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Topic 1 忙碌的经历

1. Are you often busy?

Yes, I'm usually pretty busy. I work full-time, so <u>I'm very occupied¹</u> during the work-day. Then, when I get home, I try to <u>keep an active social life</u>. So that means going out with my friends whenever I have the chance. I also like to visit my family and spend quality time with them on the weekends. Plus, <u>on top of all</u> <u>of that</u>, I have a dog that keeps me company. I'm very busy taking my dog out for walks and making sure he's well taken care of.

2. What are the advantages and disadvantages when people keep busy?

One big advantage is that people can <u>avoid leading a sedentary lifestyle²</u>. Instead of sitting around and wasting their time on meaningless activities, they can do things that <u>fulfill them</u>. They can work out, hang out with friends, and do other things that bring them joy. But <u>a downside is that</u> people can get too busy and forget to <u>set aside time for relaxing</u>. They might get overly stressed and suffer from bad physical or mental health. It's important to <u>strike a balance³</u>.

3. Do you think children should learn through playing games or under pressure?

I think that whenever possible, children should learn by playing games. <u>In a low-stakes environment</u>⁴, they can have the time and space to learn new things without feeling overly stressed. Plus, they can have fun through the game itself. If you <u>put them into high-pressure situations</u>, they're <u>bound to⁵ get anxious and</u> have a bad experience. It might make them not want to learn things anymore. That can ultimately have a bad effect by making them unwilling to engage in new activities.

4. What kind of pressure people may experience at work?

At work, people might feel the pressure to constantly <u>outperform⁶</u> their coworkers. Some companies make you feel like you have to compete against others in order to stand out. That can result in a very <u>toxic work</u> <u>environment⁷</u>. Others might feel pressure to get a promotion and <u>work their way up through the company⁸</u>. Depending on the job, people might also feel pressure to <u>hit a certain target every day⁹</u>. For example, salespeople are often expected to sell a certain number of products per day. That can be very stressful.

Topic 2 庆祝过的活动

1. Do you like to celebrate important events? Why?

Yes, I love to celebrate important events because it is a great way to <u>bring people together</u>. Sometimes, when life gets very busy, it can be hard to make time for your friends. If there is an important event to celebrate, then everyone <u>has a reason to see each other</u> and have fun. Celebrations can be a really great way to catch up with friends¹⁰ and have a good time.

2. What kinds of events do people usually celebrate?

People usually celebrate events like weddings, graduations, anniversaries, job promotions and birthdays. Basically <u>any major life event can be a reason to have a celebration¹¹</u>. Birthday and anniversary celebrations happen every year, but weddings and graduations happen <u>less often</u>, so they usually involve a bigger party. I think that people like to celebrate each other's successes in life because it is <u>encouraging</u>, and makes people feel proud of their accomplishments.

3. Do people often celebrate events with a large group of people or just a few people?

I suppose that <u>the type of event determines</u> how many people you celebrate it with. Larger events like weddings often have a very large group of people, because the bride and groom want to invite all of their family and friends. Smaller events like birthdays can have just a few people in attendance¹², because sometimes people want to celebrate with their closest friends rather than everyone they know. <u>Oftentimes¹³</u> the guest list depends on the person <u>throwing the party¹⁴</u>; some people prefer larger parties and others prefer smaller ones.

4. Do people often celebrate festivals with families?

Yes, I think that some people really enjoy celebrating festivals with families. In my country the biggest festivals are spring festival and Mid-Autumn festival. <u>It makes sense¹⁵</u> to celebrate these occasions with your family, because usually these festivals are about <u>being grateful for what you have and showing your</u> <u>love towards other people¹⁶</u>. You can also celebrate festivals with friends as well as with family.

Topic 3 让你惊喜的事情

1. How do people express happiness in your culture?

I would say that people usually express happiness by <u>doing celebratory things together¹⁷</u>. For example, a lot of people will go out with their friends. They might go to a nice restaurant or do something more fun like karaoke. When people are happy, they tend to be very friendly and generous as well. They might smile at strangers and leave extra big tips at restaurants. <u>Besides external things¹⁸</u>, there are usually <u>visual indicators¹⁹</u>. You can tell someone's happy by <u>looking at their facial expressions²⁰</u>.

2. Do you think happiness has any effect on people? How?

Yes, it seems to me that happiness <u>has a huge effect on people²¹</u>. When you're in a good mood, you tend to have a good appetite, be more active and even sleep better. I believe happiness have a positive impact on people's health. Happiness also makes people <u>more receptive to things²²</u>. If someone's <u>feeling upbeat²³</u>, they're more likely to try new activities and want to <u>live their life to the fullest²⁴</u>.

3. How can people be happy?

I suppose that people can be happy in lots of ways. One of the biggest ways is by spending quality time with their loved ones. Whether it's hanging out with friends or family, spending time with the people that are close to us can help us <u>feel happy and at peace</u>²⁵. People can also be happy by accomplishing their goals. For some people, that means getting a promotion and having a great career²⁶. For others, it means improving their health and <u>hitting milestones in their fitness journeys</u>.

4. Is it good for people to be unhappy? Why?

I don't think it's good for people to be unhappy. <u>In some rare cases</u>, being unhappy might motivate them to change things in their life and work towards being happier. So in that sense, it can be a good motivator. <u>But for the most part</u>, it's not good to be unhappy. Being unhappy can make you <u>have a very negative outlook</u> <u>on life²⁷</u>. It might even cause you to <u>treat others poorly²⁸ because</u> you don't feel good about yourself.

Topic 4 困难但有好结果的决定

1. What decisions do people usually make in their daily lives?

People make a number of decisions <u>throughout the day</u>. <u>One of the most basic but consistent choices²⁹</u> is what to eat every day. Sometimes they might have to choose between cooking a meal or <u>ordering out³⁰</u>. People also have to decide how they'll spend their time, at least when they're not in work or school. There are lots of options for things to do during leisure time, so they have lots to choose from.

2. Which is easier, making a decision by yourself or making a decision after group discussion?

I suppose that it really depends on the decision. In some situations, it's better to make a decision by yourself. You don't want to have too many cooks in the kitchen³¹. If everyone's giving their opinion, it might be harder to figure out what you really want. But in other cases, you might actually want other people to weigh in^{32} , especially if the decision is something you're unsure about or if it's <u>outside your expertise³³</u>.

3. Why are many young people unwilling to follow their parents' advice?

I think that young people are unwilling to follow their parents' advice because they want to <u>express their</u> <u>individualism³⁴</u>. Young people grow up having to do everything their parents say, so once they become teenagers or young adults they are <u>less likely to follow parental advice³⁵</u>. They want to prove their independence and show that they can make their own decisions about their life. They may even try to lead a life that is completely different than the life their parents want them to have.

4. Why would middle-aged people tend to second-guess their own decisions?

Middle-aged people usually have to make more important decisions than younger people, since most middle-aged people have a lot of family and work responsibilities. This means that any decision they make will affect other people, so they may spend more time doubting themselves and <u>second-guessing their</u> <u>decisions³⁶</u> than a young person would. Plus, when you're older, you realize that your instinct isn't always right. Middle-aged people have had lots of experiences where they've <u>made the wrong call³⁷</u>. So they know to <u>think twice before³⁸</u> making a decision.

Topic 5 别人向你寻求意见

1. Do children like to change their opinion?

I think children can be quite <u>stubborn</u> when it comes to changing their opinion. They might not even know why they <u>hold a certain opinion³⁹</u>. But they might stick to it <u>nonetheless</u>. For example, some children hate taking baths. They won't want to change their opinion because they don't enjoy it. So you might have to explain why baths are helpful, or try to make the experience more fun for them.

2. What kinds of jobs require people to frequently give opinions?

I suppose that if you work in advertising or marketing, you have to get used to giving your opinion. That type of work is very subjective and depends on creative ideas. <u>A lot of work goes into marketing campaigns</u> <u>in particular</u>. You have to <u>speak up and pitch ideas on⁴⁰</u> how to make the campaign successful. Or if you're <u>an upper-level⁴¹</u>, you have to give your opinion on the campaign and suggest changes if they're needed.

3. What reasons might people have for not wanting to give their opinions?

People might be worried that they'll be judged for their opinions. A lot of people are concerned about <u>being</u> <u>the odd one out</u>⁴². If everyone around you likes a movie, but you didn't enjoy it, there might be pressure not to share your opinion because you don't want to <u>stand out</u>. Plus, you don't want to make people feel bad for their opinions. Others don't like giving their opinions because they're very <u>private people</u>⁴³ and they don't want others to know more about their tastes.

4. Do you think it would be a good idea for schools to ask students their opinions about lessons?

It could be very beneficial if schools asked students for their opinions about lessons. <u>For one</u>, it would make the students <u>feel like their perspectives matter</u>⁴⁴. That can encourage them and make them more optimistic about their school experience. <u>For another</u>, schools could use this information to improve the curriculum or other aspects of the learning experience. This could <u>result in more student satisfaction</u>⁴⁵, which could also lead to better academic performances.

Topic 6 积极改变

1. Is it easier for young people to change?

Yes, I suppose that usually it is easier for young people to change because they are <u>less set in their ways</u>⁴⁶ than older people. Older people <u>have a particular way of doing things</u>⁴⁷, so it is harder for them to change. Young people are still figuring out who they are and what their values are, so change comes much easier to them. Still, <u>there are always exceptions</u>, and some young people can't change, while some older people can.

2. Is it easy for old people to change?

I think that old people have a much harder time changing than young people, because they are used to a certain way of doing things. They can sometimes <u>get stuck in the past</u>⁴⁸ and have trouble changing their ways or trying new things. Old people may even get upset if they are asked to change, and they may suggest that they don't need to change. <u>It is for this reason that old people are sometimes called stubborn</u>⁴⁹.

3. What are the disadvantages when people keep making changes?

When people keep making changes, they might find it hard to establish a regular routine. You can't really <u>have a stable life</u> if you keep changing different parts of it. For example, if you hop from job to job, you'll find it difficult to <u>get into a routine</u>⁵⁰ because your hours might change or you might have a different commute each time. Plus, it's hard to form good relationships with neighbours and coworkers if you <u>move around a lot</u>⁵¹.

4. How can people change their daily routine if they want to?

I would say that people can <u>change their daily routine in lots of little ways</u>⁵². They could try biking to work instead of driving or taking public transportation. Or they could start the day by exercising. They can <u>form</u> <u>little habits that build up to bigger changes over time</u>⁵³. They can also change how and what they eat. It's surprising how much cooking versus picking up breakfast can change your day-to-day routine.

Topic 7 想参加的比赛

1. What are the contests commonly seen on TV programs?

There are definitely lots of singing contests on TV. People love to watch talented singers compete against each other to <u>win the top prize</u>⁵⁴. Dance contests are also pretty popular nowadays. People also <u>get very</u> <u>invested in</u>⁵⁵ contests where people have to do intense physical challenges. It can be very entertaining to watch people <u>do amazing feats of physical strength and endurance</u>⁵⁶. Sometimes, they even have to do things like eating unusual foods. <u>It all makes for good TV</u>⁵⁷.

2. Why are competition shows popular?

I think competition shows are popular because people love the drama that comes from it. When you're watching people compete against each other for the top prize, you get very invested in their stories. People choose favourites and might even <u>bet on who they think will win⁵⁸</u>. Plus, depending on the contest, you might get to see really cool things. You can watch amazing dancers or see people do tough physical challenges.

3. What kinds of industries need competition? Why?

I suppose that competition is important in almost every industry because it encourages people to be their best. Competition can become <u>toxic and negative</u>⁵⁹, but <u>friendly, civil competition is always a good thing</u>⁶⁰. Competing with other people in your industry can make you <u>think outside the box</u>⁶¹ and develop new ideas. In my opinion, the food service industry, the fashion industry and the acting industry are probably the most competitive.

4. Do you think it is necessary to encourage people to compete with others in companies?

I don't think it's necessary, but I think that sometimes it can help. If people know they're competing against others, it can motivate them to try harder so that they can stand out⁶² and succeed. But on the other hand, if people get too competitive, it might create a toxic work environment⁶³. They might not see their coworkers as equals⁶⁴. Instead, they might just see them as obstacles they need to overcome.

Topic 8 外出花费甚少的一天

1. Do people like to spend their leisure time out in your country?

I think people like to go out during their free time. It's very common to go to a nice restaurant with friends if you want to <u>blow off some steam⁶⁵</u>. There are lots of other fun activities you can do, like going out to bars or <u>doing karaoke</u>. Nowadays, it's so easy to <u>get caught up in the hustle and bustle of your daily routine⁶⁶</u>. It's important to slow down and make sure you have enough time to relax. Otherwise, you can <u>wind up</u> getting burned out⁶⁷.

2. How do people spend their leisure time in your country?

There are <u>a variety of</u> activities that people can do during their leisure time in my country. Some people are more <u>outdoorsy⁶⁸</u> and prefer to go to parks, hiking trails, the beach, or outdoor sporting events. Others prefer to stay indoors, so they might go to cinemas or shopping malls. Also, there are a lot of really great leisure activities for people who enjoy art, like painting classes or <u>pottery classes⁶⁹</u>.

3. How does technology affect the way people spend their leisure time?

In some cases, technology can <u>limit the way people spend their leisure time⁷⁰</u>. For example, in the past it was more common to go out and do things with your friends. But nowadays, you can see people just hanging out at home and <u>scrolling on their phones</u> instead of doing anything active. <u>That being said</u>, technology can sometimes <u>bring people closer together</u>. For example, if you can't hang out with your friends in person, you can all jump on a video call⁷¹ and spend time that way.

4. Do you think only old people have time for leisure?

Well, I think that old people probably have the most time for leisure, <u>other than⁷²</u> young people who don't have a job yet. Old people are usually retired, which means that they <u>don't have to answer to anyone for their time⁷³</u>. They can spend it however they want. But they're definitely not the only ones who have time for leisure. If young people <u>establish a good work-life balance</u>, they should be able to find time to relax.

Topic 9 丢失东西

1. What kinds of things do people usually lose?

People usually lose things that they use very often, like their phones, wallets, or keys. These things are very easy to lose because we use them so often <u>throughout the day⁷⁴</u>, that sometimes we can't remember where we left them. <u>This is especially true if</u> you're going directly from home, to work, to a social event; it's easy to lose something like your phone or wallet along the way if you aren't paying attention.

2. What do people often do when losing things?

Well, one thing that people can do is to <u>retrace their steps</u>⁷⁵; so they think back to where they have been that day, go back to those locations, and hopefully find what they lost. If that doesn't work, people can <u>put</u> <u>up lost signs</u>⁷⁶ or call friends to help them look. Plus, if they lose something like keys or wallets, they can use <u>things like mobile trackers that attach to their keys or wallets</u>⁷⁷ so that they can find them through a GPS system.

3. Is it an effective way to use rewards to find lost things?

Yes, I think offering rewards can be an effective way to find lost things. For example, many people will put up signs <u>offering a cash reward</u> if they have lost a pet. This <u>provides a good incentive⁷⁸</u> for people to get out and look for the lost pet and return it to its proper owner. <u>On the other hand</u>, sometimes people will see these signs and ignore them because they are too busy to go out and look for someone else's lost pet.

4. What kinds of people may lose things often?

I think that <u>scatterbrained⁷⁹</u> people are most likely to lose things often because they are very easily distracted and have trouble focusing. This means that it is harder for them to <u>keep track of their stuff⁸⁰</u>, so they may be more likely to lose things. <u>Older people with memory issues⁸¹</u> are also more likely to lose things because they can't remember where they left them. Young children lose things too, since they are unable to stay organized.

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Topic 10 堵车的经历

1. How can we solve the traffic jam problem?

I suppose that there are several ways to improve traffic jam problems. One of the biggest ways is to <u>improve</u> <u>road infrastructure</u>⁸². That could mean <u>opening more lanes on major highways</u>⁸³, or <u>developing alternative</u> <u>routes</u>⁸⁴ so that the highways don't <u>get clogged</u>⁸⁵. It could also be helpful to improve public transportation so that there are less cars on the road. Motivating people to find other ways of commuting can help reduce traffic on major roads and highways.

2. Do you think developing public transport can solve traffic jam problems?

Yes, I think developing public transportation is a great way to solve traffic jam problems. If there are less people driving on the roads, <u>there's bound to be less road traffic</u>⁸⁶, and thus less traffic jams. So it could help to either expand bus and subway systems, or reduce <u>the cost of fare</u>⁸⁷. Both of these methods provide motivation for people to commute instead of driving their own car. Plus, it's better for the environment if more people take public transportation.

3. Do you think the highways will help reduce traffic jams?

I would say that highways can help reduce traffic jams <u>to a certain degree</u>. When there are highways with lots of lanes, it helps <u>spread traffic out</u>⁸⁸, which helps prevent traffic jams. Plus, it <u>decreases the amount of traffic</u> on local roads, which helps during rush hour. However, highways can also encourage traffic jams because everyone will opt to take the highway instead of alternative routes. <u>There's only so much highways</u> can do without creating the problem that they are meant to help prevent⁸⁹.

4. What are good ways to manage traffic?

There are several good ways to manage traffic. For one, you can improve public transportation. That motivates people to commute instead of driving their own cars, which reduces the number of cars on the road and thus prevents more traffic jams. You can also manage traffic by <u>having features built into roads</u> <u>like roundabouts</u>⁹⁰, which can help move traffic along more efficiently. <u>Spacing out intersections</u>⁹¹ is also helpful, since it prevents too many cars from <u>piling up in one area</u>.

Topic 11 用手机做重要的事

1. What are the differences between young people and old people when using a cellphone?

I think young people are <u>more dependent on their cellphones</u>⁹². They use their phones for everything, like taking photos and videos, playing online games, and doing more serious things like banking and paying bills. Lots of them are anxious when they're away from their cellphones. However, old people can <u>be very</u> wary when it comes to using cellphones⁹³. They tend to just use them to make phone calls or occasionally send texts. Sometimes, they play simple games like <u>solitaire</u>⁹⁴on their phones to pass the time.

2. Which one is more important, using a cellphone to make phone calls or to read messages?

It seems to me that using a cellphone to read messages is more important. <u>It's true that</u>⁹⁵ making phone calls is the most basic function of cellphones. But <u>it's a trend that</u>⁹⁶ people are talking on the phone less. Plus, cellphones are very convenient for sending and receiving text messages. And you know, people nowadays prefer having a conversation over text because it gives them more time to respond, which is less stressful than making phone calls. So <u>from people's cellphone habits, I can see that</u>⁹⁷ texting is more important than making phone calls.

3. Do you think there should be a law to stop people from making phone calls in public?

No, I think that would be a very restrictive law. On the one hand, most of us have experienced the <u>irritation</u>⁹⁸ of someone talking loudly on the phone while in a public space. It's especially awkward and uncomfortable when it's in a closed space like a bus or a subway. On the other hand, while making those calls may be annoying sometimes, it shouldn't be illegal. It doesn't infringe on other people's rights or anything⁹⁹. So <u>it</u> would be a waste of legislation¹⁰⁰.

4. What are the functions of mobile phones? / What do you usually do with a cellphone?

Mobile phones have lots of different functions. <u>The primary one is</u> communication. We use mobile phones to call, text, and email others. With a mobile phone, you can pretty much <u>stay in touch with</u>¹⁰¹ anyone, no matter where they are in the world. Another function is entertainment. People can watch videos, check social media, and play games on their phones. Mobile phones can also <u>be used as personal cameras</u>. Most phones have <u>high-quality cameras</u> to take good photos with.

5. Why can't we live without mobile phones?

I suppose that it's because we've <u>made our mobile phones the centre of our lives</u>¹⁰². Just think about it – <u>there are barely any aspects of our lives that aren't intertwined with our phones</u>¹⁰³. We use our phones to talk to our loved ones, take pictures of the important moments in our lives, <u>do our banking</u>¹⁰⁴, and <u>a whole host of other things</u>¹⁰⁵. We've come to be dependent on mobile phones because they help make our lives run smoothly. Without them, we wouldn't know how to do our daily tasks.

6. Is it rude to make a phone call late at night?

I think it can be rude, depending on the circumstances. If you call someone late at night, you <u>run the risk</u> \underline{of}^{106} waking them up. Or if they're up late, you might be <u>interrupting their personal time</u>¹⁰⁷. If it's a friend that you know pretty well, it's probably safe to call them late at night. They won't mind if it's important. But if it's someone you don't know very well, or <u>if it's for a professional reason</u>¹⁰⁸, you should wait until the next day.

Topic 12 帮助小孩

1. Do you often help kids? How?

2. Why is it necessary to do volunteer service?

I would say that it's necessary to volunteer because it teaches you to be a better citizen. If you never contribute your time to helping others, it makes you <u>less empathetic to the people around you</u>. On the other hand, volunteer service teaches you about the needs of others in your community, which helps you understand and care more about the people that you meet. Plus, <u>it gives you a different perspective by seeing</u> firsthand what kinds of needs there are in the world¹¹⁰.

3. What can schools do to develop students' awareness of volunteering?

I suppose that schools can help develop students' awareness by providing them with various opportunities to volunteer. For example, schools could <u>set up an after-school program</u> where students volunteer within the local community. They could help out at <u>nursing homes¹¹¹</u> or <u>soup kitchens¹¹²</u>, depending on where help is needed most. This could give them a hands-on experience¹¹³ with volunteering that shows them the importance of lending a hand and serving others. I think that's very important for students to <u>learn through experience</u>.

4. Who benefits more from the volunteer services, the volunteers or the people helped?

It seems to me that in general, the people who are being helped benefit more from volunteering. They get what they need and hopefully they also get to have a positive encounter with¹¹⁴ the people who are there to help them out. <u>But on the flip side¹¹⁵</u>, I do think that volunteers also benefit a lot from volunteering. It definitely makes you feel better when you help others. <u>It reminds you to be grateful for what you have and</u> to be kind.

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Topic 13 工作/学习中收到的正面评价

1. When should parents encourage their children?

I think parents should encourage their children when they're having a hard time. If their children are having difficulty in school, for example, parents should let them know that <u>they have support and they can get</u> <u>through it</u>¹¹⁶. Children should also be encouraged when they're <u>on the right track</u>¹¹⁷. If they've been doing really well at something, parents should let them know that <u>their hard work has been paying off</u>.

2. Should parents always encourage their children?

Yes, I suppose that parents should always encourage their children. Of course, they have to be careful not to <u>overdo</u>¹¹⁸ it. Otherwise, their children might get too <u>cocky</u>¹¹⁹ from always having positive remarks. But I don't really see what the problem with constant encouragement is. It helps children <u>develop confidence</u> <u>in themselves</u>¹²⁰. It makes them feel loved and acknowledged by their parents. Life can be tough, and encouragement from loved ones can help them get through challenges.

3. Do you think negative feedback is more important than positive feedback? Why?

No, I don't think negative feedback is more important than positive feedback. In a sense¹²¹, I think that people <u>put more emphasis on¹²²</u> negative feedback because criticism <u>sticks out¹²³</u> more to people than praise does. I suppose that both types of feedback are valuable. But focusing too much on negative feedback can be very discouraging. It might make you want to give up. So it's better to have a balance. <u>Positive feedback</u> is just as important¹²⁴.

4. Why is negative feedback as important as positive feedback at work?

Well, people need to know how they can improve. <u>If you only ever got positive feedback</u>¹²⁵, you wouldn't be able to make progress on the things you need to work on. So people need to be receptive to negative feedback as well. Although it might make them feel embarrassed or upset, they need to look at it as a chance to do better. <u>That being said</u>¹²⁶, it's important to <u>present negative feedback in a constructive way</u>¹²⁷. It shouldn't be about <u>shaming people into improving</u>¹²⁸.

<mark>Topic 14 分歧</mark>/争论

1. What would you do if you disagree with someone?

Well, if I disagreed with someone, I would try to stay calm. I wouldn't want to <u>raise my voice</u> or do anything to <u>escalate the situation¹²⁹</u>. I would just calmly explain my point of view and then ask if we could <u>try to</u> <u>reach an agreement¹³⁰</u>. Sometimes, disagreements can turn into full-blown fights, which is when things get difficult to handle. But I think the main thing to remember is to have respect for the other person, even when their opinion is different from yours.

2. How can we stop an argument from escalating into a fight?

I suppose that you have to try to keep calm. So you shouldn't raise your voice or <u>say anything mean-spirited</u>¹³¹. You need to remain cool and <u>collected</u>. You can't <u>blow your temper</u>¹³², even if the other person is really frustrating you. Sometimes it can be helpful to <u>take some space</u>¹³³. If it's turning into a long, <u>drawn-out</u>¹³⁴ disagreement, you should take a break and revisit the topic later when both of you are <u>less worked</u> <u>up</u>. That way, you can avoid getting too upset.

3. Who do you think should teach children to respect their teacher?

I think that parents should teach their children to respect their teachers. Children need to learn how to show respect from the very start, which is where parents come in¹³⁵. As the people who have the most influence over them, and who spend the most time with them, parents have to <u>set a good example¹³⁶</u>. They need to <u>reinforce</u> that other people, especially teachers and other <u>authority figures¹³⁷</u>, need to be respected. Children should learn that directly from their parents.

4. What disagreements do parents and children usually have?

It seems to me that parents and children usually <u>disagree over things like¹³⁸</u> responsibilities and schedules. For example, a parent might tell their child that they have to do a certain number of chores every week. Their child may not like having to do chores, so they'll disagree about their responsibilities. Or a parent might <u>impose a curfew</u>¹³⁹, which means the child can't stay out past a certain time. Children like to be independent, but parents still have control over where they go and when.

Topic 15 一节喜欢的英语课(印象深刻的英语课)

1. Why do people learn foreign languages? What are the benefits?

There are many benefits to learning a foreign language, and even more benefits to learning multiple foreign languages. Learning another language <u>improves your brain elasticity</u>¹⁴⁰, and it helps you communicate with other people and cultures. Learning a new language <u>forces your brain to create new pathways</u>¹⁴¹, which increases your intelligence as well as your memory skills. Being multilingual is also useful for work and travel because it <u>opens more lines of communication</u>¹⁴².

2. What skills should foreign language teachers have?

Foreign language teachers should be encouraging, patient, and <u>eloquent¹⁴³</u>. They need to be able to help when students become discouraged or unmotivated, since learning a language can be a frustrating task. They should also be patient since it takes a very long time to fully master a foreign language. Finally, they should be eloquent and <u>have a strong command of vocabulary in both languages</u>, so that they can explain complex ideas <u>in a comprehensible way</u>.

3. Do you think grammar is important when learning foreign languages?

Yes, I think that grammar is very important when learning a foreign language, because using <u>incorrect</u> <u>grammar</u> can change the entire meaning of your sentence. In English for example, if you forget to <u>conjugate</u> <u>your verbs into the past tense</u>¹⁴⁴, the sentence will read as if it is in <u>present tense</u> and <u>it won't make sense</u> <u>with what you're saying</u>. Although grammatical rules are tedious to learn, they are essential to ensure the proper understanding of a language.

4. Is it interesting to be a foreign language teacher? Why?

Yes, being a foreign language teacher can be a very interesting job. <u>For one</u>, I think the teacher learns as much from their students as the students learn from the teacher. <u>There are no limits to</u> learning a foreign language. When you interact with a student in their first language as well as the foreign language, you can also learn some new words and phrases. Besides, it's exciting to see students come into a class <u>unable to</u> <u>speak a single word</u>, and leave being fluent.

1. How can people search for information now?

Nowadays, people can search for information <u>in a variety of ways</u>. The most common way is probably using the internet. People can use either their phones or their laptops to quickly Google something. Of course, <u>there are plenty of other online search engines that they can access</u>. If they need to do more serious research, they can try going to a library. Librarians can direct them to the right resources and answer any <u>follow-up questions</u> they might have. They can also use computers to <u>access special databases</u>¹⁴⁵.

2. What information can people get from television?

People can get tons of information from television. For example, they can watch documentaries that teach them about different places in the world, or they can watch the history channel to learn about other <u>time</u> <u>periods</u>. There's so much <u>educational programming</u>¹⁴⁶ nowadays. So it's easy to learn about <u>pretty much</u> <u>anything you can imagine</u>¹⁴⁷. Plus, people can learn about other cultures by watching TV shows from other countries. It's amazing how much people can learn just by turning on the TV.

3. With the development of the Internet, is the library still important?

Yes, I think the library is still important. On the one hand, the development of the internet had made information <u>more accessible than ever¹⁴⁸</u>. Instead of going to a library to use their computers, you can use the internet from home. On the other hand, there are still resources that are unique to libraries. For example, libraries can give you access to special databases that you can't find on Baidu or other online search engines. Libraries also have <u>special editions of books¹⁴⁹</u> that can't be found online.

4. Does the development of the Internet have any impact on some disadvantaged people?

Yes, the development of the internet has had an impact on some <u>disadvantaged people</u>. I suppose that impact is <u>largely positive</u>. It's pretty evident that the internet has made information more accessible than ever. So for people who can't afford to go to school, they might be able to enrol in online education programs <u>at a much cheaper rate</u>. Or if they struggle to find other resources, they can look for them online. For example, they can <u>find job postings¹⁵⁰</u> and even freelance jobs on the internet.

Topic 17 校外学到的重要东西

1. What can children learn from parents?

Children can learn lots of things from their parents. For one, they often <u>develop their morals and beliefs</u> <u>based on what their parents think¹⁵¹</u>. Whether children like it or not, <u>their worldview is shaped by their</u> <u>parents¹⁵²</u>. Children also learn life skills from their parents. For example, some parents give their children an allowance and teach them how to save their money. That's the first step in <u>developing financial literacy¹⁵³</u>. Besides, parents usually teach their children how to be polite and other basic skills like that.

2. Do you think some children are well-behaved because they are influenced by their parents?

Yes, I absolutely think some children are well-behaved because their parents have raised them well. Parents have a huge influence on their children. They're in charge of teaching their children how to act and how to treat others. <u>Oftentimes, they lead by example¹⁵⁴</u>. So if a child is especially kind and polite, I think <u>a great</u> <u>deal of that is due to their upbringing¹⁵⁵</u>. A parent's influence should never be underestimated. <u>Granted¹⁵⁶</u>, some children are just genuinely well-behaved and it's not all due to their parents.

3. Is it necessary for adults to learn new things?

Yes, it's necessary for adults to learn new things. On the one hand, adults are very <u>settled in life¹⁵⁷</u> and don't often feel the need to learn new things. Sometimes they don't have a lot of time to focus on things beyond their daily routine. However, I think that learning new things is important because it pushes adults to keep improving and <u>expanding their horizons</u>. It can also become a fun social activity for adults to learn new skills. If they never learn new things, they might get stuck in a rut¹⁵⁸. That leads to dissatisfaction.

4. How can people learn new things?

People can learn new things in a variety of ways; they can take a class, <u>talk to other people with more</u> $expertise^{159}$, or do research on their own. Most people will try to <u>sign up for a class^{160}</u> in order to help them learn a new skill, or communicate with someone else in the same field. This way, they can learn from someone who is an expert. If there is no class available, then often you can find <u>tutorials</u>¹⁶¹ or explanations online to help you learn a skill.

Topic 18 克服困难终成功

1. Should people set goals for themselves?

Having goals for yourself can <u>give your</u> <u>life structure and purpose</u>¹⁶³. <u>That goes a long way to</u>¹⁶⁴ improving your quality of life. Plus, when you achieve your goals, you can enjoy a great sense of satisfaction.

2. How do you define success?

I would define success at <u>being content with¹⁶⁵</u> what you have and where you are in life. For some people, that means having an amazing career. Every major choice they make is connected to this one goal. For other people, <u>contentment¹⁶⁶</u> might look like getting married or raising children. <u>It differs from person to person¹⁶⁷</u>. But I suppose that being happy in life is the greatest success that anyone could dream of. I really hope that I can be successful in my own life.

3. How do we judge whether young people are successful?

It seems to me that we can judge whether or not young people are successful based on how their life choices are impacting them. If they're constantly stressed out about school and they're worried about <u>the direction</u> <u>their life is going in¹⁶⁸</u>, they may not be the most successful. They might just <u>be on the wrong path</u>, which is definitely something they can change. But if they're thriving and they're excited and happy about what they're doing, then I think they're pretty successful.

4. Are successful people lonely?

I think it depends on how you define success. Most people think of success as being really rich or doing really well at your job. Some people who achieve those things, and are thus successful <u>on a superficial</u> <u>level</u>¹⁶⁹, can be very lonely. When you sacrifice a lot to advance in your career, it might mean not having many meaningful relationships in your life. That definitely makes you lonely. So I suppose that people who are <u>materially successful¹⁷⁰</u> might be lonely because <u>they've prioritized that kind of success over personal</u> connections¹⁷¹.

For some people, life is meant to be enjoyed at a slower pace. That way, they don't get stressed out. They're content to just <u>do things</u> <u>one step at a time</u>. I think these kinds of people are overwhelmed by things moving fast. They don't want to deal with too much at a time.

3. Is being patient good for people? Why?

Yes, I definitely think being patient is good for people. <u>In life</u>, you can't always get what you want. There are times where you inevitably have to slow down and <u>wait for things to work out</u>¹⁷⁴. So if you have to wait anyways, it helps to learn how to deal with it in a healthy way. Patience is also important when it comes to interacting with other people. Sometimes people might disappoint you or frustrate you. Having patience helps you maintain those relationships instead of <u>ruining them by losing your temper</u>¹⁷⁵.

4. Are people less patient now than people in the past? Why?

Yes, people are <u>a lot less patient</u> than people in the past. Nowadays, we're accustomed to getting everything we want, whenever we want. We've become used to <u>instant gratification</u>¹⁷⁶. So whenever we have to wait, whether it's in line or in traffic, we lose our patience quickly as well. People in the past <u>didn't have</u> technology to hurry things up. So they had to learn how to be patient more than we did. They were definitely more skilled at that.

Some types of common plastic waste are cigarette butts, food wrappers, plastic bottle caps, and plastic grocery bags. Plastic waste is unfortunately very common, and very bad for the environment. It has become a bigger problem in recent years with the rise of companies like Taobao and Amazon. As more and more people order things online, there is an increase in the use of plastic packaging¹⁷⁷. I think people just didn't care enough to use them. It's sad to see so much plastic waste in <u>natural spaces</u>¹⁷⁸.

2. Do you think we should use plastic products?

I think that plastic products are okay to use¹⁷⁹, to a certain degree. Plastic can be very helpful and convenient, especially for reusable items like food packaging. Plastic also makes lots of great products like bike helmets and child safety seats. It's even used in things like paints, glues, and insulation¹⁸⁰. So we can use plastic products, but we should also be aware of how much plastic pollution there is. We should reuse when we can, and avoid being wasteful.

3. How can we reduce our use of plastic?

We can help reduce our use of plastic by avoiding single-use plastics like drinking straws or plastic cutlery¹⁸¹, which you use once and then throw away. We can also avoid using plastic bags, since those get discarded as well. Instead, we should use reusable cutlery made out of sustainable materials¹⁸². We can also buy canvas grocery bags that can be used multiple times. It's helpful to buy grocery items in bulk¹⁸³ to reduce how much food packaging we buy and then throw out.

Topic 21 失约

1. How do people who are busy remember things they need to do?

Most people make lists of tasks in order to remember them. They'll make a to-do list and <u>work their way</u> <u>through each item¹⁸⁶</u>. A lot of people also use a calendar, whether it's <u>a physical calendar¹⁸⁷</u> or just the calendar app on their phone. Honestly, the app is very helpful. You can set reminders and your phone will alert you with a notification when the task is due. Some people, especially those <u>in executive positions¹⁸⁸</u>, even have their own assistants to <u>keep track of¹⁸⁹</u> what they need to do.

2. Do you think people should remember family history?

Yes, I think people should remember family history. Learning our family history helps <u>honour those who</u> <u>came before us</u>¹⁹⁰. It ensures that <u>their memory lives on through each generation</u>. Remembering our family history can also give us a better appreciation for our culture and community, since family history <u>is tied</u> to¹⁹¹ both of those things. I also think that remembering our past through the lives of those who came before us will help <u>shape the choices we make in the present</u>¹⁹².

3. If someone doesn't really like the person that they are going to meet, they may deliberately forget their appointment; is that true? Why?

Well, it may be true for some people. I mean, it's rude for sure, but everyone deals with uncomfortable feelings differently. If you don't like a person and you kind of want to avoid them, you may <u>purposefully</u> <u>skip out on¹⁹³ an appointment or meeting with them. But I don't think that helps the problem. In other cases, the person might genuinely forget and it's just a <u>coincidence¹⁹⁴</u> that they also dislike the person they were supposed to meet with.</u>

4. Which is more important, a work-related appointment or an appointment with a friend? Why?

It seems to me that work-related appointments are usually more important. With a friend, you can get away with cancelling or missing it because your friend will probably understand. But if you <u>skip a work</u> <u>meeting¹⁹⁵</u>, it might negatively affect your career. You could be accused of being unprofessional and even <u>get demoted¹⁹⁶</u>. However, <u>in the long run</u>, I think that spending time with friends is better for you. It's so important to have good personal connections. Work can <u>only give you so much¹⁹⁷</u> satisfaction.

Topic 22 收到钱作为礼物

1. Why do people rarely use cash now?

I think people rarely use cash because it's more convenient to pay by card. When you pay with cash, you have to make sure you <u>have enough physical money on you¹⁹⁸</u>. But if you use <u>the wallet app¹⁹⁹ on your</u> phone, you don't even have to carry credit cards. You can just go out and pay for things using your phone, which is especially great for young people who don't tend to like carrying a lot of things around with them.

2. When do children begin to comprehend the value of money?

I suppose that children begin to understand the value of money when they start asking their parents for things. For example, they might want the newest toy. But when they ask their parents, <u>a common response</u> <u>is that²⁰⁰ it</u>'s too expensive. That can lead to a conversation about money and how long it takes to <u>save up²⁰¹</u>. <u>In that way</u>, they can understand that money has value and that it means something when you spend it. I think that's a good lesson for them to learn.

3. Should parents reward children with money?

I don't think parents should reward children with money. On the one hand, getting an allowance²⁰² can teach them from a young age to value money. It can also give them some responsibility. However, I don't think children need to be rewarded with money, <u>necessarily</u>. It may make them too focused on accumulating money, which can lead to some greedy habits²⁰³. I think parents should reward their children with <u>different</u> privileges²⁰⁴, or even just some kind words. <u>That just seems healthier to me</u>²⁰⁵.

4. Is it good and necessary to teach children to save money?

Yes, it is. Learning how to be <u>financially responsible²⁰⁶</u> is a vital skill. Being able to master this skill from a young age helps children <u>develop good saving habits that they'll carry into their adult life²⁰⁷</u>. So if parents give children an allowance, they should teach them to save some of it. That way, children can <u>have a pool</u> <u>of money</u> in the future instead of just spending it all at once.

Yes, people use credit cards very often. I think it's the most common form of payment. Instead of having to <u>pay upfront</u>²⁰⁸, you can <u>put it on a credit card and pay it off later</u>²⁰⁹. But there can definitely be issues with using credit cards, the most common being <u>identity theft and fraud</u>²¹⁰. There are even reports of people having their cards scanned through their wallets by criminals who then use their credit card information to make purchases.

Topic 23 糟糕的购物体验

1. What kind of customer service do you think is good?

I think that in order to be good, customer service should be friendly. They should <u>be approachable²¹¹</u> so that you feel you can discuss your issue with them comfortably. Customer service should also <u>go above and</u> <u>beyond²¹²</u>. If you've had a big problem with a product that takes up a lot of your time, it's nice to offer you a discount on your next purchase or something like that. Of course, not every customer service representative can offer that. But as long as they're nice, I think <u>that's what counts²¹³</u>.

2. What are the differences between shopping online and in stores?

Shopping online generally gives you a lot more options. You can see items that are <u>exclusive to the store's</u> <u>website</u>²¹⁴. Sometimes there are even sales that are just online. So you can end up saving money. You also save time since you don't have to <u>go to the store in person</u>. But when you shop in stores, like for clothing, you have the benefit of trying things on and seeing if they look right on you. Shopping in stores <u>gives you</u> <u>a better sense of</u> what the product really looks like.

3. What problems do customers often have while shopping?

Customers often have problems with products <u>being out of stock²¹⁵</u>. They might find the perfect item for them, but the store won't have any left. <u>That's especially a problem when</u> searching for clothes. Sometimes customers might have problems <u>using coupons</u> as well. Some people try to use coupons after they've expired, which <u>leads to a conflict with²¹⁶</u> the store manager. Or others are confused about how a sale works and they expect to save more money than they actually do.

4. What do you think customers should do when there are problems with the products they bought online?

I suppose that customers should <u>apply for a return and refund</u>²¹⁷ on the website or the app where they purchased the products. It just <u>happens every so often</u> that you buy <u>defective products</u>²¹⁸ online. But basically all online shopping platforms I know, like Taobao and Jingdong, provide a return and refund service to their customers. So online buyers should <u>make good use of</u>²¹⁹ them when they have issues with things that they buy online.

Topic 24 不得不与他人分享

1. Do you think kids like to share? Why?

No, I don't think kids like to share. At a young age, kids can <u>be very protective over the things they own</u>. They might not like to share their toy because they're afraid the other kids won't give it back. <u>But on the other hand</u>²²⁰, kids can be very selfish. They tend to only think about themselves. So if they have to share their toy with someone else, they might be upset because <u>they can't have it all to themselves</u>²²¹.

2. How can parents teach their children to share?

I suppose that parents can teach their children to share <u>by setting an example</u>. For example, if one parent shares a belonging with the other parent and demonstrates that <u>nothing bad came of it</u>²²², the child can then learn that sharing is a positive experience. Parents can also explain to children that it's good to not be selfish. If you have something that someone else wants to play with for a little while, it's kind to let them play with it instead of keeping it to yourself.

3. What do you think is the benefit of sharing for children?

It seems to me that sharing teaches children to be kind and generous. Instead of only thinking about themselves, they can learn to consider other people's feelings. They can share because they know the other person will really enjoy getting to share that item or that experience. Then they can understand <u>how making other people feel good is a beneficial thing²²³</u>. So <u>in that sense</u>, they learn to be more <u>selfless</u> and understanding. <u>Those morals transfer to their adult life²²⁴</u>, where they can be considerate and compassionate individuals.

4. Is there anything that parents should persuade children to share with others?

I think that parents should persuade children to share the playground with others. For example, on a playground, lots of kids love going on the swings. A child might want to keep it all to themselves. So they'll refuse to let other kids <u>take a turn</u>. But parents should gently remind their children that it's a public playground, so they need to let the other kids enjoy it. Otherwise, they're being very rude and greedy. It's important to teach your kids <u>good life lessons</u>.

Topic 25 保持健康的方法

1. How do children and old people keep fit and healthy?

In my country, people can do <u>a wide range of</u> activities to keep fit and healthy. Firstly, it is important to exercise every day, so people can either walk or run every day, work out at a gym, or join a fitness class. Many people also like to do their physical activity outdoors, by going on hikes or swimming. Besides, people need to be sure to eat healthy, so they may choose to buy foods from health food stores and <u>avoid ordering in takeout²²⁷</u>.

3. How can parents help and guide their kids to keep healthy?

Parents can help keep their kids healthy by encouraging them to eat healthy foods and get lots of exercise. Parents should <u>be good role models for</u> their kids by providing healthy meals at home and <u>doing activities</u> <u>as a family²²⁸</u> that involve fitness and movement. Parents should also <u>enroll their kids in²²⁹</u> some kind of sport, or, if they don't like sports, maybe a fitness class like dance or gymnastics.

4. Do you think it is a good way for governments to use the power of idol to help people build health awareness?

I suppose that <u>to some degree²³⁰</u>, it can be effective for the government to depend on celebrities to help people <u>improve their awareness of their health</u>. This can be especially effective among young people, who <u>look up to their celebrity idols as role models²³¹</u>. Topic 26 帮助提高专注力的东西

1. Why is it more difficult for children to concentrate nowadays than in the past?

I think it's harder for children to concentrate nowadays because there are <u>way more</u> distractions. In the past, children didn't have any technological devices to <u>keep them occupied</u>. But nowadays, it's pretty common to see children with tablets or even mobile phones. Even if they don't have their own devices, we <u>live in an age of instant gratification²³²</u>. Kids are used to getting what they want very quickly, which makes it hard for them to slow down and do a task that takes longer than a few minutes.

2. Do you think technology will harm children's ability to concentrate?

Yes, I definitely think technology <u>has a negative effect on</u> children's ability to concentrate. When they <u>get</u> <u>used to playing games on their tablets</u>²³³ instead of focusing on conversation, it makes it hard for them to sit and focus on the person in front of them for a long time. They're used to getting what they want and getting it fast. Social media teaches them to <u>crave instant gratification</u>²³⁴. That makes it hard for them to focus on tasks that take longer than a few minutes.

3. What kinds of jobs require high concentration at work?

I think any job that has <u>high stakes</u>²³⁵ requires a lot of concentration. For example, any job in the medical field requires you to <u>be on high alert</u>²³⁶. You have to stay focused while you're operating on someone or administering medical aid to save their lives. You also need a lot of concentration if you work in construction. If you get distracted while operating heavy machinery, you could <u>mess up</u>²³⁷ and accidentally <u>demolish</u> ²³⁸the building you're working on.

4. Can exercise help people improve concentration?

Yes, it seems to me that exercise <u>can be a lot of help</u> when it comes to improving concentration. For example, yoga is commonly <u>cited as a form of exercise that helps with mindfulness</u>²³⁹. When you have to slow down and focus on your breathing, it helps you become more focused in general. Being aware of your body is always emphasized with yoga. <u>That can easily translate to other parts of your life</u>²⁴⁰.

There are lots of modern inventions that can be used at school. One of the most obvious ones is <u>a handheld</u> <u>calculator²⁴⁷</u>. 1. Where do people like watching films?

1. What are the differences between houses or buildings in the city and in the countryside?

In the city, houses and buildings are definitely <u>designed for efficiency</u>³⁵⁰. Cities are very crowded, so residential buildings can't take up too much room. They tend to be high-rises instead of bungalows and houses. That way, you can fit more of them in a smaller space. On the other hand, houses in the countryside are a lot bigger and more <u>spread out</u>³⁵¹. There's more room in rural areas, so <u>they don't have to be as space-efficient</u>³⁵².

I prefer living in the city. <u>Don't get me wrong</u>, the countryside has beautiful views. It's very peaceful there. However, there's not much to do, especially as a young person. There aren't many job opportunities because <u>the major industries don't tend to have offices out in the middle of nowhere</u>³⁵³. Cities are very exciting. There's always something to do. The nightlife is usually incredible and has lots of options. <u>There's also a</u> <u>lot of diversity in terms of the people there</u>³⁵⁴.

3. What safety risks are there in residential buildings in cities?

I think fires are a big safety risk when it comes to residential buildings in cities. In one of those high-rise apartments, a fire can start in one unit and quickly spread to the other ones³⁵⁵. Unlike a house, where the danger is very <u>centrally located</u>, apartment units are so interconnected that when one of them is burning, the others are at high risk of catching fire too. Besides <u>fire hazards</u>, elevators can be dangerous as well, especially the ones in high rise residential buildings. I remember that there were news articles about falling elevators that caused injuries and deaths.

4. Is it expensive to decorate a house or an apartment in the place where you live?

Yes, it's pretty expensive to decorate an apartment in the place I live. I live in the downtown area of a major city, so the department stores around me are very pricey. If you want some <u>decent wall art</u>, it can <u>cost you</u> <u>an arm and a leg³⁵⁶</u>. <u>That's not to mention</u> how expensive furniture is. Couches and coffee tables can <u>set</u> <u>you back by quite a lot³⁵⁷</u>. Plus, you usually have to have those items delivered, which <u>adds an additional</u> cost.

3. What factors affect how people feel about travel?

I think that cost is a major factor that affects how people feel about travel. Some tourists might have extra satisfaction with a trip because the actual cost is lower than they expect. However, people might <u>feel</u> <u>down³⁶³</u> or anxious when the trip is <u>over-budget by a lot³⁶⁴</u>. Besides money, the <u>accommodation³⁶⁵</u> also influences people's feeling about their trip. You know, bad hotels leave a terrible impression on tourists very quickly. But people might also love the trip more because of the nice rooms they stay in.

4. Will you go to a foreign country to travel because of the distinct landscape?

Yes, I'd love to travel to a foreign country because of the landscape. I've always wanted to go to Iceland. It has the most amazing waterfalls and beaches. For example, Iceland is well-known for its black-sand beaches, which sound stunning. I would love to go see them in person³⁶⁶ and take lots of pictures. Plus, you can pass down the business to the next generation. When the business stays in the family, it becomes <u>part of a valuable family tradition</u>.

3. Is it good to work with family members? Why?

I think that <u>for the most part</u>, it can be good to work with family members. Your family are the people that you love and trust the most in the world. So it's very comfortable to work with them. You already have a foundation of trust and respect. However, sometimes it's not good to <u>mix business with family</u>³⁷⁷. People can take business decisions very personally. They might even <u>be biased</u>³⁷⁸ when it comes to the important things.

4. What benefits are there when working for big companies?

Working for big companies can provide many benefits. Most big companies are very well established, so <u>losing your job is unlikely</u>³⁷⁹. Big companies also <u>have great name recognition</u>³⁸⁰. So a job with a big company can <u>open lots of doors for you</u>. Finally, since big companies tend to <u>make a big profit</u>, they can afford to give their employees things like health and dental insurance. Depending on the company, you might even <u>get unique employee perks</u>³⁸¹.

Yes, it's really beneficial to get along well with neighbors. Neighbors are the people who live the closest to you, so <u>if there is ever an emergency³⁸⁸</u>, they are there to help you. 1. Where do young people like to meet?

3. Do you think people should be honest when talking with friends?

Yes, I suppose that it's important to be honest when talking with friends. Your friends are <u>the people that</u> <u>you should trust with your honest thoughts and opinions³⁹⁷</u>. You should feel comfortable enough sharing how you really feel with them. Of course, you should try to <u>avoid being cruel or mean³⁹⁸</u>. Topic 46(国家/家乡)有名的人

1. What kinds of people are popular at work?

I would say that having a good relationship with your colleagues is more important. Obviously, the ideal situation is to do both successfully. But I think that even though doing well at work is really important, it's better to <u>cultivate good relationships with colleagues</u> because they're the ones you spend every work-day with. If you don't get along with your coworkers, it might be harder to do well at your job. It might actually <u>negatively affect your performance</u> if you don't have good relationships with your colleagues.

They might <u>try to adopt elements of other cultures instead of focusing on theirs</u>⁴⁰⁹.

3. How can traditional culture and other cultures coexist?

Cultures can coexist with <u>increased understanding between people</u>. If someone doesn't understand another culture, then there might be conflicts that are the result of fear and misunderstandings. However, if different cultures <u>take the time to communicate with each other</u> and get to know each other, then they will have a much better chance of not only coexisting, but thriving. I think that sharing cultures can be a beautiful way to <u>appreciate cultural diversity</u>⁴¹⁰ and to learn more about <u>different perspectives and philosophies</u>. <u>One culture doesn't have to come at the cost of another</u>⁴¹¹.

In that sense, a culture is often defined by its language, or in some cases, multiple languages. So without linguistic diversity, you risk losing cultural diversity as well. Even within one culture, there may be several different languages. For example, there are many <u>regional dialects</u>⁴¹⁷ in China. Each dialect belongs to a specific <u>sub-culture</u>⁴¹⁸. However, <u>there are always some exceptions to the rule</u>⁴²³, and some older people are very fashionable.

4. Are women more fashionable than men? Why?

No, I don't think so. I think <u>this depends entirely on</u> the personality of the individual. Some men are as fashionable as women, <u>or even more so</u>. I know a lot of people believe the <u>stereotype</u>⁴²⁴ that women are more fashion-forward than men. 1. Are there many people growing their own vegetables now?

I think that being a farmer is a really interesting job. It definitely <u>presents lots of challenges</u>⁴²⁹. For example, you have to <u>deal with unpredictable weather</u>⁴³⁰, which can sometimes negatively affect your crops. You also have a lot of responsibilities, especially if you have a lot of animals on the farm. But I suppose that it's worth it because you get to work on the land and spend a lot of time outdoors. Plus, you can be very independent since you <u>run the farm yourself</u>.

4. What are the differences between traditional and modern agriculture?

Traditional agriculture seemed a lot simpler. It was more about working the land and <u>finding a balance</u> <u>between human presence and the environment</u>⁴³¹. Farming was a very humble occupation. You didn't see any huge machinery or any signs of industrialism. But modern agriculture is about efficiency. It's more about harvesting vegetables or fruits to be turned into products <u>for the average consumer</u>. 1. What qualities make a role model?

That inspires them to <u>press on⁴³⁷</u> even though they're having a hard time. Others are inspired by people who have overcome similar difficulties, or even harder obstacles. Seeing other people go through tough times⁴³⁸ can help them <u>find the strength to⁴³⁹</u> face their own challenges.

4. What kinds of jobs need inspiration?

I suppose that difficult jobs require <u>inspiration⁴⁴⁰</u>. For example, if you work in a high-stress, high-risk position like a doctor, you might need extra inspiration to keep going. The decisions that doctors have to make are literally <u>life-and-death</u>⁴⁴¹. 3. Do you think social media will replace face-to-face communication?

No, I don't think social media will replace face-to-face communication. Social media definitely <u>fills a gap</u> <u>in some people's lives</u>⁴⁴⁷, especially when they can't see their friends and family on a daily basis. It helps them <u>stay close over distance</u>. However, I suppose that people will always prefer in-person interactions over chatting via social media. Seeing a loved one face-to-face is way better than texting or <u>instant-messaging</u>⁴⁴⁸ them. So I don't think that social media could ever compare or come close to replacing that.

4. How important is childhood friendship to children?

I think childhood friendship is super important to children. Those first friendships <u>set a standard for their</u> <u>interpersonal relationships throughout their lives</u>⁴⁴⁹. The communication skills they learn in early friendships can be strengthened and applied to their adult friendships. Plus, children need companionship. Having close friends helps them enjoy each day and overcome personal challenges. Without friends, children would be lonely and <u>miserable</u>. They need friends to develop social skills, learn about other perspectives, and form their identity as individuals⁴⁵⁰.
