## Part3:

1. Why do people like parties?

3. Do you think those who tend to stay at home are less healthy than those who often attend parties?

Generally speaking, no. I think, whether you choose to stay at home and be a true homebody (宅男宅女), or go to parties all the time and be a party animal (派对狂人), it's up to you (取决于你). It's completely your personal choice. But I would say there's moderation in all things/balance is key in all things (凡事要适度). - 4. Do you think music and dancing are a must at a party?

- 6. What are the differences between holding a party at home and in a public place?

Well <u>based on my experience</u>, I would say hosting a party at home and in the public place both have their <u>pros and cons(优缺点)</u>. <u>Number one</u>, in <u>terms of privacy</u>, parties at home are often more private and <u>it feels more</u>

intimate(感觉更私密). Whereas when <u>hosting a party in a public place.</u> you can invite more guests, some people might even bring their friends, so you end up seeing a lot of people even strangers. And then, in terms of cost, renting a public venue(租一个场地) for sure is more expensive than doing it at home. Home parties are more budget-friendly(预算友好型) And then, space is another difference. Public places offer more space for larger gatherings, while homes normally have more <u>limited space</u>. One thing I would say is that, hosting a party in a public place is more carefree (不惜要操心的). You can have someone who decorate the whole place for you, provide catering service(提供餐饮服务) and later <u>clean up</u> for you, and you don't need to worry about people wrecking things(打碎东西 O; whereas at home you have to do a lot of things by yourself, not to mention, you will be worrying about people breaking your stuff. For example, I had a big party at home a while ago, and I was all the time worrying about my guests breaking my furniture and home appliances when they got tipsy(微醺了) and started playing football in my living room. Haha! That was a terrifying experience. (分角度讨论)

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
