scary! It that's the kind of activity that I've always wanted to try but never dared to try. And similarly, <u>skydiving (高空跳伞)</u>, that's even crazier! Basically, you need to jump off an aircraft with a <u>parachute</u> (跳伞伞包). I'm just all the time worrying what if the parachute doesn't open. Haha! And, what else, <u>paragliding (滑翔)</u>, that's another crazy one! Flying and soaring through the sky. Those <u>extreme sports (极限运动)</u> are for those <u>daredevils (冒险 鬼)</u>. (列举, 举例子)

6. What skills do people need to take part in adventurous activities?

Generally speaking, people need both physical and mental skills to engage in adventurous activities. Regarding physical skills, having enough <u>physical endurance and strength(生理体能和耐力)</u> is crucial. Additionally, <u>possessing technical skills and basic knowledge(专业技巧和</u> 基础知识) related to the specific activity is also essential. For example, knowing how to <u>open a parachute(打开降落伞)</u> and understanding how to paraglide safely are both critical. <u>In terms of</u> mental skills, you need the ability to <u>stay calm</u> in <u>risky situations</u>, stay focused to make decisions, and <u>solve problems effectively</u>. Therefore, <u>problem-solving skills(解决问题</u> <u>的能力)</u>, <u>decision-making skills(做决定的能力)</u>, and <u>risk assessment skills</u> (风险评估能力) are all essential.(分角度讨论)

So, today I want to share with you not a specific task, but more of general task I completed <u>during my university years</u>, which is "studying hard and improving my grades"(好好学习,提升成绩). Trust me, it <u>wasn't an easy</u> task(不容易) in the beginning.

<u>The story was(故事是这样的)</u>, when I was a university student, I entered my first year <u>with high hopes(期待很高)</u> and <u>a bit of arrogance(带着一点</u> <u>点傲慢)</u>(目前在校大学生则要改成,I'm now a third-year university student, and when I entered my first year, I really had high hopes and a bit of arrogance). In high school, I had been a bit of a <u>study freak(学习狂)</u>, always <u>hitting the books(疯狂看书)</u>, <u>acing exams(碾压考试)</u>, and hardly ever letting myself <u>have fun</u>.

So, when I <u>arrived on campus(走进大学校园后)</u>, I decided it was time to <u>let</u> <u>loose(放松)</u> and <u>have fun(享乐)</u>. And <u>oh boy, did I party hard(我了的</u> <u>天,我玩儿的可疯了。反问句)?</u>... My first year was like <u>a never-ending party</u> <u>(永不结束的派对)</u>. I became a <u>party animal(派对狂人)</u>, going out almost every night and making new friends.

Then, of course, I didn't study at all. I didn't even <u>show up for classes(不去</u> <u>上课)/ go to class</u>. My parents and good friends were concerned and <u>gave me some tough</u> love(给我严厉的爱). They reminded me that I had come to university for a future, not just for parties. Their words <u>hit me hard(击中我的心),</u> and I realized I needed to <u>make some changes</u> and <u>turn that situation around</u> (扭转局势). (语速慢可以不提家人朋友的部分)

I started by getting organized. I <u>created a study plan</u> and <u>stuck to it</u> <u>religiously(虔诚地执行计划)</u>. I got help from professors and tutors when I didn't understand something. I also <u>surrounded myself with</u> friends who were serious about their studies(让自己和爱学习的朋友为伍). For me, it was like a project, a <u>"getting-back-on-track" project(回到正轨工程)</u>.

<u>Slowly but surely(慢慢地稳稳地)</u>, my grades improved. There were moments when I wanted to give up, but I kept reminding myself of my goals and <u>kept pushing forward</u>. I <u>gave 100%</u>, <u>my blood</u>, <u>sweat and tears</u>

<u>(全力以赴)</u>. <u>By the end of my second year</u>, my grades were <u>back on</u> <u>track</u>. I made it!!

Looking back, I'm very proud of myself. <u>Where there's a will, there's a way</u> (有志者事竟成). Thank you!

Part3:

1. What are the things that make people feel proud of? To be honest, people feel proud of <u>various things and achievements</u>. For example, <u>academic accomplishments</u> (学术成就) : <u>getting high grades</u> (考 高分), <u>completing challenging projects</u>; or <u>career successes</u> (职业成就), like, <u>getting a promotion</u> (被提拔) or a <u>pay rise</u> (被加薪); or achieving <u>personal goals</u> (个人目标), such as, <u>getting married</u>, <u>having a happy</u> <u>marriage</u>, <u>having a healthy and outstanding child</u>; Or it could be much smaller things, like <u>losing weight</u> (减肥), <u>cutting off sugar</u> (戒糖), <u>quitting smoking</u> (戒烟). There're so many reasons to feel happy and proud of yourself, and to <u>celebrate YOU</u> (庆祝你自己). It could be as big as life <u>milestones(人生里程碑)</u>, or it could be as small as little accomplishment in <u>daily life</u>.(分类别讨论,举例子)

2. Do people often feel proud of themselves when they complete a difficult task?

Yes, for many people, when they accomplish a very difficult task, they experience <u>euphoria</u>(狂喜). It's <u>a strong sense of achievement</u>(成就感).

It really can boost a person's self-esteem and confidence (激增一个人的自我

价值感和自信). Take myself for example, several years ago, I tried to lose

<u>some weig</u>ht. It was very difficult and I <u>almost gave up halfway(半路差点</u>

<u>放弃)</u>, but I stuck to my plan and eventually successfully lost 10 pounds. I still remember how proud I felt in that moment. And I still use that example to encourage myself when I need to <u>tackle difficult tasks</u> today.

3. What challenges do young people face today?

As a young person, I have to say, challenges and stress are from everywhere. When we are at school, we face <u>academic pressure</u> all the time. And after we graduate from school, there's the <u>ever-increasing</u> <u>competition for jobs (空前绝后的就业压力)</u>. In China, we say, <u>the grind</u> <u>never stops (内卷永不停止)</u>. Sometimes it feels like we're <u>stuck in a rat</u> <u>race (也是内卷的一种表达)</u>. That's why many of us have <u>mental health</u> <u>issues</u> like stress, anxiety and even depression. (分情况)

4. How do young people handle difficult or challenging tasks?

Some young people are <u>very positive and motivated</u> in front of <u>difficult or challenging tasks</u>. They may <u>seek help and guidance</u> from their teachers, peers or parents. Or using their <u>problem-solving skills</u>, <u>planning skills</u> and <u>time-management</u> skills to <u>break down(拆分)</u> the task into smaller and <u>more manageable steps(更小更好管理的小任务)</u>. Whereas some other young people might get really <u>anxious and directionless(慌张也没方向感)</u>

and then <u>give up on the task</u>. The <u>mentality(意识形态)</u> is very important here. <u>Perseverance goes a long way(坚韧是最好的解决之道).(分群体)</u>

5. What kinds of rewards do people receive from work?

People get <u>extrinsic and intrinsic rewards(外在和内在的奖励)</u> at work. In terms of <u>extrinsic rewards</u>, <u>monetary compensation(金钱形式的犒劳)</u> like <u>salary(工资)</u>, <u>bonuses(奖金)</u>, <u>benefits(福利)</u> such as <u>health care(医</u> <u>保)</u> and <u>pension plans(养老金)</u>. What else, big promotions and awards. Those are the things that can motivate people <u>in the workplace</u>. And <u>when it comes to intrinsic rewards(内在)</u>, people <u>gain a sense of</u> <u>accomplishment</u> <u>and personal growth(成就感和个人成长感)</u>, and also enjoy <u>the feeling of making a meaningful impact(享受制造有意义的影响力)</u>, Those are what keep people motivated at work.(分类别讨论)

6. What are the most difficult jobs that people do?

I think many jobs are very difficult. That's why I can't really <u>single out</u>(专 <u>门选一个</u>) the most difficult Job. I guess jobs <u>in medical industry</u>(医疗行 <u>业</u>), such as <u>surgeons and nurse</u>s(外科大夫和护士), they need to <u>work</u> <u>long hours</u> and <u>in shifts</u>(轮班制), and sometimes they don't get to sleep. The amount of work and responsibility can be very <u>overwhelming at</u> <u>times</u>(有时候会很令人窒息). And then, <u>police officers</u>, <u>firefighters</u>. They are often working <u>under high pressure</u> and they're <u>facing danger</u> all the time. Which is very difficult especially for their families. <u>And also</u>, in some situations, whether it's difficult or not also <u>highly relying on</u> a person's interest. If a person is not interested in their job at all, then anything could become the most difficult task in their mind. It's also about the mentality. (罗列, 补充)

I felt like I had <u>wasted an entire</u> <u>year of my life</u>.

I had a long conversation with my parents. And that conversation changed my life. My parents <u>sat me down</u>(让我坐下) and <u>gave me some</u>

<u>tough love(给我严厉的爱)</u>. They reminded me that I had come to university for an education and a bright future, not just for fun. I <u>opened</u> <u>up to them(向他们坦白)</u> about where my mind was and how I felt honestly, my fear and confusion, thing like that. We talked <u>wholeheartedly(全心全意地)</u> for hours and hours. Their words <u>hit me hard</u> <u>(击中我的心), and I realized I needed to make some changes and turn</u> that situation around(扭转局势).

I started by getting organized. I <u>created a study plan</u> and <u>stuck to it</u> <u>religiously(虔诚地执行计划)</u>. I got help from professors and tutors when I didn't understand something. I also <u>surrounded myself with</u> friends who were serious about their studies(让自己和爱学习的朋友为伍). For me, it was like a project, a "getting-back-on-track" project(回到正轨工程).

Who can adapt better to changes, children or adults? I've heard so many people say that children are better at adapting to change. Children <u>have less baggage(思想精神包袱更少)</u> and they are <u>naturally curious(天生好奇心强)</u> and <u>willing to learn</u>. But <u>it's not</u> <u>necessarily true(不一定对)</u>. The way I see it, children are not afraid of change but they are not necessarily better at adapting to change than adults(他们只是不怕,并不代表更擅长). <u>In fact</u>, some adults have more <u>life</u> <u>experience</u> and <u>coping strategies(处理问题的策略)</u> which can help them <u>strategically</u> adapt to new situations more effectively sometimes.(主流观 点,自己观点)

I felt terrible about the experience. Not just me, my parents as well. We <u>felt ignored, belittled and mistreated(感到被忽视、轻视和错误对待)</u>. It should be a happy and special day. But everything was ruined by one bad server. I guess, not everyone can be a server.

1. How do most people respond to bad services?

1 think most people <u>dislike confrontation</u> initially(一开始都不喜欢对峙的感 觉), so they often try to <u>tolerate/ put up with(宽容、忍受)</u> the bad service for a while to see if it gets better or worse. If the bad service continues or even gets worse, many people will complain directly to the server. If the server remains indifferent(保持漠不关心状态), they might <u>make a formal complaint with</u> the manager(和经理进行正式投诉), whether it's in person, over the phone, via email, or through social media channels. After that, they may <u>spread the information(散播信息)</u> to people around them and consider <u>boycotting(联合抵制)</u> the <u>service provider</u>. (假设)

2. Do you think services are better now than in the past?

<u>I'm under the impression that (我的感觉是,印象中是这样的)</u>, in general, services nowadays are better compared to the past. The <u>service industry</u> (服务行业) has become increasingly <u>competitive</u>(竞争激烈的). <u>The grind</u> <u>never stops</u>(内卷永不停止); it's like <u>a constant rat race</u>(不间断的老鼠赛跑, 也是内卷的意思). Many businesses are <u>working hard/striving</u>(努力争取) to provide the best customer experiences to <u>maintain customer loyalty</u>(维持 顾客忠诚度). However, of course, there are still some service providers that are not <u>keeping up with the latest trends</u>(跟不上趋势), such as the restaurant I just mentioned. (主流情况,特殊情况补充)

3. What kind of services are bad services?

I think bad services can <u>come in different forms(以不同的形式出现)</u> but generally speaking, it's the kind of service that <u>makes customers feel</u> frustrated, angry, ignored or even belittled(让顾客感到着急、生气、被忽视、 被鄙视); the kind of service that <u>doesn't make customers feel seen or</u> <u>heard</u>(让顾客感到没有被看到、听到); the kind of service that doesn't <u>meet</u> <u>customers' standards or expectations(不能符合顾客的期待和标准)</u>. For instance, being indifferent(冷漠), arrogant(傲慢), rude(粗鲁) and <u>unhelpful(无用); zero attentive</u> or <u>responsive(一点都不殷勤、有回应的);</u> in some cases, if the service provider is expected to provide a lot of knowledge and information but fail to do it, it's also really terrible and disappointing service.(举例子)

4. Why do some people choose to remain silent when they receive bad services?

Well like I said, some people really dislike confrontation. They prefer to <u>avoid making a scene</u> in public (避免在公共场合大吵大闹,惹人注意). That's why they don't easily <u>make a fuss (大惊小怪)</u> about bad services. And there are some other people who just simply don't believe that their complaints would <u>make any difference (会有任何作用)</u>. <u>It's not worth their time or energy (不值当花自己的时间或精力)</u> to make a complaint. They're a bit pessimistic (悲观主义), to be honest. (分群体)

5. Who should be responsible for bad services?

<u>Without a doubt(毫无疑问)</u>, the main responsibility goes to the service provider. They are the ones that provide services and build connections with their customers and clients. However, <u>that being said</u>, <u>the way I see it</u>, clients and customers also should actively provide <u>constructive</u> <u>feedback(有建设性的反馈)</u> to help businesses <u>grow</u> and <u>provide better</u> <u>services</u>. <u>It always takes two to tango</u>(一个巴掌拍不响).(反向思考)

6. What can employers do to improve the service that their employees provide?

First of all, employers can equip employees with the necessary knowledge and skills(给员工配备必要的知识和技能) through well-designed training programs(通过精心设计的培训项目). And then, they need to provide constructive feedback(提供建设性反馈) to help employees understand what they've done right or wrong, and where they can improve, things like that. And moreover, creating a positive working environment(创造积极的工作环境) is also essential in terms of keeping employees feel motivated and encouraged. It teaches us how things work, why do they work that way, and it also fosters <u>problem-solving</u> skills and <u>critical thinking</u> skills, which are very crucial skills in a child's development. 5. How do you get to know about scientific news?



Ok, today I want to talk about a photo I took three years ago. And each time when I look at it, I feel happy and proud.

It's a <u>selfie(自拍)</u> I took with a <u>tripod</u>(三脚架) when I was traveling alone in Southern China. <u>So the story was</u>, three years ago, I was brave enough to <u>take a solo trip(独自旅行)</u> to the south of China at the age of 19. I went to Yunnan province, and I visited Kun Ming, Da Li, Shangri-la, and Li jiang. 1. Do you think people are taking too many photos these days? I would say, these days, many people, especially younger people, <u>tend to</u> <u>(往往)</u> take <u>an abundance of photos(大量照片)</u>, and sometimes it could be a little <u>over the top(过分、夸张)</u>. <u>Don't take me wrong(别误会我)</u>. <u>I'm</u> <u>not saying that(我并没有说)</u> people shouldn't take photos at all. Taking photos is actually <u>a great way to document our lives(很好的记录生活的方</u> <u>式)</u> so that later we can go back and <u>relive/ revisit/ recall those moments</u> <u>(重新回顾美好时刻)</u>. But <u>there's moderation in everything(凡事都有个度)</u>, right? Some people are obsessed with the idea of taking photos <u>to the</u> <u>point that(以至于)</u> they <u>stop paying attention to the real world(不再关心</u> <u>真实世界)</u>. They <u>live their lives through camera lenses(通过镜头来生活)</u>. And that's why I said it's <u>over the top</u>.(主流现象,自己观点,反向思考)

2. What kinds of photos do people like to take?

People have very different tastes and interests <u>when it comes to</u> photography. Some <u>foodies</u>(吃货) are into taking a lot of <u>food photos</u>. Some love <u>taking selfies</u>(自拍) to <u>capture special personal moments</u>. Some <u>nature lovers</u>(大自然爱好者) would take photos of <u>beautiful natural</u> <u>landscapes and sceneries</u>(美丽的自然美景). And some people like to photograph <u>special events and moments</u>, like, weddings, birthdays, anniversaries, special activities. The types of photos people take can definitely <u>reflect their focus and interests in life</u>(反应他们在生活中的爱好和重 心). (分群体讨论)

3. Do you think people take more photos now than in the past? Yes, definitely. The first reason <u>is due to the fact</u> that we all have <u>smartphones with really high-quality cameras (带高质量摄像头的智能手机)</u> today which makes taking photos much easier than before. I mean, even my 5-year-old nephew can take photos for us nowadays. So, you don't have to be <u>tech-savvy/ tech guru</u> (科技大人) to know photography. And then, <u>the prevalence of social media (自媒体的盛行)</u> also contributes a lot. <u>The fact that</u> people can share their lives with their friends and family definitely has encouraged them to take photos more often. (罗列原因)

4. Do you think equipment is important for photography?

Depends on what you want. If you want really <u>professional and award-</u><u>winner level of photos (专业的、获奖级别的照片)</u>, then probably yes, equipment <u>plays a massive role (发挥重要作用)</u> here. But if it's just for <u>capturing the moment (捕捉时刻)</u>, <u>documenting your daily life (记录日常生</u> <u>活)</u>, and <u>holding on to the memory (抓住回忆)</u>, I think a smartphone is <u>more than enough (足足够了,比足够都多)</u>. It's <u>easy to use (好用), light-</u> <u>weight (轻便)</u>, it's always in your bag or pocket. And later it's so much easier to share the photos <u>on social media</u>. (分情况讨论)

5. Do you think being a professional photographer is a good job? Why? I know that it's a very <u>competitive industry/field</u> (竞争很激烈的行业). So, it really depends on <u>how good you are (看你技术好不好)</u> and <u>how much time</u> <u>and effort you dedicate in your career (花不花时间和精力).</u> If you are a successful and popular photographer, <u>chances are (很有可能)</u> you will <u>make good money (挣很多钱)</u> and meanwhile <u>have a lot of fun creating</u> <u>art, making impacts on people's lives (同时还能创造艺术享受乐趣, 给他人的生</u> <u>活来去影响力)</u>. It could be a really <u>lucrative and fulfilling job (很能有利可图又</u> <u>有充实意义的工作)</u>, But if you are "nobody" (谁也不是), and just get <u>random businesses here and there, now and then (今儿或明儿, 不是在这儿</u> <u>就是在哪儿, 小打小闹随机有些生意)</u>, then the income won't be good and stable enough. (分情况)

6. Why do some people like to post their photos on social media? Some people enjoy <u>posting their photos, videos and words</u> on social media because it allows them to <u>share their lives with their family and</u> <u>friends</u>. Some people want to build a <u>personal brand (个人品牌)</u> online and maybe become <u>an online</u> <u>celebrity/influencer (在线名媛、网红)</u> and potentially <u>get sponsorship (获</u> <u>得赞助)</u>. They start their brand by sharing and telling their stories on social media. And some people just want to <u>show off (炫耀)</u> what they have and what they do in life, which I would say, <u>is the worst reason to</u> <u>get on social media (最不该上自媒体的原因)</u>. It won't make them happy long-term. <u>The void in their hollow souls will only get bigger and bigger</u> <u>(他们空洞的灵魂上的洞只会越变越大)</u>. (分群体)

Today I want to talk about a drawing created by my <u>10-year-old nephew</u> with <u>markers(水彩笔)</u>. It's not a <u>world-famous masterpiece(世界知名的大</u> <u>师作品),</u> but it's just <u>as precious i</u>n my eyes(在我眼里一样宝贵). <mark>外甥、侄</mark>

I first saw this drawing <u>hanging proudly</u> on his bedroom wall(骄傲地挂在他 卧室的房间里). And I was very impressed with it.

The drawing is a <u>simple but colorful depiction(简单但是色彩丰富的描绘)</u> of a sunny day at the park. <u>In the picture, you can see(这里和表述一张照片的语</u> <u>法表达一致)</u> the bright sun, white and fluffy clouds, some green trees, grass and flowers, kids playing on <u>swings(秋千)</u>, and even <u>a cute puppy</u> <u>chasing a ball(可爱的小狗在追球)</u>. It's basically <u>a snapshot(抓拍)</u> of <u>pure</u> <u>childhood joy and innocence(纯粹的儿时快乐与天真,童真)</u>. I love the drawing. First off, I'm amazed by my little nephew's <u>art talent</u> (美术天赋). I love the <u>vivid and contrasting colours</u> (生动的撞色) in the drawing. And then, it <u>conveys a sense of joy and innocence</u> (带来快乐和纯 <u>真感</u>). Each time when I look at it, it always <u>transports me back to my</u> <u>childhood</u> (带我回到童年). It reminds me how I used to see the world when I was little. It's a reminder of the simple joys in life, making me realize that <u>happiness can be found in the little things</u> (你能从小事情里找到 快乐), like a sunny day at the park with family.

My nephew, who's quite the <u>budding artist(萌芽时期的艺术家)</u>, is so proud of his creation, and he should be. It's not just about the <u>artistic skill</u>; it's the love and happiness that went into it(这幅画不光仅仅关乎他的艺术技巧,而 在于投入进去的爱和快乐).

So yeh, that's the drawing that I adore. Thank you!

Part3:

1. What are the differences between painting and drawing? Well, drawing typically involves using <u>markers, pencils, pens, charcoals</u> <u>(水彩笔、铅笔、钢笔和炭笔)</u> to <u>create lines and shapes (创造线条和图形)</u> on paper. You can see all the <u>lines and the strokes (线条和笔触)</u>. That's why normally kids create drawings instead of paintings. Because painting, on the other hand, uses <u>painting brushes (画笔)</u> and <u>watercolor, oil, or</u> <u>acrylic (水彩、油画或者丙烯颜料)</u> to apply colors and create a more <u>textured effect (有质感的效果)</u>. Sometimes you can see <u>layers and layers</u> <u>of colors (一层层的颜色)</u>. And also, there are a lot of <u>blending techniques</u> <u>(颜色柔和技巧)</u> involved in painting. (对比讨论)

2. Why do some people keep a painting for a long time?

Many people see buying art as <u>a way to invest(一种投资方式)</u>. Some paintings <u>increase in value/ appreciate in value/ gain value(增值) over</u> <u>time</u>(随着时间推移), so people <u>hold on to them/ collect them</u> as assets. And sometimes people keep a painting for a long time simply because of its <u>sentimental value(情感价值)</u>. It <u>transports them back to(带他们穿越)</u> a time or a world that is <u>special and nostalgic(特别又怀旧)</u>. It <u>reminds</u> <u>them a special moment</u> in life. And finally, some people love art just because it's <u>visually pleasant(视觉上宜人的)</u>. A good piece of art can bring pure joy to people.(分群体)

3. How does building style affect people's lives?

That's a REALLY tricky question(这题真不好回答). I think the style of buildings can <u>set the tone</u> of the <u>vibe of a place(给一个地方的大氛围奠定了一</u>个基调), and also <u>affect the functionality</u>(影响功能性). For example, right now, I'm thinking of two types of buildings, one is a white, tall, and modern apartment building(白白的高高的现代的居民楼), and the other one is a traditional-styled and two-story building(传统风格的两层小楼). The modern building, because it's very modern and <u>sleek-looking/cool-looking</u>(看着很酷), it creates a more <u>urban vibe(有一种都市风)</u>. Whereas the traditional one can make a neighborhood feel <u>cozier</u> and <u>more unique</u>(更温馨和独特). And in terms of functionality, of course, a tall and modern building can <u>house(容纳)</u> way more people(远远更多人) than a two-story building. You see my point?(分角度讨论)

4. Should children learn to draw and paint? Why?

Oh yeah for sure, <u>the way I see it</u>, creating art really <u>brings a lot of</u> <u>benefits</u>, especially for children. First of all, it helps children develop skills, like <u>fine motor skills(精细动作技能), hand-eye coordination(手眼协调),</u> and <u>observation skills(观察能力)</u>. Not to mention that it also <u>fosters</u> children's imagina<u>tion(培养想象力)</u>. And secondly, it's an amazing way for children to <u>express their inner feelings(表达感受)</u>. When they are happy, frustrated, sad, scared or confused, they can express all of those feelings by creating art. If a child doesn't learn how to draw or paint, they would <u>lose a special channel(失去一个特别的渠道)</u> to <u>let out their</u> <u>emotions(发泄情绪)</u> and <u>the opportunity to express their feelings</u>. So, it's very crucial for children to learn to draw or painting.(罗列原因,反向假设)

5. How do young people share arts with others?

<u>Social media(自媒体)</u> is the main platform, I'd say. Sometimes when I draw something, I'll just <u>take a snapshot(拍一张快照)</u> and <u>post it on my</u> <u>social media(上传我的自媒体)</u>. I think that many young people are doing the same thing, sharing their <u>artwork(艺术作品)</u> on Instagram, TikTok or WeChat, get some comments and like, it really <u>helps boost self-esteem</u> <u>(帮助激增自信心)</u>. And also, there are the traditional ways, like <u>doing art</u> <u>show(办个人艺展)</u> at school, sharing their creations with their community.(主流情况,特殊情况补充)

6. Do you think the objects we use in our daily lives should be beautifully designed?

Yes, for sure! <u>Everyday objects(日常物品)</u> are more than just functional tools. Their look matters as well. I mean, we <u>are all drawn to(被吸引)</u> beautiful things (and people). And when we use something, we're actually spending time with this thing. It will <u>lift our mood(提升情绪)</u> if this object is beautifully designed. It's like an <u>eye candy(给眼睛吃的糖果,好看的东西或者人)</u> that brings joy to people. It also <u>brings a sense of style</u> to our life. That's why <u>Industrial Design(工业设计)</u> is such an important and popular major in university. Imagine, a world with only ugly but functional things, I wouldn't be happy at all. (原因,反向假设)

Today I'd like to talk about a rule <u>at my workplace</u>. It's about <u>punctuality/</u> <u>being on time(守时)</u>. I know, this rule might sound pretty <u>basic/</u> whatever(很基本的原则,很没得可说), but it's super important.

So, the rule goes: everyone is expected to be at their desk, ready to work, by 8:30 AM. And if you're <u>late without a proper reason(没有充分理由而迟</u> <u>到)</u>, you might <u>get a warning(获得警告)</u> or even have to <u>make up for the</u> <u>lost time(填补迟到的时间)</u>. And if you keep being late for a while, it will <u>negatively impact your performance(负面影响你的年终评估)</u> review at the end of the year.

<u>I have mixed feelings</u> about this rule(很复杂矛盾的心理). I try my best to <u>show up on time(守时)</u> for things or people. I <u>consider myself a punctual</u> <u>person(守时之人)</u>. I do believe that we need to <u>value each other's time</u> <u>(尊重珍惜彼此的时间)</u>. Being punctual isn't just about <u>being on time</u>; it's also about <u>showing respect and commitment to our job(对工作的尊重和承</u> <u>诺)</u>. It <u>sets a tone of(奠定基调)</u> professionalism. When we all <u>show up on</u> <u>time</u>, <u>it creates a sense of reliability and teamwork(建立一种可信任感)</u>.

BUT (here's the big but) (大大的转折来啦), there are those days when life throws me an unexpected curveball (生活给我不经意一个意外或不幸的事情): a traffic jam (交通堵塞), a sudden illness (突然病倒), or the alarm clock just didn't go off. On such occasions, the strict rule can feel a bit <u>stressful</u> <u>and inflexible (让人有压力、不灵活)</u>. Moreover, it can create an atmosphere where employees might feel that they're not trusted to manage their time effectively or that every moment of their day needs to be <u>closely</u> <u>monitored (紧密被监控)</u>. So, <u>the way I see it (在我看来)</u>, <u>there's a delicate</u> <u>balance to strike</u> between <u>enforcing punctuality</u> and <u>building trust</u> among team members (在提执行守时和建立信任之间有个精妙的平衡).

So, yeh, that's the rule. Thank you!

<mark>学生党版本(微调):</mark>

Today, I'd like to talk about a rule in our school, <u>punctuality and class</u> <u>attendance(守时和不旷课)</u>. I know, this rule might sound pretty <u>basic/</u> <u>whatever(很基本的原则,很没得可说), but it's super important.</u>

The rule goes: students are <u>expected to arrive on time</u> for their classes, preferably a few minutes before they start. <u>Skipping class without a valid</u> <u>reason(无故旷课)</u> could result in <u>academic penalties(学术惩罚)</u>,

impacting students' <u>overall performance(总体表现)</u> in the course.

I have mixed feelings about this rule. Personally, I always <u>strive to be</u> <u>punctual(努力做一个守时之人)</u>, understanding that it <u>shows respect for</u> <u>our instructors</u> and <u>classmates</u>. <u>Being on time</u> helps create an atmosphere of <u>professionalism</u> and <u>self-discipline(自律)</u> in our <u>school</u> <u>environment</u>. But, there are those days when life throws an unexpected curveball(生活 给你带来意外): a traffic jam, a sudden illness, or the alarm clock just didn't go off. On such occasions, the strict rule can feel rather <u>stressful and</u> <u>inflexible</u>. That <u>rush and anxiety</u> can negatively affect our <u>learning</u> <u>experience</u>. Moreover, there's the concern about trust(信任也是一个问题). It's also vital for students to <u>feel trusted</u> to manage their time and responsibilities effectively. So, <u>the way I see it(在我看来)</u>, <u>there's a</u> <u>delicate balance to strike</u> between <u>enforcing punctuality</u> and <u>building</u> <u>trust</u> among students(在提执行守时和建立信任之间有个精妙的平衡).

So, yeh, that's the rule. Thank you!

Part3:

1. What rules should children follow at home in your country? In China, there are some rules that children are expected to follow at home. <u>Number one (第一)</u>, always respect your parents and the elderly in your family. That includes, listening to them, taking their advice, doing what they suggest you to do, helping them with household chores, no <u>talking back (不顶嘴)</u>, etc. And <u>number two (第二)</u>, study hard and do your homework regularly. When I was little, the first thing when I came home was to do my homework before dinner. Finishing homework is crucial in Chinese families. Other rules like, <u>limited screen time (限时屏幕</u> <u>时间)</u>, <u>having a routine life</u> (规律作息), <u>no playing with fire at home (在家</u> <u>不玩火)</u>, there're a lot of rules at home. (并列罗列)

2. On what occasions can children be forgiven if they don't follow some rules?

I think parents, teachers and caregivers should always try to understand children's behavior and forgive them as much as possible. Of course, children <u>should be held accountable(被追求责任)</u> for their behaviour or mistakes. They need to learn <u>responsibility</u>(责任心) and <u>consequences</u> (后果) of their actions. Sometimes there is even punishment involved to help children <u>understand right from wrong (理解是非对错)</u>, but the <u>ultimate goal (最终的目标)</u> is to educate children and help them understand the <u>reasoning</u> behind those rules (规则背后的制定逻辑). And especially in certain situations where, for example, a child is really young, <u>too young to understand the rules</u>, or it's an emergency where being safe is the priority rather than following the rules. So, it depends on the child and the situation. Again, understanding children is the key, and sometimes that means <u>cutting them some slack (宽容对待孩子, 放他们—</u>

<u>马)</u>.(让位驳斥+举例子)

3. What rules should people follow when using public transportation? Well before you use public transportation, you need to pay for the ticket. <u>That's like rule NO.1 (最基本规则)</u>. And once you are using public transportation, always <u>respect other passengers (尊重其他乘客)</u>, and give your seat to someone who needs it more, like pregnant women, people who are <u>physically challenged (残疾人的文明说法)</u>, or the elderly. <u>Don't</u> <u>litter</u> (别乱扔垃圾). Try your best to <u>maintain the cleanliness (保持干净)</u>. And also, don't disrupt other people, <u>keep your voice down (控制音量)</u>, things like that. (并列罗列)

4. What kind of rules do people need to follow in public places?

5. What are the reasons that cause people to break rules?

Well sometimes it's <u>simply because</u> people <u>don't know the rules</u>. They end up breaking the rules without realizing it. For example, when people are <u>speeding(超速)</u>, sometimes it's because there's no <u>road sign(路标)</u> telling the driver what the <u>speed limit(限速)</u> is. And sometimes people break rules <u>out of necessity(出于必要)</u> when there is an emergency. For example, when someone is <u>experiencing a medical emergency</u>, they may <u>break traffic rules</u> to get to the hospital quickly, like <u>running a red light</u> (闯红灯). And also of course, sometimes due to <u>carelessness(粗心)</u>, people might forget about certain rules and end up breaking them. And lastly, there are situations where people break rules <u>on purpose/</u> <u>intentionally(故意地)</u>. And it's because they either don't see the consequences or they are very <u>entitled(自视甚高,觉得自己该有特殊待遇的)</u> They expect the rules to <u>revolve around</u> their preferences(其他规矩跟着自 己需求来).(分情况)

6. When people break rules how would they be punished in your country?

For minor things (小事) / <u>violations</u> (违规), like <u>littering</u> (乱扔) or <u>illegal</u> <u>parking</u> (违规停车), fines are the most common penalty</u> (罚款最常见). So, I'm generally not a person who loves <u>giving my advice</u> to people in life. But recently my best friend Jing came to me and <u>asked for my advice</u> after a <u>bad break-up(很糟糕的分手)</u>. I gave her some suggestions and helped her <u>move on</u>.

Jing recently just <u>got out of a long-term relationship(离开了一段长期恋爱关系)</u>, and she had been <u>devastated</u>(痛苦万分) since then. She basically <u>gave up on herself</u>(放弃自己). She didn't get out of her room for months.

Last month, I saw her, and I was shocked to see <u>how bad she was doing</u> (她的状态有多糟糕). She looked miserable(看着很糟). <u>First</u>, I told her that she had <u>lost herself(迷失自我)</u> in that <u>toxic</u> <u>relationship</u>(有毒的恋爱) long time ago. I thought that the break-up was actually <u>for the best</u> for both of them(分手对两个人都好). <u>Then</u>, I <u>strongly</u> <u>urged</u> her to get out of her room, and <u>pull herself together</u> again(振作起 来)/ <u>get back on track</u>(回归正轨). And I told her: "You need to love yourself before someone can love you." I <u>recommended her to sign up</u>(注 册) at the gym to start <u>working out</u> again, because I'm a <u>strong believer</u> <u>(坚信者)</u> that exercise can <u>boost a person's mood and confidence</u>(激增— 个人的情绪和自信心).

Jing <u>took my suggestion</u> as she always trusts me and tends to listen to me, and joined in the gym. Now, we are going to the gym together almost every day. And I can already see changes in her. She's <u>lost a bunch of</u> <u>weight(减了几斤体重)</u> and looks much happier now. She's totally <u>on the</u> <u>right track(在正轨上)</u> now.

So, yeh, that was the time when I helped my best friend <u>go through a</u> <u>dark time</u> in her life(经历人生黑暗时刻). Thank you!

1. Do you think parents should give their children advice?

Yes, I believe parents <u>play a huge role in(扮演的作用很重要) shaping a</u> <u>child's personality(塑造孩子性格)</u> and <u>facilitating their development(协助</u> <u>发展)</u>. They have a lot of <u>life experience</u> and <u>wisdom(人生阅历和智慧)</u> to share, and all the guidance and advise are <u>critical/essential</u>(至关重要) for a child's development and <u>personal growth(个人成长)</u>, and can help children <u>navigate through life(在人长河中驾驭前行)</u>. However, <u>having said</u> <u>that</u>, parents <u>should be mindful of the way they offer advice</u>(对于给建议的 方式要注意), and also, <u>just the right amount(适量)</u>. If parents are <u>all the</u> <u>time giving advice</u> and <u>constantly guiding children</u> to do things, that's not advice, that's <u>intervention(过度干预).</u>(反向思考,假设)

2. Should teachers give students advice?

Yes, for sure. A teacher's major jobs are, <u>imparting knowledge and</u> <u>wisdom(传输知识与智慧), guiding and mentoring students(引导、辅导学</u> <u>生)</u>. They teach students things, help students on <u>academic matters(学</u> <u>业相关事宜)</u>, but also provide valuable advice on <u>personal development</u>, <u>life development</u> and <u>career choices(事业选择)</u>. However, +上题答案中的反 向思考,内容很相似。(反向思考)

3. Do you think it's necessary for us to listen to friends' advice?

Depends on the friend (要看什么朋友). If it's a really good friend who knows you well (很了解你), who wants the best for you (盼着你好), and who can provide a clear and rational perspective (提供清晰和理智的视角), then sometimes it is necessary to seek advice from them to gain some perspective (获得更多角度). But, if just a "whatever" friend (一般的、无所谓 的朋友), sometimes maybe a so-called "frenemy" (亦敌亦友的那种 "敌 友"), they might be completely biased or not sincere (偏心的或者不真诚 的), and end up giving you the worst advice ever. And additionally, Age plays an important role (年龄也很重要). I would expect that an older friend, who has more life experience and wisdom, will be able to provide more valuable advice. (分群体)

4. How do people give young people and old people advice? Okay firstly, I don't think people would normally <u>give unsolicited advice</u> <u>(未经请求的,主动给出建议)</u> to old people without being asked for it. It's quite rude to do it. Old individuals have <u>plenty of life experience and</u> <u>wisdom (很多人生阅历和智慧)</u> to <u>cope with situations (处理情况)</u>, so it's almost <u>bizarre(几乎可以说是诡异的)</u> to just <u>go ahead(直接上前)</u> and <u>advice the elderly</u> unless it's asked for(除非老人主动问你). Whereas for young people, they are <u>less experienced in life</u>, so people just tend to give <u>unsolicited advice</u> <u>out of the blue(突然之间)</u>, which is also not necessarily a good thing. It could <u>come across as incredibly arrogant and</u> <u>patronizing(有可能会显得非常傲慢和自认为高人一等的)</u>. And another thing is, <u>the tone and the language(语气和语言)</u> people use could be different. When people give young people advice, they're normally more <u>direct/</u> <u>straight-forward(直言不讳的)</u> and use more <u>informal language(非正式语</u> <u>言)</u>, focusing on providing solution and guidance. Whereas when people advice the old, they usually use a more <u>formal and respectful tone</u>.(分角 度讨论)

5. What are the areas in which people are more or less willing to accept advice?

Well that's a <u>tricky one(这题不好答)</u>. I think for different people, they are more willing to <u>take advice</u> in different areas. For some people, especially young people, they are willing to <u>get advice</u> regarding <u>romantic</u> <u>relationships (恋爱关系)</u>, friendships and <u>relationships with their family</u> <u>(和家人关系)</u>. And also, many people would love <u>seeking advice</u> related to their <u>career path (职业道路)</u> and <u>educational development (教育发展)</u>. And for some other people, especially older people, they are more <u>acceptive with</u> things related to <u>health and well-being (健康)</u>, especially from doctors, nurses or somebody who has similar medical experiences. (分群体讨论)

6. Have you ever received any advice from professional people, like a doctor, a lawyer or a teacher?

Oh yeah, <u>all the time</u>, especially because I'm young. <u>Growing up(随着我的</u> <u>成长过程)</u>, I've been constantly receiving advice from various people, including my teachers, doctors, and nurses, on what to do and how to handle things. I'm <u>used to that</u>(我已经习惯了). And <u>I'm normally the kind</u> <u>of person who respects authority</u>(我一般是那种尊重权威的人).

The ad starts by <u>depicting(描述)</u> the <u>overwhelming stress and anxiety</u> that many of us are facing nowadays. It's absolutely <u>relatable(令人感同身</u> <u>受)</u>. But it doesn't stop there(不止于此). It <u>dives deeper into(深挖)</u> a <u>common barrier(共同的障碍)</u> we have, which is <u>the fear of judgment and</u> <u>embarrassment</u>(害怕被评头论足的恐惧)when seeking help <u>face to face</u> with a <u>therapist(心理治疗师)</u>.

The ad introduces the concept of <u>online therapy</u>, <u>painting a picture(描绘</u> 一个画面) of people, like us, <u>finding comfort and support</u> in a <u>safe and</u> <u>comfortable online environment(在线安全寻求帮助)</u>.

I find this ad very useful <u>for several reasons</u>. First, it recognizes a significant issue: <u>the modern-day struggle</u> with stress. Second, it offers a solution that's not only convenient but also <u>empathetic(有共情心的)</u>.

Online therapy is a <u>non-judgmental option(不会被人评头论足的选项)</u> for people who may be hesitant to seek help.

Lastly, what really <u>touched me</u> was a <u>compelling testimonial(打动人心的用</u> <u>户推荐)</u> from someone who had experienced a <u>life-changing</u> transformation(改变一生的转变) through online therapy. Their story was <u>genuine and heartfelt(真诚真心)</u>. It really <u>spoke to me on a personal level</u> <u>(与我共鸣)</u>. It made me seriously consider <u>exploring this option(探索这个</u> 选项) for myself.

1. What do you think of online advertising?

1. How can people access traveling formation?

2. Do people have different personalities in different regions of your country?

China's an <u>enormous/ huge country</u> with <u>incredible cultural diversity</u> (迷

人的文化多样性). Every region has its own unique <u>customs, traditions, and</u> <u>even different ways of talking</u>. These things can definitely <u>shape how</u> <u>people are (塑造人们的特点)</u>, but <u>I wouldn't say</u>/<u>I wouldn't go as far as</u> <u>saying (我不至于会认为)</u> there are huge differences in personalities across China. <u>From what I've seen</u>, hanging out with people from all over China, it's more about <u>individual differences</u> than where they're from. People are unique, <u>no matter where they call home</u> (更多是人和人之间的区别,不管他们 家乡在哪里). (转折)

3. What causes the differences between different regions of your country? 这题好难!!!!!

(自己找台阶下) To be honest, that's a very complicated question! And I'm definitely <u>not an expert on topics like this (我不是这种话题的专家)</u>. I guess, in general, the differences between regions can be caused by <u>a mix of</u> historical, cultural, economic and geographical <u>factors</u> (a mix of A, B, C and D factors). For example, in the east coast of China where the cities are more developed, like Shanghai, Xiamen, Shenzhen, all these cities <u>appear</u> <u>very modern and international (看起来现代又国际化)</u>. Whereas cities located in the northwest part of China, inner land region, for example, Qinghai Province, those areas are relatively less developed. The look and <u>fabric of those cities (城市肌理)</u> can be very different with those <u>coastal</u> <u>cities (海边城市)</u> in China. (举例子)

Generally speaking, young people are more willing to try new things and be more <u>adventurous (有冒险精神的)</u>, while older people are more <u>conservative (保守的)</u> and <u>willing to stay in their comfort zones (愿意呆在</u> 舒适区). But <u>I wouldn't go as far as saying (但我也不至于就认为)</u> ONLY the young like to try new things. I know many people of my parents age who also love <u>taking risks (冒险)</u> and <u>exploring new things</u>. For example, my uncle loves all kinds of <u>extreme sports (极限运动)</u>. He is <u>in his 50s (50 多</u> <u>岁)</u> and love surfing and scuba diving. He's also a <u>skater boy (滑板男孩)</u>, well, <u>more like a skater man (更多是滑板大叔)</u>, haha! But you get the point, right? it still depends on the personality type. (总述, 转折, 举例子)

5. Is a great tourist destination also a good place to live?

Usually, a tourist destination wouldn't be a good place to live. This kind of place is usually full of people, <u>tourist-oriented infrastructure and facilities</u> <u>(以游客为导向的基建和设施)</u>, and <u>high prices(高物价)</u>. The city wouldn't prioritize its residents' needs before tourists' needs. Residents' needs such as, healthcare system, education quality and job opportunities are normally not valued. (原因)

6. Why do people who go to live in small towns think these towns are more interesting than big cities?

Small towns usually are less <u>bustling(喧闹)</u> than big cities. They are more tranquil and peaceful, with <u>a slow-paced lifestyle</u>, and can help people <u>find their inner peace(寻找内心平静).</u> And then, a small town tends <u>to have a lower cost of living(生活成本低)</u> compared with big cities. <u>Affordability(可支付性)</u> is another reason why some people choose small cities over big ones. Finally, like I mentioned, small towns normally have <u>tight-knit communities(紧密的社区关系)</u> where people know each other and help each other out. <u>盹)</u>, enjoying <u>the breeze on my face</u> and <u>the coolness from the shade(享</u> 受脸上的清风和树荫的凉爽). And sometimes I go with my friends. We'll <u>get</u> into the woods(走进树林), <u>doing a picnic under the tree(属下野餐)</u> and <u>kicking back(打发时光).</u>

That's why I love this place. It's my <u>go-to park(首选公园)</u> for relaxation. <u>The chirping of birds</u>(鸟叫声), <u>the gentle whisper of leaves</u>(树叶的轻柔低 <u>语</u>), and <u>the scent of flowers</u>(花香), they all create a <u>soothing</u> <u>atmosphere</u>(打造了一个安抚人心的氛围). Whether I want to <u>clear my head</u> <u>(清空大脑)</u>, <u>enjoy quality time with my family</u>, or <u>simply immerse myself</u> <u>in nature</u>(让自己沉浸在自然中), <u>this park has it all</u>(这个公园什么都有). It's like my <u>secret retreat</u> where I can <u>find my inner peace</u> again(是能让我再次 找到心灵的平静的秘密场地).

1. Do young people like to go to parks?

It really <u>depends on the individual</u> and also where they live. Instead, they <u>hang out</u> at local cafes or shopping malls. (分群体)

2. What do old people like to do in parks?

Old people normally go to the park to <u>get some exercise done (</u> to <u>stay</u> <u>physically active (保持生理上的积极性)</u>. It's not anything intense, more like a gentle workout, like <u>take a leisurely stroll</u> (闲情漫步散散步), <u>practice Tai</u> <u>Chi (练太极)</u>, meanwhile <u>soak up the sun (晒晒太阳)</u>. And also, parks can be a great place for them to <u>socialize and make new friends</u>. That's why you always see old people <u>sitting on the benches (坐在长凳上)</u>, chatting or play chess. Sometimes old people can be quite lonely. They need each other to <u>while away the time/ kill the time (打发时间)</u>. (并列罗列)

3. What benefits can park spring to a society?

First of all, parks can <u>clean up the air (净化空气)</u>; they <u>offer greenery and</u> <u>fresh air (提供绿植和干净空气)</u> for the city, <u>the concrete jungle (钢筋混凝土</u> <u>的丛林)</u>, <u>if you will (你可以这么说)</u>. And then, they are places where people can exercise, play, <u>enjoy family time</u> and <u>bond</u>. That's why I think every community should have a park because parks <u>bring people together (把人团结在一起)</u>. Whether you are young or old, you can always <u>find a spot</u> and <u>find something to do</u> in a park. You can <u>go for a jog (去慢跑)</u>, <u>take a nap under the tree (在树下打盹)</u>, <u>have picnics (野餐)</u>, or <u>practise</u> <u>photography (练习摄影)</u>. Parks definitely <u>contribute to the well-being and</u> <u>happiness</u> in our society. (并列罗列)

6. Would you say people should help maintain public parks and gardens? Yes of course! <u>It's a no-brainer</u>(想都不用想). People should definitely <u>chip</u> <u>in/ pitch in/ join in</u>(共同加入、齐心协力) to maintain the <u>cleanliness and</u> <u>beauty of</u> public parks and gardens. We're all benefiting from it. We can't be selfish here. Imagine, if people just go to the park, enjoy the space and leave, without doing anything to maintain the park. They <u>litter</u> <u>everywhere</u>(到处乱扔垃圾), <u>tug flowers and plants</u>(用力拉扯花花草草), then the park would <u>deteriorate</u>(恶化) and become messy and dirty very soon. And nobody would want that, right?(原因+反向假设)

1. What are the differences between modern towns and modern cities?

Modern cities are larger and densely populated. And without a doubt, they are more convenient in terms of public services; they offer more job <u>opportunities</u> and <u>entertainment options</u>; there are plenty of <u>amenities</u> like <u>shopping centers</u>, big cinemas, sports centers, and big hospitals. Whereas modern towns are usually smaller in terms of size and population. <u>There aren't too many things going on (没有什么活动)</u>,

It tells us where we come from, who our <u>ancestors</u> (祖先) are, how they lived their lives. We're constantly trying to connect with the past and understand the past. Therefore, historical sites are like <u>time machines (时间飞船)</u> that can <u>transport us back in time</u>, you know? When you see those ancient walls that have been standing there for hundreds or even thousands of years, witnessing the entire human history (上千年站在那里,见证整个人类文明的古

<u>墙)</u>, you feel amazed and astonished. It's like you're talking to the history directly. I think it's this feeling of curiosity and <u>appreciation for history</u> that excites people a lot. (原因)

3. How can people preserve historic cities and historic buildings?

I think people and the government should always work together to preserve historic cities and buildings. It always takes two to tango(两个人 才能跳探戈,表示"一个巴掌拍不响"), right? From the government's perspective, it is important to pass laws and regulations (通过法律法规)。 that make it illegal to tear down(推倒) historic buildings and harm historic towns. Public education(公共教育) is key as well. The government should help citizens raise awareness(提升意识) of the importance of preserving historic cities and buildings by imparting knowledge(传输知识) about their historical significance(历史重要性). <u>This way</u>(通过这样的方式), we can all work together and <u>foster a sense of</u> responsibility(建立责任感) within the community. The government can also provide incentives(奖赏) to citizens or private organizations whoa are interested in fixing up(修复) old buildings and <u>keeping them in good</u> shape(保持好的状态). From the citizens' perspective, we need to start small(从小事做起). No more <u>graffiti</u>(城市涂鸦), no more <u>surface damage</u>. Then, we can volunteer our time (做志愿者) to organize community services to clean up and protect the buildings. If we all pitch in (每个人都做 自己的部分), we can ensure that these historical spots will survive for future generations. (特殊分群体讨论)

1. How can children help their parents at home?

Yes, <u>without a doubt(毫无疑问的)/it's almost like a no-brainer(几乎想都不</u> <u>用想)</u>. <u>The way I see it</u>, the benefits of teaching children to help others are <u>twofold</u>(两方面的). <u>Number one</u>, it teaches them <u>the importance of</u> <u>empathy and kindness</u>, <u>and number two</u>, it also <u>instills a sense of</u> <u>responsibility and community in children(在孩子身上灌输责任感和团体感)</u>. Therefore, it's not just beneficial for children, but also <u>the society as a</u> <u>whole(整个社会)</u>. (原因罗列)

3. What makes children help each other at school?

I don't really know what or who makes children help each other at school. I mean, of course, teachers can <u>instill the importance of kindness and</u> <u>empathy in children</u>. 4. Should students do community service and why?

I think, community service should <u>be encouraged/ celebrated(被鼓励、推</u> <u>崇、庆祝)</u> but not <u>forced/mandated</u>(强制的). There're <u>tons of pros</u>(大量 的好处) of doing so, like, it's a great way to <u>give back</u>(回馈社会) to the community; it helps students <u>develop important life skills</u> such as empathy, leadership, and responsibility; it <u>provides a platform</u> for students to interact with people from all kinds of backgrounds; and <u>let's</u> <u>be honest(咱们实话实说)</u>, it also <u>looks great</u>(看着很象样) on <u>college</u> <u>applications and resumes(大学申请资料里和找工作的简历里)</u>…However, <u>having said that</u>, it should be a <u>voluntary choice</u>. I see nowadays many schools are making this a mandatory thing and it really stresses students out, and I don't like that tendency. Forcing students to participate can lead to <u>resentment(厌恶)</u> and <u>a lack of genuineness</u>(真诚度缺乏).(反向 思考,主流观点,自己观点)

5. Do students in your country do volunteer work?

I'd say yes, many students in China do volunteer work. It is a good way to <u>give back to the society</u> and meanwhile <u>gain practical experience</u>. There are all kinds of opportunities for students, such as in schools, hospitals, and <u>non-profit organizations (NGOs 非营利组织)</u>. Some schools even <u>require</u> students to <u>complete a certain number of volunteer hours(完成若</u>

干小时的志愿者时间). (细节)

6. Why do some people do volunteer work all over the world?

Some people might do it to <u>gain new experiences and skills</u>, and perhaps even learn a new language; some people really love traveling and seeing different cultures, therefore volunteering all around the world can not only allow them to help others, but also <u>broaden their horizons</u> and <u>expand their life experiences</u>; volunteering can also be a way to <u>meet new</u> <u>people</u>, especially people with different cultural backgrounds, <u>build</u> <u>relationships</u> and <u>create a sense of community</u>. Plus, She's also a really kind person. I've seen the way she treats her fans and even strangers in life. She's so <u>down-to-earth(接地气)</u>, <u>friendly</u> and <u>gentle</u> to the world.

To sum up, I'm so into Kate Winslet because she's talented, hard-working, and <u>true to herself(真实做自己,忠于自己)</u>, also, because she <u>embraces</u> <u>aging gracefully(优雅地面对衰老)</u> and chooses to <u>hone her acting skills</u> <u>(磨练演技)</u> rather than preoccupy herself with how she looks.

2. What are the differences between famous people today and those in the past?

Traditionally, people used to become <u>well-known</u>(有名的) because of their <u>extraordinary talents(超常的天赋)</u>, skills or <u>phenomenal</u> <u>achievement</u> in certain field(某个领域的卓越成就). Some people became <u>household figures</u>(家喻户晓的人物) because they knew how <u>to</u> <u>connect with people</u>. And they just <u>drew people in</u>(吸引人群) with their <u>charisma and unique/charming personality</u>. Or, some of them had all of those <u>traits(优点)</u>. And today, there're still people getting famous for the same reasons I just mentioned, for example, lately there's this skier

(滑雪运动员) called Eileen Gu who got really popular in China. She's an <u>Olympic gold medalist</u>(奥运金牌获得者), people adore her not just because of her world records, but also her super confident, charming and <u>sassy</u>(很女王范儿的,飒的) personality. Many people, especially girls want to become her. She's truly an <u>idol</u>(偶像). However, there're also people become well-known for the bad or wrong reasons. For instance, <u>making a fool of themselves (自取其辱,装疯卖傻)</u> on the internet, or <u>trading their privacy for fame and money</u>(用隐私换取名声和金 钱). Some online influencers would do anything to <u>get more followers/</u> <u>get a following</u>(获得粉丝). <u>The way I see it</u>, that's really pathetic and hard to sustain <u>in the long run</u>(长期来看).(分群体讨论)

3. Why do some people become famous but not successful? Because some people are known for <u>a scandal</u>(丑闻) or <u>controversial or</u> <u>even illegal behavior</u>(有争议的甚至违法的行为). So, it's like they have a <u>stigma</u>(耻辱) <u>attached to their fame</u>(连接名声). That's why it's hard for them to become successful as the stigma is following them like a shadow and <u>overshadowing</u>(遮住) anything positive they may have achieved or talent they may have. For example, in China, around 2010, there was an <u>online first-generation celebrity</u>(第一代网红) called Feng Jie (凤姐) who <u>went viral</u>(全网病毒式成名) because of her bold and aggressive personality, her unusual behavior and lack of manner. Her whole image was super <u>sensational</u>(哗众取宠) and she <u>gained a large</u> following (关注量很大) very quickly. But over the years, she kind of just disappeared, faded out (淡出) in <u>public eye</u>(公众视线). She's no longer visible in media. I know that she's working in a nail shop (指甲

店) somewhere in the States. As you can see, she's <u>not success in any</u> shape or form(怎么看都不算成功). So yeh, that's <u>a case in point</u>(完全证明 了观点).

4. Do you think famous people are necessarily good in their fields?

No, definitely I don't think so, especially in <u>show business</u>(演艺圈). Like I said, nowadays there are so many people becoming well known for the wrong reasons, like <u>making a fool of themselves</u>, or simply just because they have a lot of connections with famous people(认识名人,有背景), or they are the so-called <u>online influencers (网红)</u>, and they can bring <u>traffic and viewership</u>(流量和点击率). That's why nowadays a lot of online influencers are invited to <u>star in movies</u>(主演电影) just because they can attract audience, but they are not necessarily good actors. Some of them are actually terrible actors. It's really sad to see there are a lot of really <u>unprofessional singers and actors</u> in <u>show business</u>(演艺圈) nowadays.

5. Do you think media is putting too much attention on famous people? Yes, I think so, and this is indeed a <u>negative phenomenon (负面现象)</u>. In today's society, <u>it seems that (貌似)</u> <u>celebrity culture (明星文化)</u> has <u>taken over (占据占领)</u> the entire media world. Everywhere we look, we are <u>bombarded with news, gossip, and updates about the lives of famous</u> <u>people (被明星的新闻八卦轰炸)</u>. It is understandable that some people are curious about the lives of celebrities, but not all of us are so into those lives that are far away from us. It is the <u>excessive focus (过度关注)</u> on <u>their every move (他们的每一个动作)</u> that annoys me so much. And it's <u>taking our attention away from things that truly matter</u>, such as wars, poverty, environment and education (把我们的注意力从真正重要的事情上挪 走). (原因)

6. What kinds of famous people are there in your country?

We have people who are famous because they <u>make contributions to the society.</u> Scientists, doctors, <u>environmental activists</u>, <u>business leaders</u>, etc. But there are also online celebrities who have <u>a big fan base(粉丝基础大)/ a</u> <u>big following(关注量很大)</u> and they can <u>bring a lot of traffic(带来很多流</u> <u>量)</u>. It's <u>light-filled</u> (光线很足), <u>cozy</u> (温馨) and with a modern style. <u>I felt like</u> <u>home there</u> (感觉像回家). It's the perfect kind of place for someone who has just <u>entered the workforce</u> (踏进职场) as the rent is very affordable. I especially like her XXX room....这里展开说

I felt happy for my best friend. Maybe <u>a little jealous</u>(有点小嫉妒) as I'm still living with my parents, b<u>ut jealous in a good way(是一种好的嫉妒)</u>. And to be honest, the idea of moving out had <u>never crossed my mind(没</u> <u>来没想过)</u> before I saw her apartment and how she was living there. I have always been a very <u>spoiled kid(被溺爱的孩子)</u> and I like being taken care of. But when I saw how free she was in her place, and how mature she was <u>handling everything(处理应付一切)</u>, I felt jealous, I want to experience <u>that sense of independence(独立感)</u> as well!

So, yeh, that's pretty much it. Thank you!

Part3:

1. Why do some young people keep moving?

Well, young people <u>have a lot of things going on in their lives (时而很多)</u>. Their lives are <u>filled with uncertainties (充满了未知)</u>. Therefore, many times they need to <u>relocate (变更地址)</u> because they have new educational opportunities or job opportunities. <u>And another thing I can</u> <u>think of</u> is the <u>affordability</u> (支付能力). Young people don't <u>earn a big</u> <u>salary</u> and sometimes the expensive rent could be a problem for them long term. Maybe they can afford it for now, but one day if they get fried without any savings, they have to <u>switch to a cheaper place(搬到一个更便</u> <u>宜的地方)</u>. And also, young people tend to be unstable in their <u>romantic</u> <u>relationships</u>(感情不稳定). Sometimes they might move in with their partner, but later they break up and then they have to move out and <u>go</u> <u>their separate ways</u>(分道扬镳). Overall, there are all kinds of reasons.(罗 列)

2. What's the difference between living alone and living with roommates?

(以下四方面不是一定要面面俱到)The first difference is the cost(费用). Living alone is definitely more expensive as you have to bear the entire rent(承担整个房租) and utility bills(水电煤账单), whereas living with roommates allows you to share the burden (分享负担). You can split the bills(划分账单) and <u>end up saving more money</u>. So, it's definitely more financially friendly(经济友好型) to live with somebody, and that's why many young people choose to live with roommates. And in terms of privacy, obviously living alone provides you with a greater sense of privacy(隐私感更强) since you have your own space to yourself. You don't need to compromise (妥协). You can live in the place freely the way you want to. And on the other hand, sharing a place means compromising and you don't have that level of privacy. But I have to say in terms of social interaction (社交), living with roommates is definitely healthier for your mental health because you get to interact and socialize with other people, of course only when you get along with your roommates. Whereas living alone sometimes could be really lonely and cause all kinds of mental problems, even depression. But I have to say, living alone is really good for your independence. You do everything on your own. You handle every issue by yourself. That really improves problem-solving skills (解决问题能力) and brings a strong sense of independence and freedom. (分角度讨论)

3. Is it positive for young people to live by themselves?

It's really hard to say, like I said, living alone can provide <u>a sense of</u> <u>independence and freedom</u>, but it can also be <u>lonely and overwhelming</u>

(孤独的和压倒性的), especially for young people who don't have a lot of <u>life experiences</u>. Therefore, it really <u>depends on the individual</u> and their circumstances. If a young person is really <u>inexperienced</u> (未经世事的), I can imagine how it could be a very <u>stressful and overwhelming situation</u> for them, with all the rent and fees they need to pay, all the potential problems and emergencies they need to face. It could be <u>too much</u> (太多

太过分) for them.(分群体)

4. Besides cooking, are there any other skills that people need to learn if they live on their own?

When you live by yourself you need to know how to <u>do household chores</u>. Things like <u>doing the laundry</u>, <u>folding the laundry</u>, <u>doing the dishes</u>, <u>grocery shopping</u>, <u>cleaning up the place</u>, <u>organizing and decluttering</u> the place, things like that. Otherwise, you'll be living in a <u>pig house</u>. And another thing is become a little bit <u>handy</u> (会修东西的). Say if you need to <u>change a light bulb</u> (换灯泡) or <u>unclog a drain</u> (通下水道). It is better that you know how to fix those things to save some money and time. And finally, I think <u>financial management skills</u> (资产管理技能) are also very important. Learn how to <u>manage your money</u>, <u>track your expenses</u>, <u>pay</u> <u>all kinds of bills on time</u>. Those are very crucial things to learn when you live by yourself. (罗列, 举例子)

5. What kinds of people tend to live by themselves?

There are people who "have to" live by themselves and there are people who "want to" live by themselves. These two types of people are different. With the first type of people, normally they are <u>young</u>

professionals (年轻的人才) who live in a different city as their families. They <u>don't have a choice</u> but living by themselves and learning to become mature and independent. There are also people who want to live alone, like some of the young adults who have just left universities and want to <u>embark on their independent journeys</u> (体验一场独立之旅) by leaving their family homes and then <u>spread their wings</u>. And then there are also people who are more like a <u>"loner" kind of personality(类似于"独行侠"一样性格的</u> <u>人)</u> who don't enjoy <u>sharing the save roof(共享屋檐)</u>with anybody else.

They <u>have a strong sense of privacy</u> and they're very independent <u>to the</u> <u>point that</u> they don't need anybody, nor do they want anybody. (分群体)

6. How can parents and teachers help young people to live independently?

First off, parents and teachers should help children <u>develop those basic</u> <u>housework skills</u> such as cooking, cleaning, laundry, and grocery shopping. Help them <u>increase their independence</u> and <u>gain more</u> <u>confidence</u>. And then, they should <u>foster the concept of responsibility</u> in life, like how to manage your money, how to manage your time, how to prioritize things in life. <u>And what's more</u>, problem-solving skills(解决问题

<u>的能力</u>) are also very important. Parents and teachers should definitely guide children to <u>solve problems</u>, and help them <u>make decisions</u> in life. <u>Also</u>, I think <u>communication skills (沟通能力)</u> are crucial because one day if they are going to share a property with somebody else, being able to communicate properly and effectively is also key. Having conflicts in a <u>rental property</u> is very common, and parents and teachers should help children prepare for that. <u>And lastly, financial literacy</u> (金融素养) is very important. When you live by yourself, you need to manage your income and your expenses to make sure you can <u>make both ends meet (入能付出)</u>, and many people have problems achieving that. Parents and teachers should <u>definitely instill the concept in children (给孩子灌输理念)</u> at an early age. (罗列)

When I was a child, my family and I went on a road trip in China during the summer. We were driving to visit my grandparents who lived in a <u>rural area (农村)</u> in China. I remember being very excited for the trip because I loved spending time with my family and exploring new places.

However, as soon as we <u>hit the road</u>, I started to feel a bit <u>queasy(想吐</u> <u>的) / nauseous(恶心想吐的) / funny(怪怪的)</u>. At first, I <u>thought it was just</u> <u>a passing feeling(很快会过去)</u>, but it only got worse and worse as the trip went on. I tried to distract myself by talking to my parents, playing games, and listening to music, but nothing seemed to help. The roads were <u>winding(蜿蜒曲折)</u> and <u>bumpy(凹凸不平)</u>, and also the gasoline smell of the car made me feel terrible.

As we drove further and further away from the city and into the countryside, I began to feel worse and worse. I felt <u>dizzy, nauseous, and very uncomfortable.</u> I begged my parents to stop the car and let me out,

but we were <u>in the middle of nowhere</u>(荒无人烟的地区) and there was nowhere to go. I tried to <u>stay calm</u>, but I was struggling to <u>keep it</u> together(保持镇定).

Part3:

1. What benefits does public transportation bring to the world? Firstly, when more people <u>go for</u> public transportation, it reduces <u>congestion on roads</u>, as well as <u>carbon emissions (二氧化碳排放量)</u>, which means the <u>air quality</u> gets better. I don't know about other countries, but in China, normally young people get their driver's license after graduating from university, which is around 22 years old. <u>The way I see it</u>, it's not the best idea for a person to try to get a driver's license too young, like 16 years old, or something like that, because at that age, they <u>lack the necessary</u> <u>experience(缺乏经验)</u> and <u>maturity</u>(成熟度) to handle the responsibility that comes with driving. Young drivers are more likely to <u>take risks(冒</u> <u>险)</u> on the road, such as <u>speeding(超速行驶)</u> or <u>having road rage(公路暴</u> <u>怒)</u>, which can lead to accidents, injuries, or even death. So, no, it's not late AT ALL.(反向假设)

3. What qualities does a driver need to have?

There are a number of key qualities a driver must have. <u>First off</u>, they have to be <u>responsible and reliable</u>. <u>It's no joke</u>. It's people's lives that they are taking care of. They need to be able to <u>follow the rules and regulations</u>, always <u>put safety first</u> (安全第一). <u>Speeding or road rage</u> is completely unacceptable. And then, they need to be good at driving, things like, <u>having a good sense of space (空间感强)</u>, being able to judge distances <u>accurately (准确评估距离)</u>, having <u>good reflexes (反应快)</u>, being able to drive smoothly, <u>having a great sense of direction (方向感强)</u>, these are all very essential qualities. And then, a good driver needs to be <u>patient and</u> <u>calm</u>, especially on a busy or congested road. I've seen some driver <u>losing</u> <u>themselves (疯了)</u> in a traffic, which is NOT cool or acceptable at all. And finally, <u>having good communication skills</u> (善于沟通) are also important, both with passengers and other drivers on the road. (罗列)

4. Do you think government should make it a rule for people to use public transportation?

I <u>root for/ vote for(支持)</u> promoting the use of public transportation. I believe it is essential <u>for the greater good of the society(全社会的更大利</u>

益). I can't stress this enough the importance of using public

transportation(我没有办法更强调使用公共交通的重要性了). <u>However, with</u> <u>that being said</u>, I don't think the government should <u>make it a rule</u>. The moment when they force people to use public transportation, that could be seen as <u>taking away their personal freedom and right</u>. It <u>should be up</u> <u>to people themselves</u> to decide(应该由他们自己决定) how they want to travel. This is basic human right. (反向思考)

5. What jobs require people to be good at driving?

Well, <u>off the top of my head</u>, taxi drivers, truck drivers, bus drivers, and delivery drivers really rely on their driving skills to transport people and goods effectively.

6. Do you see driverless cars as the future of cars?

<u>In the near future(近期的未来)</u>, no, I don't see driverless cars as the predominant means of transportation. There are still several challenges to overcome, technological limitations would be the NO.1 problem, we see Tesla <u>car accidents</u> almost every day on the news, and then, legal and ethical aspects, I don't think too many people have accepted this concept. However, <u>in the distant future</u>(远期未来), it's possible that driverless cars could become more prevalent(流行、普及).(时间分层)

1. Who likes to read adventure books?

People who are <u>daredevils</u>, <u>risktakers (冒险鬼)</u>, or people who <u>value</u> <u>courage and exploration (很看重勇气和探索)</u> would love to read adventure books, since they enjoy the excitement and the <u>adrenaline rush (肾上腺飙</u> <u>升,高阶词)</u> from the book; Some people love adventure books because they can <u>provide them with an escape from the real world (提供逃离现实世</u> <u>界的途径)</u> and help them forget about their day-to-day worries. Reading an <u>appealing and captivating (吸引人的迷人的)</u> adventure book is a great <u>stress reliever (减压器)</u> for many people; while some people may think that kids are mostly <u>drawn to (被吸引)</u> adventurous stories, <u>I don't see it</u> <u>that way</u>. I think people <u>of all ages</u> (各个年龄段) and backgrounds enjoy reading adventure books, as long as it's a good story. (罗列+让位驳斥) 2. Do people prefer adventure novels or adventure movies? Well, it really depends on the person. Some people prefer adventure novels because they <u>offer a more personalized experience</u>(提供更个人化的 <u>体验</u>). Books are more <u>detail-oriented</u>(细节至上) and <u>in-depth</u>(有深度) than movies. Therefore, with books, people <u>have the freedom</u> to imagine the characters (角色), settings (场景), and plot (情节) however they want. Plus, reading a book can be a more relaxing and <u>immersive experience</u>(沉浸式体验) that allows people to <u>disconnect from the outside world</u>(与外界脱离). On the other hand, some people prefer adventure movies because they <u>offer a more visual and dynamic experience</u>(提供更视觉化、有动感的体验). People can see the story <u>come to life</u> right in front of them, and that's very exciting. (分群体讨论)

3. Why do people like to read adventure books rather than take an adventure?

First of all, <u>based on my observation(基于</u>我的观察), there are many individuals who prefer taking adventures over reading adventure books. Therefore, I don't believe that the statement in the question is entirely accurate("我不认为题干里的陈述是绝对准确的事实"。你可以不同意题干本身,适 合高分学员故意耍矫情). But uhmm, among those people who choose books over real-life adventures, the first reason could be that they, don't have the time, or the money, or the courage to truly take adventures. Many people are trapped/stuck with their 9-to-5 jobs(被困在朝九晚五的工作里), hardly making a living (勉强维持生计), they can't afford to be footloose and fancy-free (无拘无束,自由自在) / take risks. That's why they choose to read those adventure books as it allows them to experience a sense of adventure from the comfort of their own home(足不出户舒舒服服), without having to deal with any of the physical or financial risks. Additionally, reading adventure books is a great way to wind down/let off the steam(解压) and unplug(与外界断联). It's like <u>a perfect way to</u> escape from the real world. Reading those books allows people to fully

<u>immerse themselves in the story(沉浸在故事里)</u> and experience the adventure through the eyes of the characters. (分群体讨论)

4. Who doesn't like to take adventures?

First off, some people are just <u>not into taking adventures</u> as they are <u>risk-averse</u>(不爱冒险的). They are the opposite of <u>daredevils</u>(冒险鬼). They might prefer to <u>stay in their comfort zone</u>(呆在舒适区) rather than exploring new things. For example, my mom, she is totally that. She hates new things and she loves her <u>changeless routine life</u>(一成不变的规律作息生活). She couldn't be happier. And then, there're also some people who may have certain physical or mental limitations that stop them from participating in adventurous activities. So, it's really a personal thing. (分群体讨论+举例子)

5. What kind of personality should people have in order to experience a lot of adventure?

I would say, people who are adventurous <u>by nature (天生地)</u> and <u>have</u> <u>the willingness to (愿意)</u> take risks are more likely to experience a lot of adventures. People who're <u>curious</u>, <u>positive</u>, <u>open-minded</u>, and <u>willing to step outside of their comfort zone</u>. For those people, they are not afraid to <u>face the uncertainty (面对不确定性) /embrace the unknown (拥抱未知)</u>. For example, my cousin is one of this kind of people. She's so curious and brave. She's into all kinds of adventures, and she's definitely <u>living her life</u> <u>to the fullest without any regrets (把生活活到极致,毫无遗憾)</u>. (原因,举例

6. Will experiencing adventure broadens people's horizons?

Absolutely! Experiencing adventure can broaden people's worlds and minds. If a person is constantly exposed <u>to new cultures, customs and</u> <u>lifestyles (新的文化、习俗、生活方式)</u>, it will be easier for them to <u>develop a</u> <u>sense of empathy and understanding for the world around them</u>(发展共情 能力和对周遭世界的理解). They will become more <u>tolerant and accepting</u> with the world, and at the same time, more <u>knowledgeable</u> about the world. Additionally, adventures can also challenge individuals to <u>push</u> <u>themselves out of their comfort zones</u> (把自己推出舒适圈), which leads to <u>personal growth (个人成长)</u> and development. A person without too many experiences may <u>feel stuck</u> in <u>a routine life</u> or <u>a comfort zone</u>, and <u>miss out on opportunities</u> to explore new things and grow as a person. Also, because they never get to practice their <u>problem-solving skills (解决</u> <u>问题能力)</u>, <u>decision-making skills (作决策能力</u>), <u>critical-thinking skills (辩</u> <u>证思考能力)</u> and <u>communication skills</u> (沟通能力), they may struggle a lot to <u>adapt to new situations (适应新情况)</u> or <u>handle unexpected challenges</u> (应对不曾预见的挑战). (正向+反向假设)

I remember one time when I was driving to <u>a job interview</u> in the city(如 果是学生可以改成: I remember one time when I was walking to a dental clinic). I was using <u>a navigation app (导航软件)</u> on my phone to <u>guide</u> <u>me there</u>, and everything seemed to be going well at first. But then, as I was <u>following the directions</u>, I started to realize that something wasn't quite right.

I <u>somehow</u>(不知道怎么搞的)ended up in a residential neighborhood. I checked the app and realized that it had <u>led me off course</u>(偏离方向). I got wrong information from the app. I felt frustrated and anxious because I was already <u>running late(迟到)</u> for <u>the job interview</u>/ <u>dental</u> <u>appointment</u>, and now I was lost. I also felt angry and shocked that even technology could fail me!

I tried really hard to <u>stay calm</u> and <u>think logically</u>. I started asking people in that neighbourhood (thank God they were very friendly) and figured out <u>the correct route</u>. After a few minutes of driving/walking around, I eventually found the right road and <u>made it to the interview/appointment</u> on time.

Looking back on that experience, I learned that sometimes even technology <u>can fail us</u>(让我们失望,不省心), and it's important to keep calm and <u>hone our problem-solving skills(打磨我们的解决问题能力)</u>. And also, never feel shy to <u>turn to people for help</u>!! Moreover, it made me realize how much I rely on my phone and my navigation app, I mean, I should always <u>double-check(反复确认)</u> the directions before <u>heading out</u> <u>(出发)</u>.

Part3 (错误的信息)

1. Why do some people not trust information on the internet?

I think the major reason is that the internet is such an <u>open and limitless</u> <u>platform(开放、无界限的平台)</u> where anybody can <u>publish content(发表内</u> <u>容)</u> which means that not all sources are reliable. Many people don't <u>fact-</u> <u>check(核查事实)</u> before they publish stuff. Therefore, it's very easy for <u>rumors, scandals, misleading information and even fake news(谣言、丑</u> 闻、误导性信息和虚假新闻) to spread on the internet(在网络传播).

Especially now with the <u>AI technology(人工智能技术)</u>, anyone can fake photos and make it look like something that really happened. I remember a few days ago, there was this news about a very <u>severe earthquake</u> <u>taking place</u> in Turkey(在土耳其发生的严重地震). The photos online looked so real that you see <u>the debris(废墟遗骸)</u> and everything. Many people believed it. <u>Volunteers, reporters and medical experts(志愿者、记者、医学</u> <u>专家)</u> all went to Turkey only to found out that it was completely <u>made</u> <u>up(编的)</u>. It's a really dangerous time now. So, <u>it makes sense that</u> many people don't believe everything they see on the internet anymore. I'm actually happy that people have their <u>independent thinking(独立思考能</u> <u>力)</u>. And moreover, the fact that people can <u>leave comment anonymously</u> <u>(匿名留言)</u>, <u>hiding behind fake identities without any accountability</u>, is making things worse. (原因,强调补充,举例子)

2. What jobs provide information to others?

There are so many jobs that involve providing information to others. <u>Off</u> <u>the top of my head (首先想到的是)</u>, <u>reporters and journalists (记者)</u> gather and share news with public. And then lawyers, through their <u>legal</u> <u>expertise (法律专业素养)</u>, they provide clients with information about their rights and <u>legal options (法律选择)</u>. And then, <u>counselors or</u> <u>therapists (顾问和心理治疗师)</u>, they provide information and guidance to their clients to help them make decisions and <u>maintain their mental well-</u> <u>being (维持心理健康)</u>. And also, teachers, <u>in a way (某种程度上)</u>. They are all the time providing information to their students, and that's called <u>imparting knowledge and wisdom(传递知识和智慧)</u>.(罗列)

3. What's the difference between email and phone in terms of providing information?

<u>The way I see it</u>, emails are for <u>detailed content</u> and for <u>conveying</u> <u>complex information</u>. <u>And the biggest upside(最大优点)</u> about it is that

it's <u>a way to document the whole communicatio</u>n(一种存档方式). It

provides <u>a written record(书面记录)</u> that can be easily <u>traced back to(追</u>

<u>溯)</u> in the future. <u>And on the other hand</u>, phone communication is definitely <u>more intimate with a personal touch</u> and <u>instant interaction</u>. You can get a quick <u>back-and-forth information exchange(快速来来回回的</u>

<u>信息交换)</u> through phone calls. It's ideal for <u>urgent matters</u>. In the workplace, phone communication and email communications should <u>go</u> <u>hand in hand(一起出现)</u>. They are different but they definitely

<u>complement each other(相辅相成)</u>.(对比区别讨论)

4. Which do you think is the better way to provide information by phone or by email?

5. How do people determine the accuracy of information? That's a good question... well, when people are <u>suspecting the accuracy of</u> <u>certain information (对某些信息的真实度怀疑)</u>, some of them will <u>cross-</u> <u>reference (交叉引用)</u> the information, meaning, they will compare the information they have with multiple sources to see if they <u>align (达成—</u> <u>致)</u>; and then, looking for <u>trustworthy sources (靠谱的来源)</u>, such as <u>established news organizations (权威新闻机构)</u> or <u>government websites</u> <u>(政府网站)</u>. And some people, they evaluate the information through <u>fact-checking (核查事实)</u>. First, they will check who published the information, what their background is, and then check if the information has turned up on any <u>trusted site(可信任的网站)</u>, things like that. 1. How can people find their way when they're lost?

Nowadays, most people's <u>first reaction</u> is to <u>turn to (求助)</u> their smartphone and find directions from their navigation app. People love it because they can <u>get turn-by-turn guidance (一步步的导航)</u> without knowing how to <u>read a map (看懂地图)</u>. But, if they somehow don't have their phones with them, normally they will <u>look for the biggest landmarks</u> in the surroundings to get a sense of direction (方向感) and <u>a reference</u> <u>point (参照点)</u>. And if neither of these strategies works, that's when they will <u>ask people for directions</u>. Normally they will find someone who looks like <u>a local resident (当地居民)</u> and get some help from them. (罗列)

2. Do you think it's important to do some preparation before you travel to a new place?

Well, personally, I always <u>make sure</u> that I prepare something before I travel to a new place. <u>At least</u> I will <u>book the hotel and flight tickets</u>, and <u>research a little bit about the local culture</u>, because I don't want to be <u>inappropriate(不合时宜的)</u> or <u>do something that is taboo(文化禁忌)</u> in that place. And I know that some young people nowadays really love <u>improvising(即兴发挥)</u> their trips and go to a new place without any preparation. They think that <u>improvisation</u> sounds really cool as it's <u>footloose and fancy-free(无拘无束、了无牵挂)</u>. But I see that as such a waste of time and money as you might end up <u>missing out on a lot of the</u>

<u>must-sees and must-dos(错过很多"必看"和"必做"的事情)</u><u>due to your</u> <u>ignorance(由于你的无知)</u>. You won't really <u>make the most of the trip(无</u> <u>法充分利用好这趟旅行)</u>. And the risky thing is, you might <u>not have a place to</u> <u>crash at night(没有过夜的地方)</u>. That actually happened to me years ago. I went to a place without booking anything and at night I realized that all the hotels were booked. I almost slept on the street. <u>Looking back on that</u> <u>experience</u>, it was stupid to just <u>play cool(耍酷)</u> and prepare nothing.

3. Do you think it's important to be able to read a map?

Many people nowadays are losing the skill of reading a map. They think maps are not <u>relevant(不重要的、不相干的)</u> anymore. 5. Why do some people get lost more easily than others? People are very different. Some people <u>naturally possess a strong sense</u> of direction (天生具有方向感) whereas some people <u>have a weaker sense</u> of direction (方向感弱). For example, my mom. When she's in a new place, she's always <u>clueless about which way is north, south, east, or west</u> (分不清东南西北). Without her trusty GPS app, she'll be completely lost and can't find her way around. And, some other people are just very distracted. It's not necessarily that they are really bad at telling directions. It's just that they are <u>not using their brain power on figuring out the</u> <u>direction (没有把脑力放在分辨方向上)</u>. Also, experience <u>has a lot to do with</u> <u>it(关系也很大)</u>. If someone's always <u>on the go(奔波)</u>, exploring new places and finding their own way, they're more likely to navigate more easily. But for someone who rarely <u>get around</u>, they're <u>bound to(势必)</u> get lost more often. (分群体)

6. How do people react when they get lost?

People's reactions can vary depending on their personality type. Some can still <u>pull themselves together(保持镇定), stay calm</u> and start thinking about strategies. Whether it's <u>retracing their steps(沿着路走回去)</u>, or <u>finding a familiar landmark</u>, or <u>turning to people for help</u>. They focus more on the things they can do to get them out of that situation. Some other people tend to focus more on their own emotions rather than the solutions. They might even go through <u>a panic attack</u> (恐慌发作),

<u>increased heart rate or sweating(心跳加速、流汗)</u>.(分群体)

1. Do you think children should have a lot of toys? I think kids should have toys but not too many. 2. Where do children usually play?

Depending on the age and interest, really. Younger children might play in playgrounds, parks, or at home. Older children might play all kinds of sports with friends <u>at a sports centre</u> or <u>in an open space</u> depending on their personal interest. Some like playing basketball <u>at a basketball court</u>

(篮球场), some like playing football <u>at a football pitch(足球场),</u> some

like playing tennis at a <u>tennis court(网球场)</u>. It's really hard to generalize. Oh, and one place that almost all the kids, <u>regardless of the age</u>, would love to go is an <u>arcade center</u>(电玩中心)! Kids love playing all kinds of

games. (按年龄分群体+补充)

3. Do you think there are too many rules for children to follow, whether at school or at home?

Yes, that's how I feel at present. Schools today have more rules than ever before, covering everything from <u>dress codes(着装要求)</u> to <u>behavior</u>

<u>expectations(行为期待)</u>. At the same time, many parents today are <u>overprotective</u> with their kids and setting too many rules to restrain kids' behavior. I believe that rules are important for kids to learn <u>discipline and</u> <u>responsibility(自觉和责任心)</u>, to teach them <u>"right from wrong"</u>(是非对

错), and to help them <u>build their own</u> value system (建立他们的价值体系).

However, it is also essential <u>to strike a balance between(取得平衡)</u> not having enough rules and having too many rules. kids need the freedom to learn from their mistakes and keep their creativity. Too many rules can <u>overwhelm(淹没)</u> kids and <u>limit their imagination and creativity</u>. And

also, <u>take away</u> their <u>sense of confidence and independence</u>. (原因+反向思 考)

4. Do you think children should follow all the rules?

All the rules? No, certainly not. That's <u>over the top</u>(过分了). I don't

believe that children should follow all the rules <u>blindly</u>(盲目地). The most

important thing is for them to understand the reasoning behind the rules and be able to understand them OR question them if necessary. <u>It's all</u> <u>about finding a balance between following rules and developing</u>

<u>independent-thinking skills(独立思考能力)</u>.(原因)

5. Do you think it's necessary for parents to make decisions for their children?

No, I don't believe so. <u>What I'm saying is that</u>, parents should <u>provide</u> <u>structure and guidance</u> to their children, and teach them to make decisions <u>on their own</u>. When children grow up, they will face the society and <u>adversity in life(生活里的逆境)</u> alone. <u>Having good decision-making</u>

<u>skills</u> is key when <u>dealing with the hardship in life(对抗生活的艰难)</u>. Parents should guide their children to make independent decisions as early as possible to <u>prepare children for the future(准备面对未来)</u>. If parents never let their children decide things on their own, they would lack independence and critical thinking skills. They would be timid and directionless, and wouldn't be able to handle mistakes or failures. (原因+

反向假设)

6. Do you think it's good for parents to help their children choose friends? (三个版本答案)

①Yes, it is beneficial for parents to guide their children in choosing friends. Children are still developing their social skills, parents can provide <u>valuable advice on</u> who might be <u>a good influence(正向影响)</u> and who are not. Especially for young children, they are still quite <u>inexperienced</u> <u>and naïve(没有经验又天真)</u>, can't <u>tell right from wrong</u>. It's important for parents to provide useful insight to help children choose friendships.(原因)

② No, I don't really like the idea. <u>The way I see it</u>, it's important for children to learn how to make their own decisions and <u>develop their own social skills</u>. If parents are <u>too involved (太参与其中)</u> in their children's friendships, it can lead to <u>a lack of independence and confidence</u>. And in a worse case, children may feel pressured to make friends with someone they don't even like just to make their parents happy. <u>Nobody wants to see things like that</u>. It's just wrong. (原因,反向假设)

③ <u>I'm sitting on the fence now (左右为难)</u>. <u>It's really hard to draw the conclusion</u>. <u>On one hand</u>, it's completely natural when parents want to protect their children and make sure they are surrounded by <u>positive influences (争相影响)</u>. <u>On the other hand</u>, children need to learn how to make their own decisions and <u>navigate (行驶, 经历)</u> social situations on their own. <u>It's important to find a balance</u> between guiding their children in choosing friends and respecting their children's <u>autonomy (自主权)</u>, letting them make their own choices. (分头讨论)

I <u>did this pep-talk</u> <u>(做了鼓舞士气的话)</u> in my own head and then started my speech. As I <u>delved deeper into my speech(随着我逐渐进入到我的演讲中)</u> and <u>found my</u> <u>rhythm(找到自己的节奏)</u>, I gradually <u>warmed up(暖身了)</u> and <u>gained</u> <u>confidence.</u>

2. Which one is better, being a communicator or a listener? I think they're both equally important. Being a good communicator, being able to express your true ideas and thoughts, deliver the message clearly (传递信息), being able to avoid all kinds of misunderstandings(避免误 会), those are valuable skills in personal relationships and professional settings(职业场合). And at the same time, being a good listener is also essential. Having empathy (有共情心), showing respect, and being attentive and active (积极又细心的) when listening can foster deeper connection(建立更深的纽带).You see some people, they are listening, but they're not really listening. They're not really listening with their hearts. And that's when misunderstanding shows up. (原因) 3. What qualities does a person need to have to be a good communicator? First, being articulate(善于表达的,口齿清晰) and logically clear(逻辑清 晰) is a good quality. A good communicator can <u>express their thoughts</u> and ideas in a clear and logical way, so that it is easy for people to understand. And then respect and empathy, they go hand in hand (齐头并) 进). A good communicator definitely can <u>put themselves in others' shoes</u>

<u>(换位思考),</u> to see things from other people's perspectives, to show respect to different opinions. And then just like I said, being able to not just listen, but <u>actively listen</u> is very important. You need to really pay attention to people. Show your sincerity by asking questions, giving feedback, things like that. And another thing is <u>facial expression(面部表</u> <u>情)</u> and <u>body language(肢体语言)</u>. They are the <u>non-verbal part(非语言部</u> <u>分)</u> in communication, but they are also vital. Some people have a very <u>serious frowny face(严肃的皱眉的脸)</u> and that always sends a sign of <u>irritation</u>, which is not necessarily true. Having good facial expression management is also one of the qualities.(罗列)

4. What qualities do people need to speak in public? A good public speaker has a lot of confidence and <u>it has a lot to do with</u> <u>their experience (和经验很大关系)</u>. The more experience you have in front of the audience, the more confident you will become, and you will <u>conquer your nerves (克服紧张)</u>. And, we have to know that preparation is also very important. <u>Going off the cuff (即兴发言)</u> is almost impossible. If you want to deliver your message clearly and perfectly, you have to prepare your <u>speech draft (演讲稿)</u> and then practice it beforehand. Next, a good public speaker needs to be <u>full of charisma</u>. They have the ability to <u>keep the audience's attention</u> and <u>keep them engaged (让他们保持注意</u>

<u>力)</u>. They can <u>build the connection</u> without any effort. They can <u>make</u> <u>people laugh</u>. (罗列)

5. What kinds of people often give speeches? Traditionally, public speeches were usually given by <u>politicians, activists,</u> <u>and business leaders (政客、活动家、商业领袖)</u>. But nowadays, we're also seeing the rise of motivational speakers (激励演讲者)</u>. These are individuals who may not be super successful in society, but they're really good at <u>lifting people up (提升人们的境界)</u> and <u>inspiring them (启发他人)</u>. You might find them on social media, giving powerful speeches either on stage or online. Their main goal is to <u>motivate and empower others (鼓舞</u> <u>和给人带来力量),</u> using their <u>speaking skills</u> to <u>spread positivity(传播正能</u> 量).(时间分层)

6. How important is it to be a good listener when communicating? Being a good listener is crucial. A good listener should be able to listen attentively and actively, empathize with people and give constructive feedback. Making people feel heard is the foundation of good communication. A bad listener will make people feel ignored, unheard, and belittled (感到被忽视、未被听到、被轻视). When a bad listener is listening to you, you know they're not really listening. That's a really bad feeling. And that can actually stop people from communicating with each other. (原因,反向假设)

Recently, I watched a <u>romance movie</u> called "XXXX," and unfortunately, I found it to be pretty <u>disappointing and overrated—(令人失望的、过誉的)</u>. The <u>plot was confusing</u>, with too many <u>twists and turns</u> that <u>didn't really</u> <u>add up(逻辑加在一起说不过去)</u>. The characters in the movie were all the time making stupid and unnecessary decisions, which made it hard for me <u>to stay invested in</u> the story. The movie <u>was based on a popular novel</u>, but in my opinion, the <u>movie</u> <u>adaptation(电影翻拍) failed to do justice(未能做到公正的还原)</u> to the original book. I felt that, it <u>deviated too much from the book</u>, and it almost seemed to be irrelevant. It was almost like, the filmmaker didn't even read the book properly(感觉电影制片方都没有好好看原作).

<u>The chemistry(化学反应)</u> between the two main characters was <u>fake and</u> <u>unconvincing</u>. <u>I just couldn't buy it</u>(我不相信). The actor, oh my god, <u>could his facial expressions be more limited</u>(他的面目表情还能再少一点吗)? His performance felt <u>so wooden and numb</u>. The actress in the movie looked 0 interested in the man. It was hard to believe that they were truly in love.

Another thing I couldn't understand was that, why did the director <u>put</u> <u>some cheap-looking special effects</u> into the movie(为什么放了一些廉价感十 足的特效)? It was totally <u>unexpected and unnecessary</u>. At some point, I was laughing out loud.

Anyway, as a fan of the book, I really <u>had very high hopes(期待很大)</u> of the <u>movie adaption</u>. But unfortunately, it failed to <u>live up to my</u> <u>expectations(没能满足我的期待)</u>. The poor plot, bad acting, and the lousy special effects were <u>all major turnoffs</u>(让是失去兴趣的原因) for me. I don't recommend it, AT ALL!

1. Do you believe movie reviews?

Yes and no. Yes, I do believe that movie reviews can <u>provide me with</u> <u>some valuable insights and opinions</u> to <u>help me see things from different</u> <u>perspectives</u>. Sometimes when I couldn't fully understand a movie, I'll search different movie reviews, trying to <u>gain perspectives</u> and <u>a better</u> <u>understanding of the movie</u>. But I also recognize that movie reviews are very subjective (主观的), very personal (个人的), and sometimes they are <u>biased</u>. They don't necessarily <u>resonate with me(和我共鸣)</u> or <u>align</u> <u>with my personal taste(和我的个人品味一致)</u>. So, I always see movie reviews as just <u>a reference(参考)</u>. I still prefer to watch the movie myself and form my own judgment(形成自己的判断).(分头讨论)

2. What are the different types of films in your country? Movies genres in China are no different from the rest of the world(电影种 类和全世界一样). We have <u>romance</u>, <u>comedy</u>, and <u>historical drama</u>. These three I would say are the most popular genres in the movie theatres. And there are also <u>art films(文艺电影)</u> that are really <u>thought-provoking and</u> <u>slow-paced</u>, and also, suspense, thriller, horror movies, and so on. 3. Are historical films popular in your country and why?

Yes, I would say historical films are quite popular in China as they <u>offer</u> <u>the opportunity for audience to go back and connect with</u> our <u>rich history</u> <u>and culture</u>. We are very proud of our <u>cultural heritage(文化传承)</u>. Those movies remind us of who we are, where we come from, and what we are proud of. They really <u>unite us together(团结在一起)</u>.(原因)

4. Do you think films with famous actors and actresses are more likely to become successful films?

Usually yes. A film with famous movie stars is more likely to <u>succeed at</u> <u>box office(票房大卖),</u> because those superstars' <u>fan base</u> can normally

<u>translate into</u> big ticket sales. Fans are <u>drawn to(被吸引)</u> see their

favorite idols <u>on big screen(大荧幕)</u>, that's why they will pay for the tickets. The more famous you are, the higher you will get paid and the more chances you will be exposed to. <u>However, it doesn't mean that</u> it will 100% guarantee <u>a success at box office</u> as a film is not <u>solely determined</u> by (不管是被唯一一个因素决定) the popularity of the actors. There are other

factors that should be <u>taken into consideration(需要要被考虑)</u> like the plot, the acting skills, the direction, the soundtrack and special effects(故 事情节、演技、导演、背景音乐和特效). (反向思考)

5. Why are Japanese animated films so popular?

To be honest, I'm never a big fan of Japanese animation, so I don't really know why. I guess, they often have very <u>captivating storylines</u>(吸引人的故 <u>事线)</u> that attract both children and adults. And they have a <u>unique art</u> <u>style</u> that is <u>visually stunning</u>(视觉上很好看). (原因。实在不喜欢日本漫画, 对不起说不出来太多内容)

6. Should the director pay a lot of money to famous actors? <u>It depends on what the budget is</u>. If it's a <u>blockbuster (大片儿)</u> that aiming at becoming <u>the next box-office hit (下一个票房冠军)</u>, and if you have the budget to pay a super star, then theoretically getting a famous actor can <u>higher the chance of succeeding (增加成功的可能性)</u>. But if it's a <u>low-budget art film (小成本文艺片)</u>, then whether the actor is famous or not is not the most important thing. <u>In that case</u>, there's no need to spend <u>tons of money</u> on <u>casting</u> the most expensive movie star. There're so many <u>less-known</u> but super talented actors who can <u>bring characters to</u> <u>life</u>. (分类讨论)

and enjoy shopping. (原因,先抑后扬)

2. What kind of clothes do most people wear in your country? I feel that, China is just like most of other countries in this world, people are wearing the <u>so-called modern Western-style clothes</u> (所谓的欧美风格) <u>on a day-to-day basis</u>, meaning, jeans, t-shirts, denim jackets, things like that for <u>casual occasions</u>; and suits, shirts and ties for <u>business occasions</u>. We do have our traditional clothes, but it's just not for an <u>everyday look</u> (但是不是那种日常风格). On some <u>special occasions</u>, like traditional festivals or special events, some people wear qipao or hanfu to make it more special, and <u>increase the sense of ceremony (增加仪式感)</u>. But other than that, <u>on a day-to-day basis</u>, people still go for the casual, easy, and simple look. (主流情况,特殊情况)

3. Under what circumstances would people in your country wear formal clothes?

Well, like I mentioned just now, on those business occasions, people will <u>dress up(盛装)</u> to <u>look more presentable(看着更像样)</u>. So, suits, shirts, ties, dress shoes... This is like the basic rule. You want to "Be sharp and

look sharp". And on some formal or special occasions, like a dinner party, a traditional festival people will also <u>dress up</u>, not necessarily in the super formal way, but dress up nicely to show respect. (分情况,细节)

4. What is the difference between the clothing of the elderly and the young in China?

Young people <u>tend to</u> wear things that are <u>edgy, sleek, bold and more</u> provocative or slim-fit(先锋小众的、酷的、张扬大胆的、更暴露的或修身的), to

<u>express their personal style and true self(表达个人风格和真我)</u>, and

<u>celebrate their youth</u>(庆祝自己的青春). On the other hand, older people would go for more conservative, low-key and loose-fit style(保守低调又宽

松). The colours are normally darker. I feel like older people don't want to grab people's attention, whereas younger people just want to do the

opposite. (对比讨论)

5. When do people in your country wear traditional clothes? Well, like I said, during those traditional cultural celebrations, some people will wear traditional clothes. For example, during Chinese New Year, it is very normal for people to wear qipao or tangzhong <u>to celebrate</u> <u>the occasion (</u>庆祝该场合) and also to <u>show respect to our own cultural</u> <u>root (</u>对我自己文化根基的致敬) . And another example I can think of, traditional clothing is also worn for wedding ceremonies. Sometimes <u>the</u> <u>bride and the groom (新娘新郎)</u> choose to wear traditional Chinese hanfu instead of <u>the typical white wedding gown and black suit (</u>典型的白婚纱— <u>—</u>黑西服套装) .1 think the fact that we are Chinese and we are proud to be Chinese makes us want to wear our own clothes on this most special day

in our life. And <u>another trend(另一个趋势)</u> that I've noticed is that,

among young people, there is this <u>growing interest</u>(增长的兴趣) of traditional clothes. I've seen many many young people <u>blend traditional</u> <u>elements into their everyday fashion style</u>, and I really like what I'm seeing. Traditional clothing is definitely <u>making a come-back</u>(传统服饰正 在强势归来!!!))!(罗列)

6. Does the climate affect what people wear?

1. What do young people like to save money for?

Well, some young people save up for <u>a designer bag(奢侈品包包)</u> or a pair of expensive sneakers, you know, <u>fashion items</u> that they like and can <u>show off(炫耀)</u>. Some young people save up for a unique experience, like a trip to another country or learning how to fly an airplane. Some people save up for their education. If they want to <u>pursue higher education(继续深造)</u>, they have to save enough to pay for the tuition. And some young people save up for the future. They just want to have more money in the bank to <u>have a sense of financial security(有一种</u>资产保障感).(分群体)

2. Is it easy for people to save money to buy something expensive? For some people yes and for some others no. For those people who <u>have</u> <u>no idea</u> how to save up, who doesn't have the technique or the right mindset, <u>it takes forever(很久很久)</u> to save up even for just a little amount of money, or even worse, many people nowadays are having <u>credit card debt</u>(卡债), which is really really bad. And for some people who <u>make good money</u> and <u>live a low-key lifestyle(挣钱多+会过日子)</u>, it is

relatively easy for them to save up and they can use the money to invest wisely and continue accumulating wealth. (分群体)

3. Should children have pocket money and why?

I think it is a good idea for children to <u>have an allowance</u> because, A, children need money for small things like snacks, pencils and notebooks, and if they don't have any money, it will be very annoying. And then B, some parents give children an allowance by asking them to <u>help around the house</u>. In that case, that can really <u>foster children's sense of responsibility and ownership</u>. And C, when children have their own money, parents should guide them to <u>manage their own money</u>, either spend it or save it up for something more meaningful. The <u>money management skill</u> is something that is so essential for everybody and parents should foster that skill in children <u>from an early age</u>. (罗列)

4. Should children learn how to use money at school or from their parents?

It doesn't matter whether children learn how to use money from school or their parents, <u>as long as</u> (只要) they <u>get the proper knowledge and tools</u> <u>(得到正确的知识和工具)</u>, and can use those tools in real life. <u>One thing I</u> <u>want to point out is</u> (我想要指出的是) that, parents should <u>definitely work</u> <u>with</u> the school to <u>instill the concept in children</u> (灌输理念), because every household has its own unique <u>financial situation</u> (每家都有自己的特殊 情况). Parents should be the ones who help their kids <u>adapt to the real-</u> life situation. (原因,强调)

5. How do people save money?

I think what most people will do is first <u>set a goal, make a plan</u> and try to <u>stick to it</u>. But different people might have different <u>approaches</u>(路线). Some would try to make more money by having a <u>side-hustle (副业, 外</u> <u>快)</u>, making more in order to save more. Some people will try harder on <u>reducing expenses (减少开支)</u> by <u>cutting back on non-essential things</u> <u>(削减非必要消费)</u>, things that are <u>luxurious</u>(奢侈). For example, if you always <u>fly first class</u>(飞一等座), now it's time to <u>go economics (经济舱)</u>. Some people will invest in some <u>bank plans</u> or <u>stocks (股票)</u> or <u>bonds</u>(债券) to manage their money more wisely. Some people just, in general, live a very <u>frugal lifestyle</u>(节俭的生活方式), try to save as much as possible in every aspect in their lives. It depends on your goal, your timeline, if it's a long-term or short-term goal, the approach will be different. (分群体)

6. Why can't some people save money?

It is really hard for some people to save money because some of them even <u>struggle to make both ends meet(入不敷出)</u>. They come from <u>low-</u> <u>income families(低收入家庭)</u> and <u>live paycheck to paycheck(月光族)</u>. They are trying to just survive. And for some people, they have really bad <u>spending habits</u>(消费习惯). They have a lot of <u>high expenses</u>, buy the most expensive things and <u>live a really luxurious lifestyle</u>. They keep <u>abusing their credit cards</u>(浪费信用卡) and <u>end up having lot of credit</u> <u>card debts</u>(最终债台高筑). And another situation is that many people <u>do</u> <u>not have the basic financial literacy</u>(没有任何财金常识), meaning, they don't understand how it works, how to save money. They don't know that all these small things can make a big difference. Making a little bit more money, spending more wisely, quitting bad habits, investing a little bit more. Things like that. (分群体讨论)

After graduation, teenagers need to decide whether to continue their education(继续学习), or take a gap year (gap 一年), or find a job, basically important decisions that will shape their future(塑造未来). 3. Who can children turn to for help when making a decision?

Children, especially younger children will <u>turn to their parents</u> for advice. Their parents are their <u>support systems</u> (支持体系) /rocks/ anchors and can help them <u>weigh up all the pros and cons</u> (掂量所有的优缺利弊). And then, sometimes children also go to their teachers for help, especially if it's a decision related to their education. When children become older, they <u>seek advice from their peers</u> (同伴) as <u>they are the same age</u> (同 龄) and can understand each other better. I think it's important for children to <u>feel supported</u> and <u>get the guidance and resource</u> they need from their <u>trusted ones</u> (信任的人). (分群体讨论) 4. Do you think advertisements can influence our decisions when shopping? (两个版本)

 Depends on the quality of the ad. A really well-designed and wellcrafted/well-made ad (一个精心设计、制作精良的广告) can immediately draw people in / grab people's attention (吸引注意力) and persuade people to buy. On the other hand, a poorly made ad with a confusing or unconvincing message (信息混乱、没有说服力) is unlikely to touch people's hearts (触动心弦) or make an impression on them (留下印象).

② It's a personal thing. Some individuals are more impressionable/ susceptible (容易受影响的) to the messages delivered in ads. They lose their rationality (失去理智) when they see a juicy and yummy ad ("美味 多汁"的好看的广告) in front of them, especially when there's a big promotion (有大促销). They just can't wait to jump on the bandwagon (跟风、随大流). Meanwhile some other people are less <u>swayed/</u> influenced (被影响) by ads. They are <u>self-collected (自持力很强)</u> and have critical thinking skills. they don't <u>shop impulsively (冲动地消费)</u> just because they like the ad. People are very different. (分群体讨论)
5. Do you think the influence of advertising is good?

<u>I'm not sure. It's hard to say</u>. On one hand, advertising can inform(提供信 息) us about new products, new promotions and new services that we may find useful, in that case, it can make our lives better. On the other hand, it can cause over-consumerism(带来过度消费). We get stimulation constantly and we just want to keep buying and buying more. Another thing is, some advertisements contain misleading, exaggerated or fake claims(错位引导、夸张的甚至虚假的声称). That can really hurt our lives. In all, being able to keep our rationality, using our critical thinking skills when making decision is key (至关重要的). (分头讨论)。 6. How can people usually make an important decision? Uhmmm, people usually would start form gathering enough information to support their decision-making process. Analyze all the options, and then compare them, and weigh up the pros and cons. And then, they might seek help and advice from the outside world, like turn to their parents, friends, people who have had similar experience, experts, even <u>netizens</u>(网民 net+citizen=netizen) online, haha. And finally, they will go

back to their own mind, their value system, their priorities in life. Some people are more rational, and some are more impulsive and mainly listen to their <u>gut feelings(直觉大感觉)</u>. Yeh, something like that.(罗列)

1.What decisions do people usually make in their daily lives?

Well, we make <u>hundreds and thousands of</u> decisions every day. Some are more <u>on the subconscious level</u>, like, going to the washroom, scratching your head, drinking water, thing like that. Some are <u>on the conscious</u> <u>level</u>, for example, what to eat for lunch, for dinner, who to meet after

school, after work, when to go to bed, things like that. (分类讨论)

2.Which is easier, making a decision by yourself or after a group discussion?

-For me, I love making decisions <u>on my own</u>. Many people say that <u>group</u> <u>decision-making</u> is better because there'll be more information involved. An individual cannot have all the information. And additionally, there will be <u>a variety in views and insights</u> after a group discussion. But based on my personal experience, making a decision alone is way easier than making a group decision. Group decision-making sounds nice, but <u>in the</u> <u>reality</u>, it always ends up <u>chaotic and directionless</u>. The more voices involved, the more difficult it is to <u>make a call</u>(最终做出决定,拍板儿).

Therefore, making decisions alone is more effective and efficient.(主流观

点+自己观点)

- I love group decisions. It's so much easier to <u>come up with a mutual</u> <u>decision</u> together. I'm not a very <u>strong-minded person</u>. Sometimes I'm very <u>indecisive</u>. And sometime it's impossible for me to <u>take every aspect</u> <u>into consideration</u>. People always say that "together is better than alone". I <u>can't agree more</u> (不能够更同意). Group discussions can involve more voices and perspectives into decision-making. The decision made in the group <u>is fully and carefully weighed</u> by everyone. (主流观点+自己观点)

3. Why are many young people unwilling to follow their parents' advice?

I guess, first, young people are <u>at the age where</u> they want to be more independent; they want to <u>explore things</u> and <u>learn their life lessons</u> on their own. Therefore, they tend to be very <u>rebellious</u>(叛逆的) and always want to say no to their parents' advice; and next, I do think there're <u>generation gaps</u> between the young and the old. It's a <u>natural thing</u> as they grow up in different environment and cultures. So, it's not that easy for the two generations to <u>agree to disagree</u>. They <u>think in different ways</u>, and <u>do things in different manners</u>. (罗列原因)

4. Why would middle-aged people tend to second-guess their own decisions?

Because when people get older, they often <u>value things differently</u>. They don't necessarily agree with the things they used to believe in. That's why they have a <u>second thought</u>. For example, some young people choose to <u>drop out</u>(退学) and just <u>live in the moment</u>, become a surfer, a waitress, a leader singer in a band. But years later, they realize that they need to be able to <u>pay the bills</u> and <u>provide for</u> their family. And that's when they start to question their own decisions. That's the famous "middle-age crisis" (中年危机). (原因+举例子)

But again, I'm not an expert, <u>I could be wrong(我有可能说的不对)</u>.(时间分层,分群体)

2. Do boys and girls play different games?

Again, <u>I'm not an expert on kids</u>, so I don't really want to say that boys and girls play completely different games. I'm pretty sure the games they play would overlap at certain level. And also, I don't know anything about video games. But when it comes to younger kids, <u>based on my childhood</u> <u>memory</u>, I do remember that most of the boys would be <u>running and</u> <u>shooting each other</u> with their <u>imaginative guns</u> (想象中的枪), or playing games that are more based on competition and maybe a little bit of violence, whereas girls would be more into social games, like role-playing

3. Are outdoor sports important for kids?

<u>hooked on(被迷住)</u> their screens and playing video games instead of

playing sports games outside. (罗列原因)

4. Why do people play different games now than before? I think it is because of the <u>new lifestyle</u> we're living now. It's all <u>connected</u>

(都是互相影响的). Nowadays people are living a more <u>sedentary lifestyle</u>

(久坐生活方式). People sit more and walk, run less. We drive to different places. We sit down in front of the computer and work all day. We come home and sit down more in front of the TV and watch TV all night. <u>As</u> technology has advanced, our lifestyle has changed dramatically as well. That's why we are having completely different ways in terms of <u>getting</u> entertained (取得娱乐) and <u>engaging in leisure activities</u>. Video games today have much better graphics and better immersive experiences. VR technology has opened up new doors for gaming experiences. That's why people play video games more than any other games today. It's the easiest way. In the past, we didn't even have those options. (时间分层) 5. Is winning important in games?

①For me, yes. I feel that <u>having the mindset(拥有一份意识)</u> of <u>always</u> wanting to be the best</u>(总想做最好), <u>always wanting to win</u>, is very important and also valuable. It motivates a person to <u>keep trying</u>, <u>keep</u> working hard, and try to <u>stand out from the rest(脱颖而出)</u>. Playing games should be a really enjoyable process. You learn about new things and you get to spend some time with your peers. But I have to say when I was younger, I used to be so competitive. I would try anything to win, but sometimes I lost the fun <u>along the way</u>. (时间分层) 6. Which is better, individual games or team-based games? It depends on what you want. If you're not a <u>people person(喜欢人群的</u> 人), you <u>hate dealing with people</u>(痛恨和人打交道) and you're not good

at communicating, then of course, individual games are the right choice. But if you are a <u>sociable person</u>, a <u>social butterfly(交际花)</u>, you <u>have a</u> <u>strong team spirit(团队精神强)</u>, and you <u>have strong interpersonal skills</u> (社交技能强), then team-based games should be your go-to. <u>力的), fun(有趣的)</u>, and can <u>teach them about things</u>. They don't like boring content, that's why they will never like textbooks. And also, it <u>depends on the age</u>. For younger kids, they really like <u>picture books</u> with a lot of colorful and bright <u>illustrations</u>(插画) and then maybe other

<u>interactive elements(互动元素)</u> like audio and lights. As they grow older, they are <u>at the age</u> where they really want to learn, they're very curious and full of imagination. They probably will like books with superhero stories and <u>exciting plots(精彩的情节)</u> or books that can teach them new things like science or history.(分群体讨论)

Well, it's hard to generalize. Some young people like books that are <u>suspenseful and thrilling</u>, like <u>crime books</u> or <u>detective books</u>. This kind of books can help young people <u>kill time</u> and <u>loosen up</u>. And some young people, especially young girls, like to read romantic novels. They are quite <u>entertaining and enjoyable, perfect for passing the time</u>. (分群体))

First, children can <u>hone their reading skills(打磨阅读能力)</u> and <u>language</u> <u>skills(语言能力)</u> through reading. Reading is a great way to help kids <u>build vocabulary(建立词汇)</u> and <u>improve their grammar</u>. A <u>well-read(饱读</u> <u>诗书的)</u> child is most likely more <u>articulate(善于表达)</u> than his peers. Secondly, books can teach kids about general knowledge around the world, whether it's history, science, or different cultures. Kids can learn those things in a very <u>detail-oriented and in-depth way</u>. And when kids read books, especially novels with plots and different characters, they get to learn <u>empathy(共情)</u> and <u>develop their emotional intelligence(发展情</u> <u>商)</u> by thinking from different perspectives and learn to <u>put themselves</u> <u>into other people's shoes</u>(换位思考). What else, reading can also help improve a kid's patience. Reading requires <u>a certain level of</u> <u>concentration</u>, which can help develop a kid's ability to pay attention for extended periods of time. There' re so many benefits of reading.(罗列)

3. Do people prefer to read e-books or print books in your country? People have different preferences. Some people, especially older people who are quite <u>nostalgic (怀旧的)</u> would prefer <u>paper books</u> as they are more <u>tactile (有触觉的)</u>. I mean, you can <u>hold the book in your hands, turn</u> the pages, touch the paper, and <u>smell the paper and the ink</u>. Many readers love that part. And then, <u>print books are easier on the eyes (眼睛</u> <u>轻松)</u>, there won't be <u>eye strain (眼睛酸痛)</u>. On the other hand, there're also many people love E-books, especially younger generation. E-books are easier to <u>carry around</u> as they are <u>lightweight</u>. And you can <u>stock</u> <u>multiple books (储存好几本书)</u> in one electronic device, which is very handy (方便). And additionally, <u>price-wise</u>, E-books tend to be much cheaper than traditional books as they don't consume paper, and they are more <u>environmentally friendly</u>. (分群体讨论)

4. Do you think people need to develop the habit of reading and why? Well, many people would say that we're now living in a <u>visual-oriented</u> age (以视觉为导向的时代) with the rise of the internet and social media (随 着社交媒体的兴起), which means there has been a shift from reading books to watching visual content (有一个转变,从读书到观看视觉内容) such as videos and photos. And they say, information is information. As long as we can get information and learn things, we shouldn't be <u>picky/choosy</u> with the format (对形式很挑剔). But I don't see it that way. I think it is still very essential to develop the habit of reading. Like I said, reading is

learning things <u>in-depth</u> and <u>in a more solid way(以扎实的带深度的方式学</u>

习). It's a great way to <u>expand our knowledge</u> and <u>improve our</u>

<u>vocabulary.</u> At the same time, through reading, we can develop a lot of <u>critical thinking skills</u>. Another thing is, reading is silent, so you have a lot of time listening to yourself, your own <u>inner thoughts</u>, and <u>actively think</u> with the book rather than <u>passively receiving</u> information from the video. And also, reading is a great way to <u>foster patience</u> and <u>let off the steam</u>, meanwhile <u>enjoy some solitude</u> (享受独处时光). Therefore, it should still

be a valuable habit to develop. (主流观点,自己观点,逆)

5. Do you think reading books can make people happier?

Yes, for sure. Reading books can <u>bring people joy</u> in different ways. When you read a novel, it's <u>therapeutic and rewarding(治愈的、有成就感的)</u>, and

it <u>provides you with an escape from your reality (提供逃离现实的出口)</u>, which makes people <u>feel lighter in mood</u> and happier. Even if sometimes you cry with the story, <u>it doesn't mean that</u> you're sad. You're just experiencing this <u>emotional connection (情感连接)</u> with the book. And the fact that you're forgetting about your own trouble in life means this book is providing you with a <u>positive energy</u>. And then, some <u>professional</u> <u>books</u> can teach you a lot of useful things about the world and <u>expand</u> <u>your knowledge</u> (拓展知识). The feeling of learning is very rewarding. It <u>brings people a sense of achievement (带来成就感)</u>. And <u>when it comes to</u> self-help books, all the advice and practical tips can give people <u>a sense</u> <u>of direction</u> in life so they don't feel <u>hopeless and clueless</u> anymore. (分类 别讨论)

6. Do you think e-books will make people read more and why?

I first got interested in this job when I was visiting a panda center/ panda sanctuary(大熊猫饲养基地) in Chengdu, the hometown of giant pandas. I was <u>impressed with</u> how well the pandas were taken care of and how much the keepers loved their jobs. And then, I saw the job/recruitment ad <u>(招聘启事)</u> at the center. From that moment on, I knew that I wanted to work with pandas too.

In terms of what skills it requires to be a <u>panda keeper</u>, well, it actually requires a lot of <u>hard work</u> and <u>dedication</u>. Firstly, of course you need to <u>have a deep love</u> for animals, especially pandas, as well as the willingness to <u>work long hours</u> and <u>get your hands dirty</u> (长时间干脏活). Like, picking up the <u>feces</u> (粪便), cleaning pandas, and cleaning their <u>dens</u> (洞穴), making sure that they live in a place with <u>good hygiene</u> (卫生). And when a new baby panda is born, you need to hold it all the time, feeding it, petting it. <u>Panda cubs</u> (熊猫幼崽) are very <u>needy and clingy</u> (粘人的) little things, just like <u>human babies</u> (人类幼崽).

But <u>despite the hard work</u>, being a panda keeper would be an <u>incredibly</u> <u>rewarding job</u>. I will get to spend my days working with these amazingly cute animals, seeing them <u>living and thriving(绽放)</u> at the sanctuary. At the same time, <u>making my contribution</u> to their conservation. That's a very meaningful job indeed.

So, I really want to be: a <u>hotel reviewer</u>(酒店试睡员). I know, that's a real job! Basically, all you need to do is <u>traveling around the world</u> and <u>sleeping in different hotels</u>. Hello? How hard can it be?! I mean, who wouldn't want to <u>get paid</u> to travel around and stay in all kinds of amazing hotels?!!!(hello,在这里表示,很显而易见,你还好吗?这差事谁能不 要? ! 学不来就先放弃) <u>I first heard about this job</u> when I was reading a travel magazine and saw an article about <u>a hotel reviewer</u> who got to stay in the world's most <u>luxurious hotels</u>(豪华酒店). I was instantly <u>hooked on</u>(被迷住) the idea!

According to the magazine, to become a <u>hotel reviewer</u>, you need to have <u>a true passion for travel</u> and a keen eye for detail(对细节的执着). You

need to be able to <u>spot</u>(发现) both the good and the bad parts of a hotel, from <u>the quality of the room</u> to <u>the service provided by the staff</u>. You also need to <u>have a good level of writing</u>, meaning, be able to write your reviews <u>in an organized and interesting way</u> that will help other travelers make decisions about where to stay.

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Which is totally me!! I'm <u>an avid traveler(旅行狂热者)</u> AND I'm a member of both the <u>book club</u> and <u>writing club</u> in my school(我是我们学校读书俱乐 部和写作俱乐部的成员). <u>Can this job be more suitable for me</u>(这个工作能够更 适合我一点吗)?! <u>It's right up my alley(正是我的领域所在)</u>.

Part3:

1. What are the most popular jobs for young people in your country? I feel that China is very similar to the rest part of the world. The most popular jobs for young people are often in the booming tech industry (正 在蓬勃发展的科技产业), such as <u>software engineering</u>, <u>data analysis</u>, <u>virtual</u> reality and <u>artificial intelligence</u>. China is also <u>going through a digital</u> <u>transformation (数字变革)</u> and there's a lot of potential in the tech industry. And other jobs that I can think of are finance, marketing, ecommerce, especially e-commerce. We are the biggest online shopping country in the world. E-commerce is where all the investments go to. (*罗 列*)

2. What is the difference between high-income and low-income jobs in your country?

First of all, the job requirements (工作要求) are different. High-income jobs often require higher and more advanced educational background with specialized skills, whereas low-income jobs tend to be more relying on labor (依赖劳动力) and require less education, such as people who work in manufacturers or construction sites (工厂或工地). And another difference is the wage (工资), of course. It's pretty self-explanatory (看名 字就能理解). Typically, high-income jobs can offer a higher salary with better benefits, and low-income jobs will just provide minimal wage (提供 基本工资) and fewer benefits. (罗列)

3. When is the right time for young people to start making serious plans for their future careers?

I feel that high school would be a good time to start thinking about things like this. Students can explore different <u>career options</u> and start asking their teachers and parents to get more information so that they can make a decision <u>later on</u>. It doesn't have to be a really clear <u>career goal</u>. They don't have to <u>figure out everything (所有都搞明白)</u> at that age, but at least they need to start thinking about their <u>interests</u>, <u>strengths</u>, their core <u>values</u>, and their priorities in life, do they want to keep <u>pursuing higher</u> <u>education</u> at university or get job training at <u>vocational school (职业学</u> 校)? Things like that.

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4. Which job have the highest salaries?

To be honest, I'm not really aware of how much each industry makes. I'm just talking about my <u>stereotypes</u>(成见) here. Normally in China, people who work in finance and tech industry <u>earn a really good salary</u> with <u>good</u> <u>bonuses</u>, like <u>investment banker</u>(投行), <u>software engineer</u>, <u>data analyst</u>, <u>product manager</u>, jobs like those are really <u>glamorous and well-paid</u>(风光 钱又多). And also, <u>stereotypically</u>, dentist, surgeons also make really good money. And then <u>what else</u>? Lawyer. Yes, lawyers are really <u>well off</u>, especially those ones who own their own law firms. (罗列) 5. Which jobs pay low wages but require a high level of skill? The first thing comes to mind, social worker (社工). This is such a meaningful but difficult job in my opinion. Social workers are so <u>selfless</u> (无私的) and they're always willing to help people in need, helping them with their families and communities, <u>tackling a lot of issues(解决很多问题</u>) such as <u>mental health problems, violence, abuse, poverty, drug</u> <u>addiction and housing insecurity(精神问题、暴力、虐待、贫困、毒瘾和无家可</u> <u>归)</u>. You need to be really loving and caring, really strong and tough, and <u>have a high level of education</u> related to psychology. And yet they are paid relatively low and that's really unfair. (原因)

6. Do you think it's important for secondary schools to offer career advice to students?

I believe it's absolutely important. Many students are <u>too young to figure</u> <u>out what they want in life</u>. They are very <u>unsure about their career goals</u> and they are not even aware of <u>the job options out there on the job</u> <u>market (就业市场)</u>. Therefore, schools should definitely <u>enlighten them</u>, and help them make decisions. <u>As a matter of fact</u>, I see countries like Canada and the States, high schools provide all kinds of job advice and <u>training programs</u> to let students experience working life. For example, they have hair-styling program, landscaping program, cooking and baking program. Students can go to different programs, try it out and figure out what they like and dislike. I think this is so smart. Students can definitely know themselves better through these programs. (原因, 举例 子)

Today, I'd like to talk about a traditional celebration in China: <u>The Moon</u> <u>Festival(中秋节)</u>, also known as the <u>Mid-Autumn Festival</u>. The Moon Festival is <u>an ancient Chinese celebration</u> that <u>takes place</u> on the 15th day of the eighth month <u>of lunar calendar (阴历)</u>, when the moon is believed to be the <u>biggest, roundest, and brightest (最大、最圆、</u> <u>最亮)</u>.

In terms of what we do to celebrate this special day, well, the most important tradition is to <u>eat mooncakes (吃月饼)</u>, which are super <u>tasty</u> <u>round-shaped pastries filled with various delicious fillings (好吃又圓形的带</u> <u>馅儿的点心)</u> such as lotus seed (莲仁儿), red bean (红豆), or <u>even salted</u> <u>egg yolks (咸蛋黄)</u>. They're very <u>high in calories (高热量)</u>, <u>1 have to admit</u>, and they're very <u>heavy on the stomach (不好消化)</u>, but <u>it's really worth it</u> <u>(很值得)</u> and also, it's just once per year (一年一次), very much like how people in North America would <u>save roasted turkey for Thanksgiving (把</u> <u>火鸡都留在感恩节吃)</u>. You know what I mean? When you <u>spot a mooncake</u>, it's <u>an instant reminder of (即可的提醒)</u> the Moon Festival, just like how <u>turkey screams Thanksgiving (火鸡呐喊着感恩节)</u>! So, we eat mooncakes with our families and friends, sharing and exchanging different flavours, meanwhile <u>enjoying the time together</u>.

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Another thing my family and I would do, which is also very common among other Chinese families, is to <u>appreciate the beauty of the moon</u> <u>(赏月, 欣赏月亮之美)</u>. Normally we go to the balcony with a better view, and <u>set up a small table (支一个小桌子)</u> with food and snacks, such as fruits, tea, and of course, a plate of mooncakes. As we <u>gaze at (凝视)</u> the moon while <u>sipping on the tea (小口抿茶)</u>, we <u>do/solve riddles (猜字谜)</u>. It is a tradition to write riddles on a small piece of paper and let other people guess the answer, you know, to <u>spice it up (加点佐料, 炒气氛)</u> and make it more exciting. My understanding is that, <u>back in the old days (在 很久以前)</u> in ancient China, people's ways of <u>getting entertained (找乐子)</u> were quite limited, they didn't have TV, radio, not even newspapers. Therefore, <u>solving riddles</u> was like an interactive and fun game that everyone could participate. it added more fun and could <u>bring people</u> <u>together</u>. That's why I love this festival. It's a time when family <u>get reunited (团聚)</u> and <u>spend quality time together</u>. We taste mooncakes, we talk and laugh, share stories, <u>practise gratitude (实践感恩)</u>. I have so many <u>fond</u> <u>memories</u> about this day.

So, yeh, that's the traditional celebration. Thank you.

1. Is it important for children to learn traditional festivals at school? It's so essential. <u>The way I see it</u>, schools really <u>play an important role in</u>

(其重要角色) teaching children about their own <u>cultural identity and</u> <u>heritage(文化认同感和文化传承)</u>, and <u>bring everybody together(把大家团结</u> <u>在一起)</u> and <u>promote a sense of community(促进团体感)</u>. Through learning about traditional festivals, children can <u>have a better and deeper</u> <u>understanding of(更好的理解)</u> who they are and where they come from <u>(自己是谁,从哪里来)</u>, and then <u>gain a deeper appreciation of their own</u> <u>culture(对自己文化的欣赏)</u>. They will have higher self-esteem and feel proud of who they are. (原因,正向假设)

2. Do children like to learn about traditional festivals? Some do and some don't. Some kids naturally <u>feel connected</u> to their <u>cultural root (文化根基)</u> and are very interested in all kinds of traditions, whereas some kids <u>couldn't care less (完全不关心)</u> about things like this. And also, I feel that <u>it has a lot to do with (与……有很大关系)</u> the style and the way of teaching. If <u>school teachers (学校老师)</u> can teach traditional festivals in a very <u>fun and engaging way</u>, for example, playing games, playing musical instruments, learning to sing a song, or doing <u>stage plays</u> <u>(舞台剧)</u> by wearing <u>traditional costumes</u>, I think kids will naturally feel more engaged in learning. (分群体+假设+举例子)

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3. Why do people hold events to celebrate?

Some people <u>have a strong sense of ceremony/ritual(仪式感很强)</u>, they love holding events such as birthday parties, weddings and anniversary dinners in order to create <u>lasting memories(长久的回忆)</u>. I think it's a really beautiful thing to do. Personally<u>, I'm the kind of person who loves</u> <u>hosting events for special occasions(直播课经典句型)</u>. For me, that's the best way to celebrate the moment. And also, those celebrations can <u>bring</u> <u>people together</u> and express gratitude, joy, and appreciation towards <u>one</u> <u>another</u>. (原因)

4. Are traditional festivals disappearing?

<u>I wouldn't say</u> that traditional festivals are <u>disappearing completely</u>, but there is definitely <u>a shift(一个变化转型)</u> towards more modern and commercialized celebrations, for example, Valentine's Day, Double 11 day (Chinese black Friday 中国的黑五). However, I still see people who continue to value and celebrate traditional festivals. So, I don't think we can say that they are disappearing altogether. (细节)

5. Is music important in traditional festivals?

Yes, big time (太重要了)! For me, music is so vital in different occasions, not just traditional festivals. It can set the mood (奠定情绪基调) of doing certain things. So, during traditional festivals, say, Spring Festival, I always play really festive and upbeat(带有节日气氛又欢乐的) traditional Chinese music to create an atmosphere (渲染氛围) for New Year's celebration. When I hear the traditional instruments being played in the music, it immediately <u>puts me into the mindset of the celebration</u>. (原因,举例子) 6. Do you think good food and drinks are important for celebrations? I feel that any celebrations are always and should always be associated <u>with</u> good food and drinks because it's an all-encompassing(全方位的) experience, right? You celebrate the event by eating and drinking and having a good time. Good food and drinks can definitely enhance the whole experience (改善体验感). I remember one time I went to my friend's wedding anniversary dinner and they had the best food and wine <u>accompanied with music</u>. I had such a blast (玩儿得如此之快乐) that <u>up</u> until today (时至今日) I still remember that dinner. But I also have memories like going to a birthday party with terrible food and drinks and end up wanting to leave the party sooner. (原因,举例子)

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And then, we use the internet for shopping. <u>E-commerce</u> is <u>a big deal</u> nowadays(电子商务是件大事儿). <u>Back in the old days(曾经的岁月里)</u>, people used to spend a lot of time going to different shops and stores, checking products, and making decisions on what to buy. Shopping was a decision that was <u>thought through(精心考虑过的)</u>. But now, there're endless <u>sites</u>(网站) from which you can get information and buy the latest brands online. And what else, we use the internet to <u>connect with one another</u>(连接彼 此). The internet <u>laid the foundation work for</u> another <u>revolutionary</u> invention, which is <u>social media</u> (自媒体). Social media indeed has changed our <u>personal space</u>, the way we interact with <u>our loved ones</u>(我 <u>们的爱人</u>), our friends and family, and even with strangers online. We <u>rely</u> <u>heavily on</u> (深度依赖) the internet to <u>connect with people</u>, <u>communicate</u> <u>with each other</u>, and <u>network with new people</u>. Face to face <u>communication</u> (面对面交流) is still <u>relevant</u> (重要的,存在的), but sometimes <u>it seems that</u> people prefer to <u>check in with each other</u> (关心、 询问彼此) online in this <u>fast-paced modern time</u>. It's less time and less effort. We're getting lazy on socializing with people.

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Part3:

1. What are the most common architectural styles in Chinese cities? I'd say that the MOST common architectural style in China is this <u>modern</u> <u>and international urban style (现代的、国际化的都市风格)</u>. I mean, those <u>high-rise buildings</u> and <u>skyscrapers</u> (摩天大厦) you see in most big cities in China. To me, <u>it makes sense (是合理的)</u> because China is a such a <u>densely populated</u> (人口密度大) country and having tall buildings is one of the solutions for creating more living space for citizens. <u>But it doesn't</u> <u>mean that (但这并不代表)</u> you cannot see any trace of traditional architecture, no, traditional Chinese architecture styles, such as <u>temples</u>, <u>pagodas and courtyard houses</u> (庙宇、宝塔、四合院) can still be found in many cities, especially in those historic districts. For example, in Beijing, you still can see so many <u>courtyard houses</u> in those old town areas near <u>Forbidden City</u> (故宫). Additionally, Western architectural styles, such as <u>Cothic style</u> (哥特), can be quite common in some Chinese cities with a <u>colonial history</u>(殖民历史). Like, Tianjin and Fujian Province. So, yeh, we have <u>a variety of</u> architectural styles. (主流情况,特殊情况补充)

2. What's the difference between an apartment and a house? <u>Regarding the space</u>, normally, houses are bigger than apartments. People who choose to live in a house tend to be the ones who want to have more living space, for example, a growing family(正在生长壮大家庭). On the other hand, apartments are <u>smaller in size</u>, so they tend to attract <u>younger people</u>, such as <u>university students</u> or young professionals (年轻 的职场人), who are looking for a more <u>affordable and convenient</u> living option in the city. And then, in terms of maintaining and cleaning(打理和 清洁), generally speaking, apartments are smaller and have less outdoor space, which can make them easier to clean and maintain. Whereas, houses are larger and have multiple floors, and outdoor space, it's <u>a lot</u> more work (工作量更大). But for some people, the biggest pro/perk (最大 好处) of living in a house is that you GET TO have a yard or a garden. Having trees, plants and flowers in your garden or yard is a very attractive concept(吸引人的理念). Many older people love the idea. And then, location is another important factor that can vary between apartments and houses. Apartments are often located in urban areas, with easier access to public transportation, shops, and restaurants. Houses, on the other hand, are often situated in suburban areas, which can offer more space, privacy, and a quieter environment. BUT, it's not as convenient as living in the city. And finally, in terms of privacy, apartments are not that sound proof. So, sometimes, you can hear what your neighbours are doing because you <u>share the same wall</u>. 3. What's the difference between living in a countryside and living in the city?

In the countryside, everything is slower and more relaxed. You can live in a big house with a big backyard, and enjoy a stronger connection with nature(和大自然的连接) and a sense of community(社区感). It's guieter with cleaner air. There are plenty of outdoor activities, you can go hiking, fishing and camping in nature. But the <u>downsides</u>(缺点) are, at least in my opinion, there're fewer people, so fewer cultural activities and less <u>access to public transportation and amenities</u>(享受性质的配套设施), like bars, restaurants, cafes and shops. Meanwhile, living in the city is convenient, fast-paced, and with more job opportunities. If you need to find a job, go to the city, <u>not the other way around</u>(而不是反方向). For most young people, their careers are their everything. Their worlds revolve around (围绕着) their jobs. That's why most young people choose the city over the countryside. And also, living in the city is fun and exciting. There's always something going on (总是有事情有活动) in the city. You have a variety of options when it comes to social life. Go to parties, watch some shows, meeting new people, much more vibrant (有 活力的). You can have easy access to public transport, restaurants, malls, schools and hospitals. You can have everything delivered to your door in the city. So it's definitely much more convenient. (对比区别讨论)

4. What are the advantages of the facilities of the apartment and the facilities of the house?

I really don't know how to answer this question. In China, if you live in an apartment, you don't really have great facilities or amenities. I know that in <u>western countries</u>(西方国家), <u>apartments or condos(公寓)</u> typically <u>come with</u>(自带) shared <u>facilities/amenities(共享的设施)</u> such as gyms, swimming pools, and laundry rooms, which is really thoughtful and convenient. But in China, we don't really have that culture. We might have a <u>community centre(社区中心)</u> with tennis courts and libraries, but that's not common, only in super fancy communities. On the other hand, I've never lived in a house, so I don't have any knowledge in that part. I know that houses usually offer more storage space, outdoor space and

gardens. They also often come with <u>garages and attics(车库和阁楼)</u>. But I don't know anything else <u>other than that</u>(除此之外). (对比区别讨论)

5. What difficulties do people have living in the city?

<u>High cost of living (高生活成本)</u>, traffic jams, air pollution, small living spaces, stress and loneliness (maybe). (Loneliness in the sense that you live by yourself in your small apartment without really knowing your neighbours, as everybody is busy living their own lives.) Those are the major problems of living in the city. I guess that's why many people would choose to move out into the suburban areas when they start growing a family. (罗列)

6. What can be done to reduce stress of city life?

3. How do students who have taken a gap year differ from other students?
